The Wheeler Mustangs opened Conference play in District 2B here last Friday night by shellacking the Quitaque Panthers by a score of 38-0.

The Mustangs started strong and seemed to finish the same way. Roger Topper, Mustang fullback, broke the ice in the first quarter with a 60-yard end run to pay dirt.

In the second quarter Harold Crossland passed to Jo Jo Jaco for 38 yards to the Panther 3-yard line and Jim Porter, left half, went over for the second Mustang TD. Later in the same period Porter again went off tackle from the 1-yard line for the third TD. Harold Crossland's kick was good.

**Score: Wheeler Mustangs 19, Quitaque Panthers 0** as the first half ended.

The second half opened with the Mustangs receiving. The Panthers held taking the ball. They made two first downs to their own 49-yard line where the Mustangs seemed to stiffen and the Panthers went to the air. This

## First Bale Of Cotton Ginned Here Friday

The first bale of cotton from the 1955 crop was ginned in Wheeler Friday, September 16, and the second bale was brought in Saturday afternoon and processed.

Honors for the first bale go to Andrew Goad who farms the Fred Rowe place, two miles north of Wheeler.

Brought to town Friday, the bale was ginned free at the McNeill Gin, managed by J. W. Hooker. The cotton ginned out 464 pounds of lint and 700 pounds of seed from 1,860 pounds of seed cotton.

It was graded as midling, 31/32 inch staple.

Mr. Goad has 47 acres of Moca cotton. It was planted the latter part of May. The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce gave Mr. Goad a \$50.00 premium and Mr. Hooker bid 35c per pound for the initial bale.

The second bale was brought in Saturday by John Lewis of east of Wheeler and was ginned free of charge by Arnold (Fat) Jones, manager of Paymaster Gin.

The 1,300 pounds of seed cotton turned out 345 pounds of lint and 620 pounds of seed.

Wheeler County's cotton crop is some three to four weeks later than those of the past few years.

## FIREMEN ASK COOPERATION OF MOTORISTS

Members of the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Dept., with the assistance of the Sheriff's Dept. made a list of the license tags of cars which were driven to the mock fire here last Thursday night.

Purpose of the mock fire and the listing of the car licenses was to impress upon the public the danger of persons who are not firemen rushing to fires.

Carroll Pettit, chief of the local department, made the following statement:

"It was necessary for some of these cars to be at the fire but for a large number of them, this was not the case. We have a volunteer department and some of the members cannot get to the station in time to ride to the fire on the truck. They must take their own cars.

## ROAD MISHAPS CLAIM EIGHT LIVES IN AUG.

Eight persons were killed, 80 injured and \$69,540 worth of property damage in accidents investigated by Texas Highway Patrolmen in this district during August.

The figures do not include accidents in cities of more than 2,500 population or accidents investigated by officers other than patrolmen.

The same number of persons were killed in the corresponding month last year. Forty-five were injured and property damage totaled \$80,058. In July this year, 11 were killed, 84 injured and property damage was estimated at \$69,204.

For the first eight months of this year, deaths from traffic accidents total 54, while 442 persons were injured and property damage amounts to \$551,283.

Principal violations given as causative factors in the August accidents were: speeding, driving while drinking, failure to grant (Continued on last page)

## NEW STATE LAW BANS LIQUOR AT BALL GAMES

A. E. Brown, superintendent of Wheeler Schools, this week called attention to the fact that at the last session of the Texas State Legislature a law was passed prohibiting the use and possession of intoxicating liquors on school premises.

This bill was sponsored in the House by Representative J. W. Cooper, Jr., Corpus Christi, and in the Senate by Senator Johnnie B. Rogers, Austin.

Supt. Brown believes that all school administrators feel that this is a piece of legislation that should have been on the statute many years ago.

The law states, in part: "An act making it unlawful to bring or carry intoxicating beverages into any enclosure, stadium or field where athletic events are sponsored or participated in by the public schools of this state are (Continued on inside)

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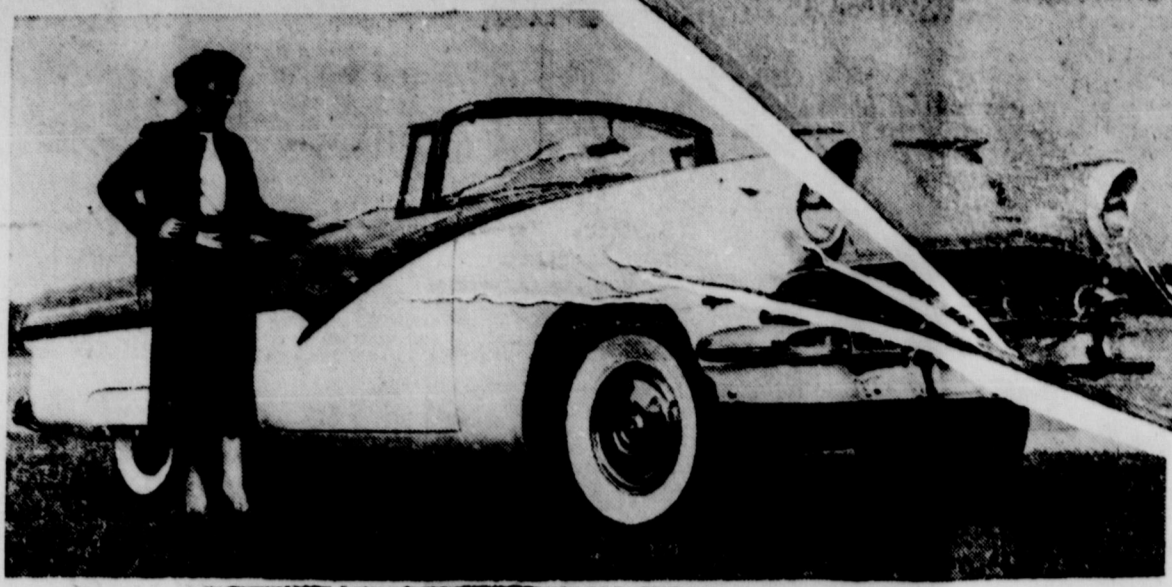

## TEXAS COTTON ESTIMATED

The Texas cotton crop has been estimated at 3,900,000 bales, which is only one per cent below the 1954 yield on 1,000,000 acres less than was harvested.  
The indicated per acre yield based on August 1 conditions is 278 pounds, or the highest yield since 1886.  
The unusually high yield reflects improved soil moisture and the use of practices designed to produce high yields from sharply reduced acreage together with considerable amounts of fertilizer.  
Harvest of grain sorghums is nearing completion in southern and south central counties of Texas and has moved well into the low rolling plains and across north Texas.  
In the high plains counties irrigated sorghums are making excellent growth, but much of the dry land acreage is critically short of moisture with plants curling and in some cases burning severely.  
Peanut harvest in south Texas counties continues with a considerable part of the late crop needing additional moisture. Harvest of rice is underway in the Gulf Coast area with good to excellent yields reported.  
Potatoes in the Panhandle-Plains are producing excellent yields but are being dug under adverse marketing conditions. In many cases it is doubtful if the entire crop will be dug. Dugging of carrots on the early planted part of the acreage in the Here-

### DROUTH RELIEF PROGRAM WILL BE CONTINUED

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson said last week he will recommend something "very specific" to congress next year to bolster sagging farm prices — expected to be a major issue in the 1956 presidential campaign.

Benson also said the government may begin a pork-buying program in the near future to help currently hard-hit hog farmers. But he said this decision has not yet been made.

The secretary told newsmen on his return from a two-week trip to Europe that his proposal to congress will be in addition to existing farm law rather than a change in it.

He said flexibility in prices will "continue to be emphasized" under the administration's flexible price support program.

"That's basic," he declared. While Benson did not say what his solution to the present farm price-cost squeeze would be, he did say that government payments to farmers who take land out of production is one thing being studied.

He said a government rental system of the land would have "real difficulties." He stated such difficulties would not be "insurmountable." But he added that an increase in incentive payments under the regular agriculture conservation program might be a "simpler way."

Under some proposals being considered, a farmer would be paid a certain amount, say \$10 an acre, to put some of his acreage into grass instead of cash crops.

Benson said that other possible moves will be taken up at the next meeting of the agricultural advisory commission in Washington September 22 and 23.

Benson said that no one seriously interested in agriculture can be "satisfied with present farm prices."

"I know I'm not," he said. Republican strategists are seriously concerned by falling farm income. Farmers have suffered a loss of four cents on the dollar in their cash income so far this year.

Just after Benson left for Europe, a department price report showed another 2 per cent decline in the level of farm prices, the fourth consecutive month of decline. The drop put the farm index 6 per cent below a year earlier. The department said a further drop is expected.

### SHERIFF WILL SUPPORT SAFE DRIVING MOVE

Sheriff Bus Dorman and deputies have joined the Department of Public Safety in issuing warnings to all motorists that safe driving must be watched closer than ever, with the opening of schools.

The Texas Safety Association Inc. is conducting a statewide campaign on the slogan, "It's a sign of good judgement to know and obey the Signs of Life" in cooperation with the Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council.

"Signs of Life are the traffic signs and signals erected for the protection of motorists and pedestrians," explained E. C. McFadden, Dallas president of the Texas Safety Association. "It is their job to warn of conditions ahead, and drivers who don't heed their warnings are likely to run into trouble."

"The traffic trouble caused by such heedlessness is indicated," Mr. McFadden said, "by the fact that more than half the drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents are violating one or more traffic laws at the time of the accident. Violations most frequently committed are:

1. Exceeding speed limit.
2. Failing to keep right of center line.
3. Improper passing.
4. Disregarding warning sign.
5. Disregarding stop sign.
6. Disregarding signal or officer.

"On the matter of speed," Mr. McFadden said, "driving too fast for conditions often cause drivers to miss traffic signs or signals or to be unable to slow down in time if they see them."

"Whenever you drive," he said, "remember that it's dangerous to be a Hasty Bug. Slow down and live!"

school staffs for a substantial part of the day for approximately half the days of the year.

The conditions under which they live in school, the help which they are given in solving their health problems, the ideals of individual and community health which they are taught and the information and understanding that they acquire of themselves are factors which operate to develop attitudes and behavior conducive to healthy, happy and successful living.

Schools alone however cannot enable children to attain all the desirable goals of individual and community health. Considering the magnitude and multitude of the diverse and containing efforts that must be made to satisfy the health needs of children, it is fortunate that many people and groups, in addition to schools, are greatly interested in promoting health. Parents have a prime responsibility.

Physicians, dentists, nurses, health officers, social and welfare workers and their official organizations, such as medical dental and nursing societies, health departments and voluntary health agencies are all rightly concerned with health activities in their communities.

protection and the sooner the firemen reach a fire the more good they can do. If they are going to your home on a call, you wouldn't want them held up by congested traffic caused by sight-seers.

"This also causes great danger to the driver of the truck and to firemen going to the fire.

"In some cities, there are ordinances or laws prohibiting the following of the fire truck, and violators are fined. We don't want to do this but something must be done before there is a bad accident involving either a fireman or a follower.

"When the alarm sounds, motorists are urged to pull to the side of the street and wait until the siren stops. This requires only 2 1/2 minutes and will give the firemen time to be out of the way.

"This will give them a better chance to get to your home in case you have a fire."

right-of-way, improper passing and driving on the wrong side of the road.

Eighty-six of the accidents occurred on state and federal highways, 10 on farm-to-market roads, 17 on county roads and four in towns under 2,500 population.

In carrying out their basic duties of traffic law enforcement during August, the 27 patrolmen in District No. 5, composed of 26 Panhandle Counties, performed the following activities: investigated 117 accidents, made 545 traffic arrests including 207 for speeding and 39 for driving while intoxicated.

They issued 1,397 warnings for hazardous violations, served 16 safety responsibility demand orders, investigated three cases for the restoration of drivers licenses. They worked 3,640 day hours and 3,274 night hours and traveled 71,312 miles.
