## BABE RUTH PLAY WILL DECIDE CHAMPIONSHIP

For this week's extra interest activities at the softball park there will be the playoffs for County Championship in the Babe Ruth League. These games are scheduled for Tuesday and Thursday nights with the third game, if needed, to be played the following week. The collections on these nights will be used to help defray the expense of sending the boys to the State meet at Atlantic City, Texas.

Games this week have been limited to adults because of other youth activities in our city. Next week we will again see the kinds in action.

On Thursday night of this week Thomas Garage will tackle K.C. Steak House of Shamrock.

Friday night the Wheeler Fire Department will play Thomas Garage. These nights the games will start at eight p.m.

On Monday night, August 1, Wofford's Wolves will tackle the Boy Scout team at 7:30 with Al Thomas vs. Mobeetie, a women's game to follow at 8:45.

Tuesday night will be the first Babe Ruth play-off for County Championship between Kelton and Wheeler.

Thursday night night will see the second Babe Ruth Play-off between the same two teams.

Friday night the first game will be Daughtry Dolls vs. Wheeler Times. Second game a men's game between Thomas Garage and Mobeetie Lions.

## Congressman Rogers Accepts Invitation To Speak Aug. 20

Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa, has accepted an invitation to appear on the program at

Wheeler's 50th Birthday Celebration, August 20, R. J. Holt, Jr., program chairman announced this week.

The Eighteenth District Congressman will speak from the street platform on the Wheeler Square at 10:30 a.m.

A packed day of entertainment is already assured the thousands of out-of-town visitors expected for the Golden Birthday Anniversary, as committees complete the final program draft.

Approximately 1,000 postcard invitation have been mailed former residents, relatives, friends and interested persons, and acceptances are already pouring in. Scores of local residents have received letters and calls from invited guests.

The publicity and advertising committee is preparing newspaper stories and ads to be run in weeklies and dailies of the Panhandle and Western Oklahoma. Spot radio announcements will be carried over KEVA and nearby stations, ballyhooing the free barbecue, Old Fiddlers contest and street dance.

The biggest single piece of publicity and advertising, a Special Anniversary edition of The Wheeler Times will go into the post-office on August 11, carrying many pages of caricatures, pictures, and features about the Golden Anniversary. Hundreds of extra copies will go to far places, telling of the homecoming and celebration at Wheeler.

(Persons wishing to buy extra copies over the counter or have them mailed, should turn in their orders at once.)

The registration of Pioneers will start the day, with the Pendleton building, next door to The Wheeler Times, serving as headquarters. Registration begins at 9:30 a.m.

The program will get underway on the street platform about 10 o'clock with introduction of dignitaries and the address by Congressman Rogers.

## FHA LIVESTOCK LOAN PROGRAM EXTENDED 1957

The U. S. Department of Agriculture's special livestock loan program has been extended for two years, through July 14, 1957. Provision is contained in Public Law 166, which was signed by President Eisenhower July 15.

Under the legislation extending the program, initial loans will be made through July 14, 1957. After that date, additional advances may be made for a period of two years to borrowers who require additional time to make necessary credit adjustments and to repay the loans previously received.

Special livestock loans are made to established producers and feeders of cattle, and goats (except commercial feedlot operators) who are temporarily unable to get from regular sources the credit needed to continue their normal operations.

To be eligible an applicant must have a good past record of livestock operations and have reasonable (Continued on last page)

## Second Polio Shots Given Here Aug. 1

The second shot of Salk Vaccine will be available at Wheeler on Monday, August 1, for all first and second grade children who have taken the first polio shot, according to Dr. O. M. Roberts, county health officer.

Jesse J. Dyer, county superintendent, announced all eligible children from Wheeler, Mobeetie, Allison, Briscoe and Kelton communities who wish to receive the shot should come to the Wheeler

school gymnasium between 9 and 10 o'clock Monday morning. Dr. Glenn Walker of Wheeler, will administer the shots.

"These shots are not compulsory, and all children who take them must have the written consent of the parents to do so," said Mr. Dyer. The information blank appears in this edition of The Wheeler Times, and parents are asked to fill out and send it by the child. Additional copies of the blanks may be secured from the county superintendent's office or from local school superintendents.

At Mobeetie the blanks may be received from L. R. Reeves or Mr. Thomas, president of the board; at Allison from D. L. Mallin, at Briscoe from Grady Dodd and at Kelton from Chas. Harmon.

County Superintendent Dyer suggests to local school officials that school buses be used to transport the children to and from Wheeler, if possible.

The second polio shot will be administered at North Ward school in Shamrock between 9 and 10 a.m., Monday for first and second grade pupils of Lela, Kellerville and Shamrock. Officials there have announced it will not be necessary for parents to sign another "permission" blank for their children to receive the second shot.

#### Good Pasture Management Tips

Turn cows out pasture gradually. For a week or so when cows are first turned out, feed hay first. This partially fills the cows and discourages gorging on lush grass with resulting scours and possible bloat. Keep cows up until noon the first day and gradually reduce the time in the barn or lot over a period of a week or so.



If possible, provide cows with plenty of clean, fresh drinking water in the pasture.

Shade should be available so cows can get out of the hot sun during the heat of the day.

#### How to Feed on Pasture

Cows will milk "like sixty" on good spring pasture, but they need some grain ration too to prevent "summer slump".

Pasture is a great help to many dairymen because it produces the cheapest milk, but it is a serious handicap to many others because they let cows lose condition. This makes cows give less milk than they should in summer and fall. It takes time to re-build condition. Just as soon as cows will eat it after turning out, begin feeding a little grain ration. This should be the same ration fed in winter.

Feed hay on pasture. Cows won't eat much while pasture is green, but what they eat will help hold up body weight. As weather gets warmer, they'll eat lots more.

#### House-Hunters:

#### Don't Ignore Possibilities Of 'Used Home'

A used car in good condition is often a better buy for the money than a brand new one. House-hunters are finding the same to be true in the "used home" market. Real estate brokers counsel clients to look beneath the surface for the remodeling potential in older houses. If the house is structurally sound, the buyer usually can end up with a house with a re-sale value far higher than the purchase price and remodeling cost combined. Here are some "used home" shopping tips:

Choose a house that is already the right size for your present needs—with expansion possibilities in an attic or breezeway if your family is on the increase. A sound, intact shell is a must. Signs of settling, such as sloping floors or wall cracks, suggest a faulty foundation or sill. Signs of dampness in the basement should be investigated. Floors which vibrate or squeak mean trouble, but bracing may remedy this. Windows and doors should open smoothly and swing evenly.

When remodeling, attend to a leaky, weatherworn roof first, since it's the first line of defense against weather. A sound, water-tight roof of fire-resistant asphalt shingles can be economically applied—often right over the old roofing. Next, see that the siding is equally weather-resistant. Repair or replace windows and doors that are not in condition to seal out wind, rain, and dust.

When decorating the house, paint the siding and trim in a related tone of the asphalt roof color. A subdued color scheme without strong contrasts will go far to disguise any awkward architectural features an older house may have.

The second line of defense is adequate insulation, often lacking in older houses. Wrap the house in mineral wool all around, that is, in outside walls and attic floor. It will keep fuel bills low right from the start, and pay for itself in a few winters.

Once full weather protection is assured, interior remodeling can follow gradually, as your budget permits.

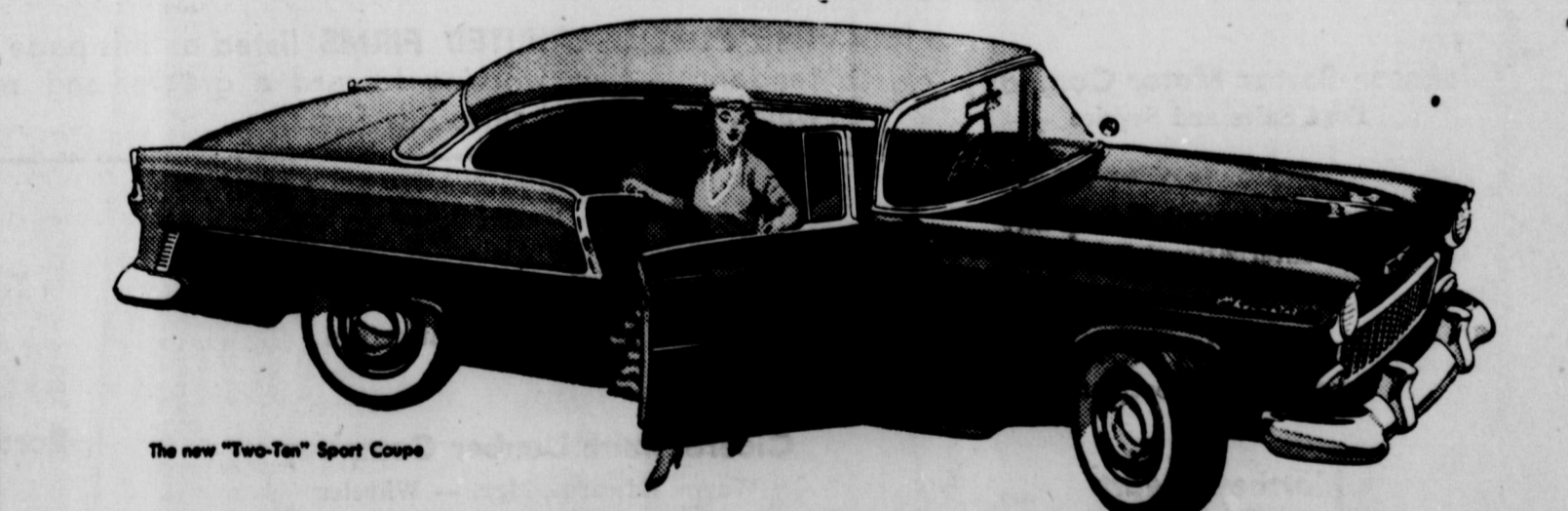

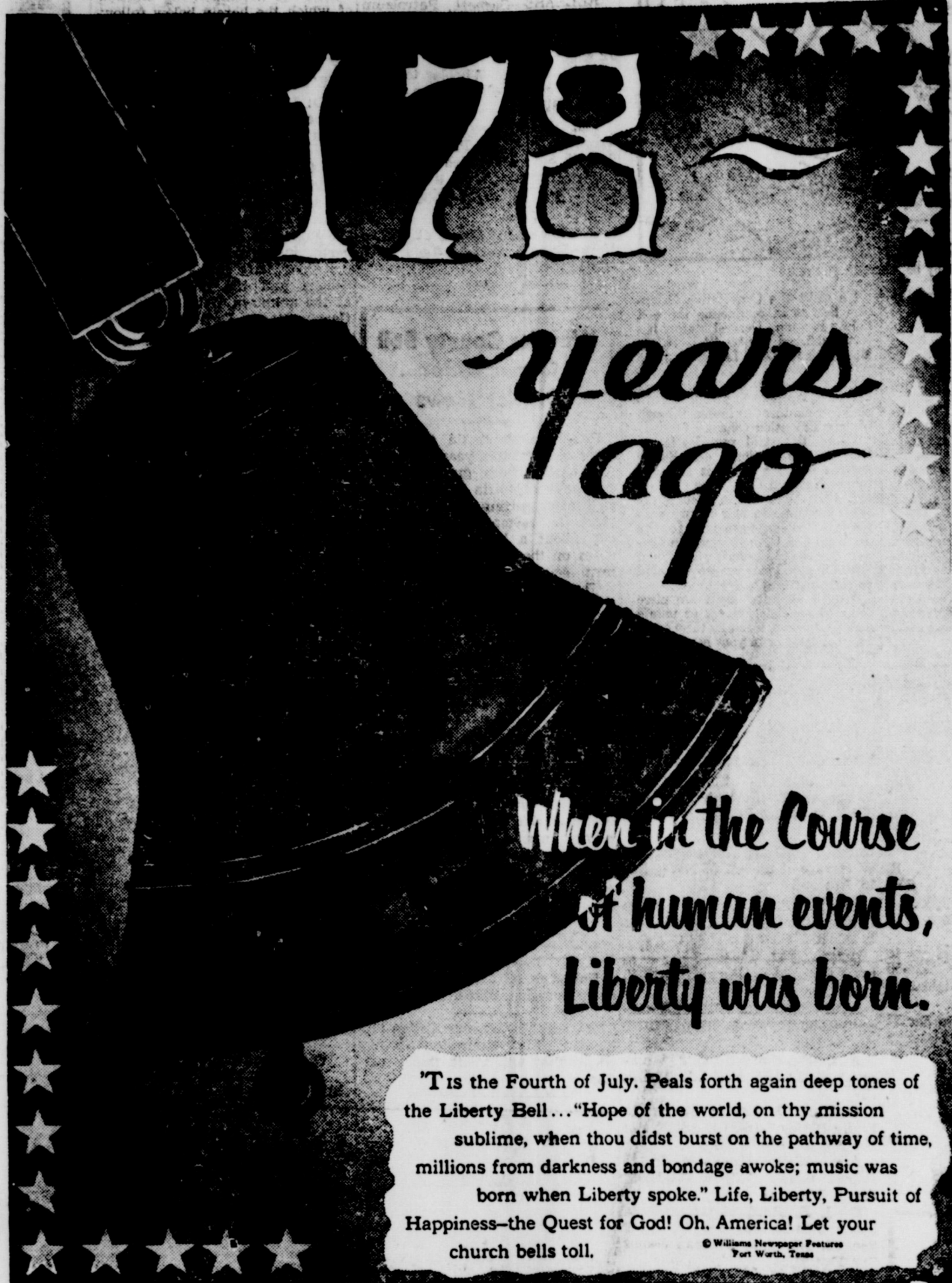

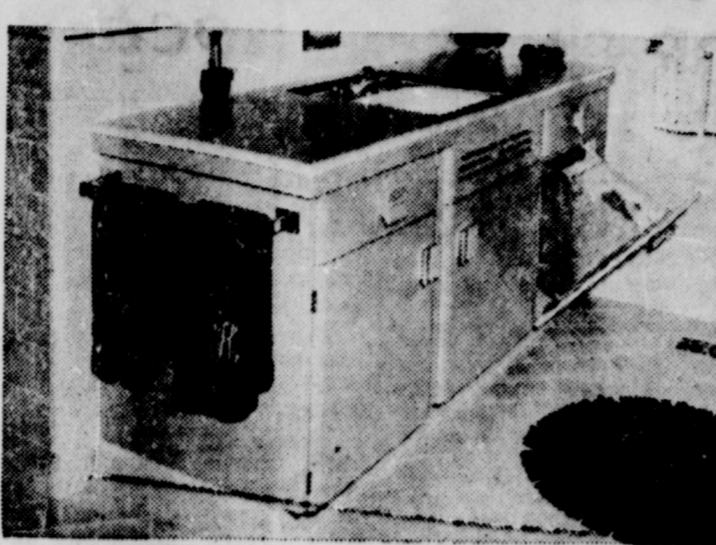

able prospects for success with the help of the loan. The loans are made to meet the usual expenses of Livestock operations such as the purchase or production of feed, and replacing or repairing of farm machinery. Loans also may be made for the restocking of herds to normal if the applicant can carry his present herd, plus the additional livestock to be purchased, without buying a substantial portion of his feed. Loans are not made to pay existing debts except current incidental ones. The loans are scheduled for repayment as soon as possible within a maximum period of three years. Other creditors are not asked to subordinate their liens but are expected to execute a standby agreement that a reasonable part of the applicant's normal income from livestock can be used in repaying the loan. Applications for special livestock loans may be made at the local county office of the Farmers Home Administration located in the Court House at Wheeler, Texas.

All Over State

SEASON FOR FAIRS AT HAND IN TEXAS

In many a city and town of Texas today, community leaders are making plans for an important annual event which many folks have been eagerly looking forward to all year. During the next several months it will be fair-time throughout Texas — with county and regional fairs and festivals taking place in every section of the state, the culminating event being the State Fair of Texas in Dallas, October 7-23. Texas possibly has a bigger percentage of large, widely patronized fairs than any other state. Several of Texas' big regional fairs attract more visitors and have more impressive fairgrounds than state fairs in some other sections of the nation. The State Fair of Texas is, of course, the largest annual fair in the United States in terms of attendance, with over 2 1/2 million visitors from all parts of America, and a magnificent fairgrounds with facilities valued at \$35 million. As with most fairs the country over, Texas events carry a heavy emphasis on livestock and agriculture. Entertainment naturally covers a wide range, from carnival sideshows, rodeos, folk festivals to the Broadway musical comedy "Pajama Game" which will be presented at the State Fair. Competition in making jams and jellies, succulent cakes and pies and other examples of traditional homemaking skills still occupies a big place in the program of most Texas fairs.

Fairs in Texas date back over 100 years. The first fair to be held in the state may well have been one in Corpus Christi in 1852, which featured bull-fights, a circus, cockfights and fireworks. During the same decade Dallas County became the first county in the state to organize a fair. The State Fair was founded in 1886. A good fair regardless of size can be a valuable asset to its community, in the opinion of James H. Stewart, general manager of the State Fair and vice president of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions.

"In addition to providing wholesome and worthwhile recreation and relaxation, fairs serve to stimulate pride in the achievements of the individual, his group and his region," Mr. Stewart said. "They are a stimulus to trade and a unifying medium. The various fairs, festivals and livestock shows in Texas have one important thing in common — they are all working to improve our agriculture and livestock industry, to better living conditions generally and to build up our state. NEWS FROM— County Agent's Office By R. D. Siegmund

Cotton and cotton insects are still the largest topic of conversation along with the showers that Wheeler County has received the past week. I have checked fields of cotton over most of the county and am very happy to report that there are very few insects bothering cotton. Roy Ford has a field of cotton that is next to some grain sorghum that is heavily infested with plant lice and as a result, he has some spots in his cotton that have a bad infestation of plant

lice. The spots are small and unless they spread over a larger area, it would not be economical to spray. Flea hopper damage and plant lice infestation were very light over the county in all the fields that I checked. I did find a few boll worm eggs in Nig Clark's tender fast growing cotton but no small worms. All fields checked had quite a few lady bugs and other good insects. I have checked fields belonging to the following: people during the past week: Tom Hathaway, J. Mobeetie; Willard Godwin, Mobeetie; Monroe Seitz, Mobeetie; Jake Allen, Mobeetie; Nig Clark, Wheeler; Pete Baird, Wheeler; Roy Ford, Wheeler; M. McLeane, Lela; J. R. Henry, Twitty and Edgar Baker, Twitty. There have been a great number of people in the office wanting to know what to do for plant lice or aphids on cucumbers, Cantaloupes, and water melons. The best dust to use would be 1 per cent lindane dust and if you want to spray for aphids, I would recommend using a .25 pound of lindane per acre. Since most people spray with a hand sprayer, I would recommend using 1 table spoon of 25 per cent emulsion concentrate lindane per gallon of water or 1 table spoon of 25 per cent wettable powdered lindane per one gallon of water. For a few vines, you can get an excellent dust already in a handy dust gun that you can do a fast easy job with. GOLD SEAL linoleums, Wheeler Lumber Co.
