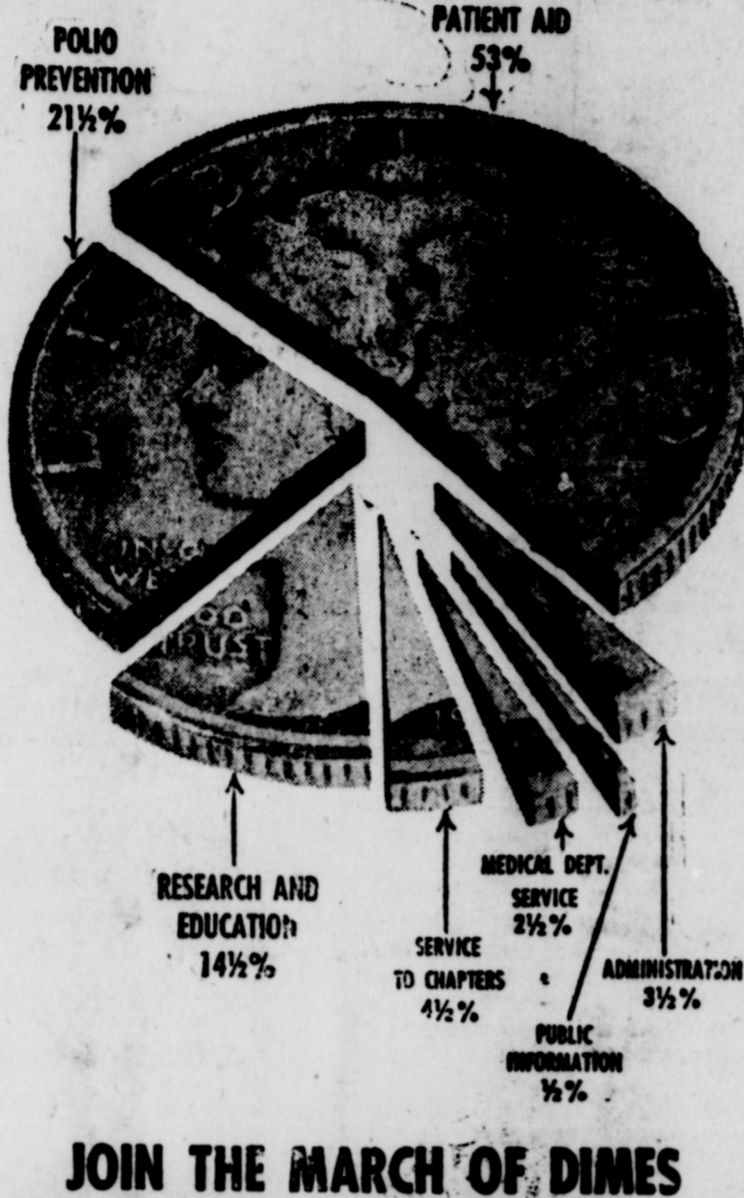

HAVE YOU PAID YOUR POLL TAX

Have you paid your poll tax? If you have lived in Texas a year and in the county six months you are qualified to vote, provided you have paid a poll tax. However, persons 60 years of age or before December 31, 1954 are exempt from paying, and in towns of less than 10,000 population do not have to show an exemption at the polls in order to vote. The poll tax must be paid on or before January 31, and receipts may be issued at the school office in the City Hall at Shamrock or at the office of the county tax assessor-collector at the courthouse in Wheeler. This is the big political year which starts for qualified voters with precinct conventions on May 5, and comes to a climax at the general election, November 6. Have YOU paid your poll tax?

TWO INCH SNOW FELL TUESDAY

The first trace of moisture this year came with the nice two inch snow which started falling early Tuesday morning and continued intermittently until about noon. The wind was nil and the snow fell and stayed pretty well where it hit. Reports from Hollis, Okla., Canadian and surrounding towns indicated the snow was general and varied only slightly in amounts over a wide area of the Panhandle. Drivers were cautioned to proceed with care as all Panhandle roads had icy spots. The Highway Patrol report stated. A few drivers got marked fenders and grille guards by not realizing how slick the footing really was. Some high school boys enjoyed the ice and did car skating on the streets here after the traffic was off Tuesday night. No serious damage had been reported early Wednesday morning. Stockmen say they are in better shape for this type of weather now than they have been for some years as the winter has been so mild, up to now, they have had to feed little or no roughage and cake. They have a good supply of both on hand and would like to see more of the same for a few weeks. Public Service companies reported no trouble with transmission lines icing and no interruption of service due to the snow.

SALK VACCINE AGE EXTENDED

The priority age group for persons eligible to receive Salk polio vaccine has been extended to include all persons under 20 years of age and pregnant women of any age, according to announcement this week by Dr. O. M. Roberts, Wheeler county health officer. Dr. Roberts said the extension was authorized by Dr. Henry A. Hollie, state commissioner of Health, with the approval of the State Poliomyelitis Committee. "The county health officer added: "From the best information so far obtained, there have been 30 per cent less polio cases and 40 per cent less fatalities during the last few months, due to the poliomyelitis injections that have been given during the past year."

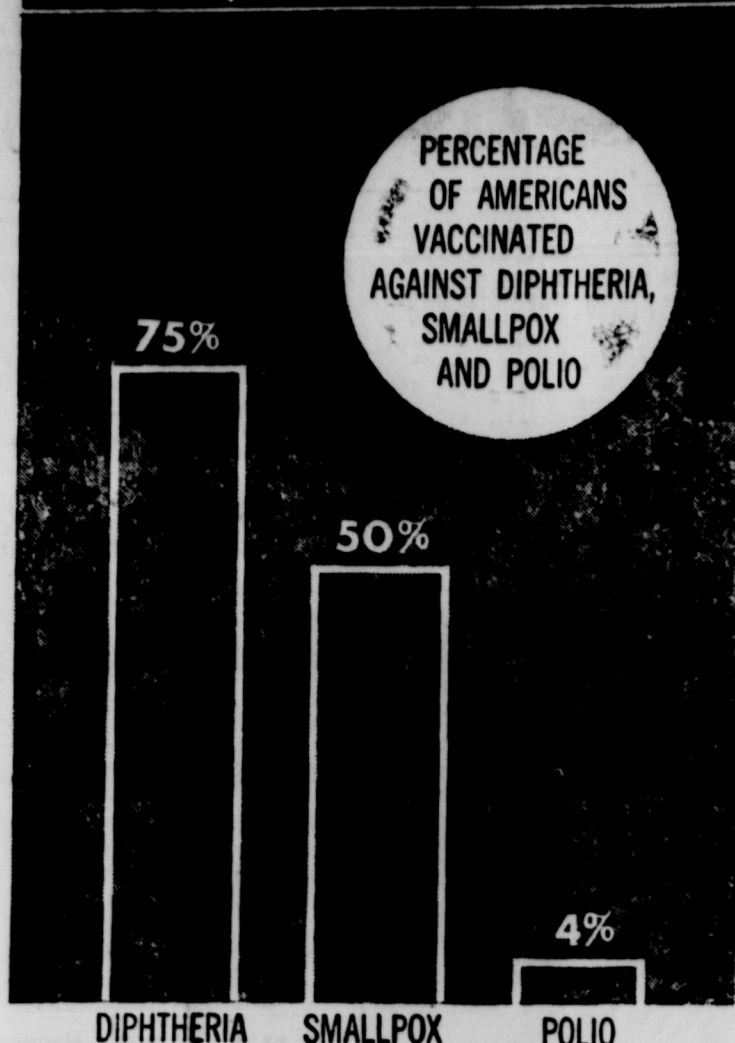

Note: Following is a list of news carried in this issue under date of Jan. 16, 1955. If you like to see what the editor has done for you in the past for your money, Ed. County took advantage of the opportunity offered by the Chamber of Commerce to exhibit at Dallas the Centennial Celebration combined with other counties in this area, in which livestock products, especially Carbon black as the

principal over all theme was decided upon. Plans were progressing nicely for the first Wheeler County Fair Show to be held February 8, 1936. Cliff Weatherly, Chairman of the finance committee, reported that nearly \$100.00 for prize money had been subscribed. In this issue Sheriff Raymond Waters asks for reelection to that office, stating that due to having been too busy with official duties he had not found time to prepare a formal statement. Wheeler Gas Co. had a full page comprehensive financial statement made by H. M. Wiley concerning receipts and disbursements. A clear-cut statement setting forth qualifications for eligibility for employment on WPA work projects was given by the District Director, A. A. Meredith, Amarillo.

"Wheeler's business streets, on the south and west sides of the square are this week receiving an overhauling and grading long overdue. These thoroughfares, surfaced with caliche, had developed a system of "permanent waves" that made travel over them decidedly uncomfortable. Heavy road equipment, consisting of caterpillar tractor and grader, were obtained from the County Precinct 1. The B&PW Club was entertained on Monday evening in the home of Miss Juanita Stone. Some of the members present were Hattie and Leet Womack, Wiletta Templeton, Doris Forrester and Blanche Grainger. and Mrs. Millard Donaldson of the Allison. He arrived Monday, January 13. C. H. Clay Grocery, produce advertisement listed such values as Spuds 20c per peck, Crackers, 2 lbs, 19c, No. 2 Corn, 3 cans, 25c. Porter's Department Store offered as the first sign of Spring, Print dresses at \$1.00 each. J. P. Green and Sons Hardware announced that they had a complete stock of high grade farm needs such as harness, bridles, collars, etc. Rogue Theatre featured such players as Tim McCoy in the The Square Shooter, and Wallace Beery with Lionel Barrymore in AH! Wilderness, elsewhere in that paper was a column entitled "Movie Chatter" by a Rogue. In the Briscoe Bronco where Editor-in-Chief was Winfred Barnes, Associate editor, Ray Wilson, society editor, Valois Evans and Joke editor, Dorothy Lohberger, we see where the girls team won second place at the Mobeetie tournament, and the boys were defeated in a close game with Wheeler on Saturday morning. "A small gas stove has been installed in the bathroom of the home ec. department. This will be very useful to the students and teachers. The home ec. class served a semi-formal buffet supper to the board members and wives, the preachers and their wives and Superintendent Dyer, Wednesday evening. "Mr. and Mrs. Lee Barry of Amarillo are moving into the house previously owned by the Sparks and he will be rural mail carrier. "A piece of sun in a bottle" is what someone once called the heat lamp now being used on many farms to give quick permanent or portable supplementary heat. The modern heat lamp is a most versatile piece of equipment. No larger than a good-sized light bulb, it can be screwed in an ordinary bridge lamp socket, mounted permanently on walls or ceilings, or used in a regular portable fixture designed for the purpose.

Within the farm home one of the recent uses is in the bathrooms or in washrooms located outside the main portion of the house. It is excellent for providing quick, concentrated heat directly upon cold hands while they are being washed in a wash basin. In a bath it gives supplementary heat in areas where the regular method of house heating falls short. Such places might be over the bathtub, over the lavatory, or mounted in ceiling near a north wall. The heat lamp produces an instant but gentle heat and, in addition, gives light as well.

Portable units can be used for drying stockings, helping dry newly painted areas, thawing frozen pipes, heating cold engines, protecting plants from frost, and keeping hands warm while working over a cold work bench.

Because it is low in cost and gives light as well as heat, the most popular heat lamp is the 250 watt R40/1. This lamp contains a built-in reflector that directs the light and heat onto the working surface. The R40/1 costs about one-third less than the 250 watt R40/10 lamp which contains a heat-resistant, hard glass red lens.

The 250 watt R40/10 is adapted to many applications where a soothing, penetrating heat but no light is needed. It resists vibrations, hard knocks and water breakage. The filtered light of this lamp reduces brightness and gives the user a feeling of restfulness. The R40/10 also gives off a soothing restful heat for tired aching muscles.

Heat lamps are easy to install, need no thermostats since one can instantly see when they are lit; and they provide quick, concentrated comfortable heat wherever used.

Wheeler County Soil Conservation District News

The supervisors of the Wheeler Soil Conservation District released their annual report for 1955. This report shows that District cooperators increased substantially the amount of conservation applied to the land over the previous year.

The greatest increases were in conservation of grassland. Range seeding increased from 1,795 acres in 1954 to 4,346 acres in 1955. Proper use of rangeland increased from 5,723 acres to 15,972 and deferred grazing increased from 5,723 to 13,737 acres. These figures are for work done the first time in 1955. Many conservation practices such as proper use of range should be followed every year on the same land. Including all acres where the practice was repeated, 33,000 acres of range was properly used; 21,000 acres were deferred and 14,124 acres of grass have been seeded.

On cropland, 22,800 acres were contour farmed, 12,300 acres of cover crop were seeded, 6,500 acres were stubble mulched, and 9,500 acres have been added to erosion resistant crops such as alfalfa.

Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the district helped cooperating farmers and ranchers to build 40 miles of terraces, 4 miles of diversion terraces, 5 ponds, and 3 acres of water ways in 1955.

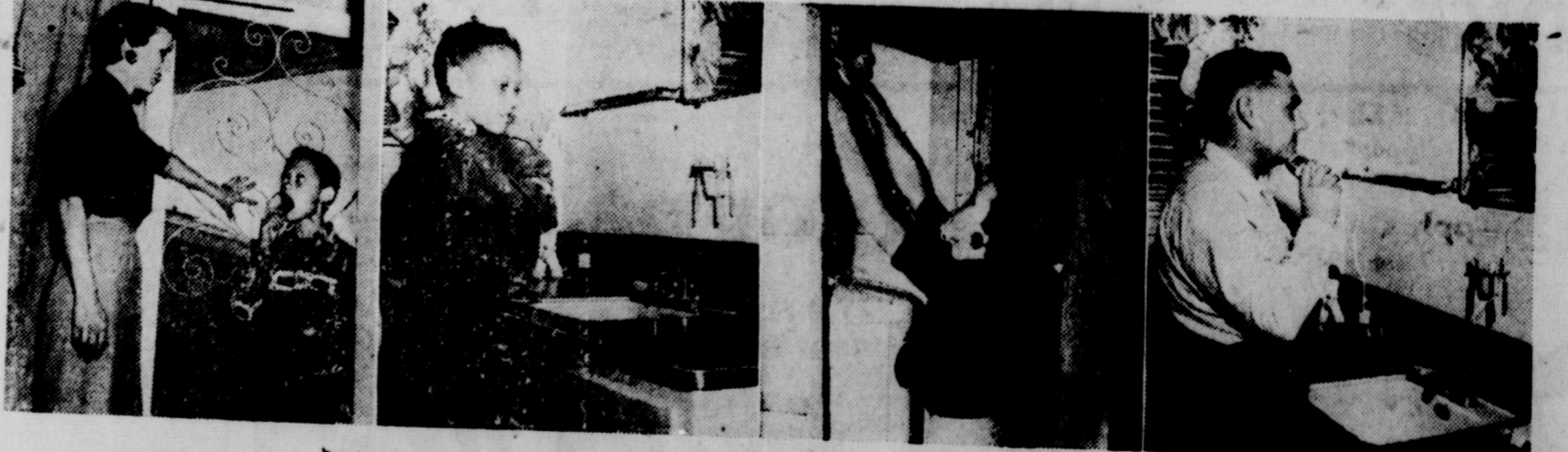

ever. He barley got into World War I in time to be mustered out. Went to work as a cub reporter for the Kansas City Journal, along with Tim Collins, the Kemper Bank public relations man and after-dinner speaker.

A year later he decided to go to college and was graduated in four years from the University of Illinois. He went back to the Journal, but in a few months got a job with Editor Gene Howe of Atchison, Kans., who was starting a paper in Amarillo, Texas. He has been with the Amarillo operation ever since; is now editor and publisher of the Daily News, the morning paper, and is an officer and commentator for the newspaper's radio subsidiary. He is probably the oldest radio newsman in Texas in point of service, having started broadcasting news in 1928. Radio is a sideline with him now, but he is on the air regularly.

He is married and has two children. His son is chief of the KGNC news room, having taken over many of his father's duties. His daughter, also married, lives in Albuquerque, N. M. He has four grand children. He has been in Amarillo for nearly 29 years and has seen the town grow from nearly 18,000 to the present population of about 100,000.

He is a finished after-dinner speaker in his own right and all who attend are assured of an enjoyable and profitable evening.
