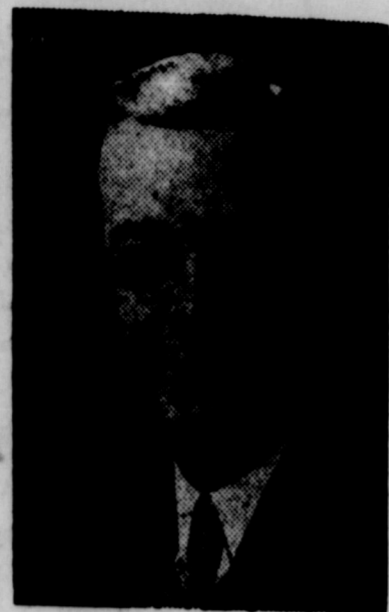

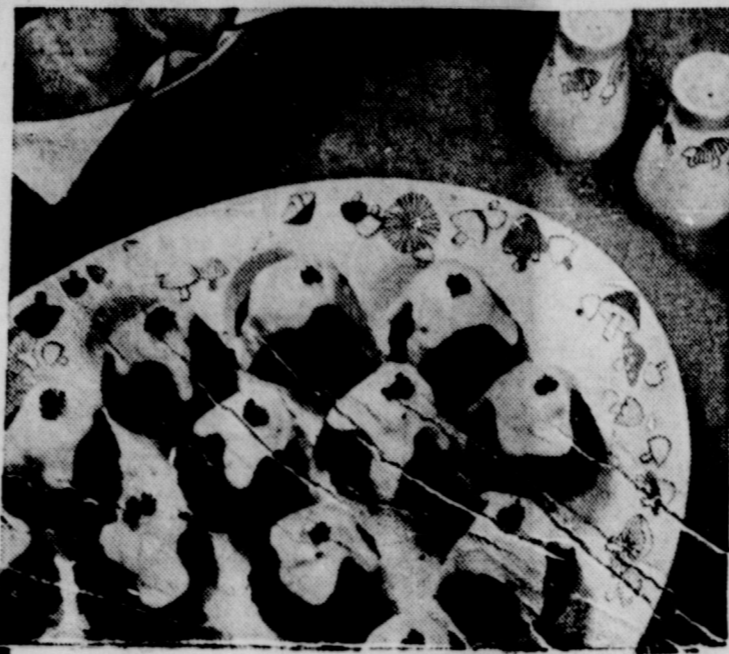

## RICE-HAM CROQUETTES WITH HORSERADISH SAUCE



1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1/2 cup flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
1 teaspoon dry mustard  
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire  
2 cups milk  
3 cups cooked rice  
1 cup ground cooked ham  
2 tablespoons minced parsley  
2 tablespoons minced onions  
3 eggs  
2 tablespoons water  
1/4 cup cereal crumbs  
1 cup well-drained horseradish  
1 tablespoon lemon juice

stirring constantly and rapidly. Remove from heat.  
Combine 1 cup of the sauce, rice, ham, parsley, onions, and 1/2 of the eggs which have been slightly beaten; mix thoroughly. Chill well and shape into 12 croquettes.  
Combine remaining egg and water and beat slightly. Roll croquettes in crumbs, then dip in egg mixture and roll again in crumbs. Fry in deep hot fat (375° F.) until golden brown. Drain on absorbent paper.  
Thin remainder of cream sauce with remaining 1/2 cup of milk. Heat thoroughly. Stir in horseradish and lemon juice. Serve over the hot croquettes. Yields six servings.

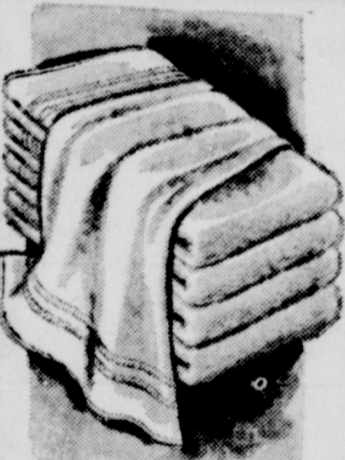

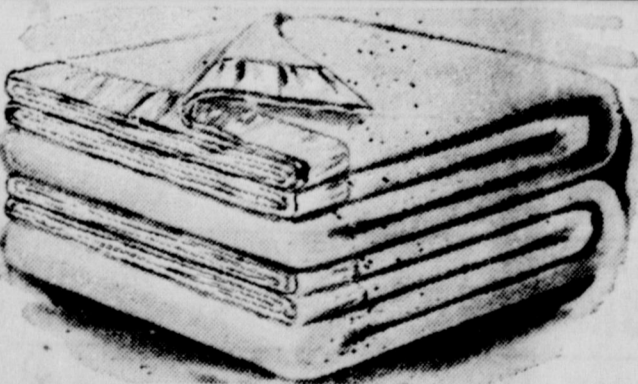

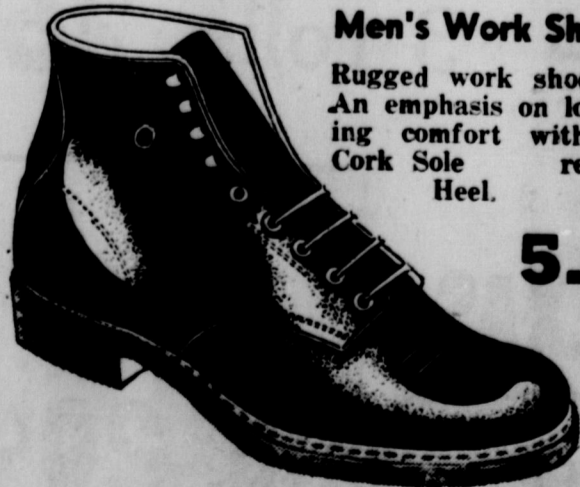
