**COCA-COLA NOT
 INTENDED TO BE
 BOTTLED DRINK**

Shamrock this week will help
 launch a new bottle that may well
 go round the world eventually.

The 12-oz. king-size Coca-Cola
 bottle, now going on sale here, is
 a "big-brother" to the present
 6½ oz. bottle, which is known
 from Shamrock to Bangkok and
 back again.

Its fame is such that, during
 World War II, a German prisoner
 stepping off the gangplank at an
 American port spotted a familiar
 sign, turning to an MP, said: "I
 see you have Coca-Cola, too."

The soft drink is sold in over
 70 countries, according to W. Y.
 Burden, president of the Coca-
 Cola Bottling Company of Sham-
 rock. "Just about everywhere," he
 added, "except behind the Iron
 Curtain."

But in at least one instance the
 Curtain was pierced, Mr. Burden
 pointed out. That was when Mr.
 Eisenhower sent Marshall Zhukov
 a case of Coca-Cola after the
 Soviet military leader enjoyed a
 bottle during the Potsdam Con-
 ference.

Mr. Burden said definitely the

"big-brother" would not replace
 the standard-size bottle, destined
 in 1915 at the recommendation of
 a bottling official who urged: "We
 need a Coca-Cola bottle which a
 person will recognize even if he
 feels in the dark. It should be so
 shaped that, even if broken, a per-
 son could tell at a glance what it
 was."

Although, about 80% of all the
 Coca-Cola sold is in bottles the
 man who invented the drink never
 intended it to be more than a
 soda fountain beverage. In 1886
 John S. Pemberton, a druggist,
 prepared a soft drink syrup in his
 back yard in Atlanta, Ga., using
 a three-legged iron pot heated by
 a wood fire.

He took a jug of the syrup to
 Jacob's Pharmacy at the historic
 Five Points, where soda water
 was added and the new drink put
 on sale.

The first year only 25 gallons
 were sold, bringing in \$50. Of this,
 Pemberton spent \$47, on advertis-
 ing. Most of its consisted of oil
 cloth signs pinned to drug store
 awnings.

When Pemberton died two years
 later, rights to Coca-Cola were
 bought by a 27-year-old wholesale
 drug salesman, Asa Candler.

"Back in Candler's day The Coca-
 Cola Company changed officers
 several times," Mr. Burden said.

"One time when it moved, a one
 horse wagon carried all the firm's
 equipment and furniture."

Candler was a keen merchandis-
 er. He originated the Coca-Cola
 poster and calendar, using Lil-
 lian Russell's picture on one of
 them. He was the first to use the
 slogan, "Delicious and Refreshing,"
 which appeared in 1889. And to
 get the public acquainted with the
 new drink, he gave away millions
 of tickets for free cokes.

"They tell me in Atlanta, Mr.
 Burden said. "That even today
 someone comes across one of these
 tickets in an attic. If they send
 it in they get a free case of Coca-
 Cola."

It was 13 years after Pembro-
 ton invented Coca-Cola before the
 drink was bottled. A young Chat-
 tanooga lawyer, Ben Thomas, who
 had come across a bottled drink
 in Cuba during the Spanish-Ameri-
 can War, hit upon the idea. He
 and another lawyer, Joseph White-
 head, went to Atlanta and asked
 Candler if they could bottle Coca-
 Cola.

Candler, busy with his soda
 fountain sales, gave the bottling
 rights to practically the entire
 country. This was one of the most
 amazing contracts in history —
 Thomas and Whitehead didn't pay
 a cent. And the man who had
 given them a letter of introduction

to Candler didn't think enough of
 the product to ask for even a
 single share for himself.

Mr. Burden pointed out the
 early bottling equipment was far
 different from today's. "Bottles
 were washed by dropping buck-
 ets in them and whirling in
 water. They also used those old
 fashioned machines equipped with
 a brush to scour the bottles.

Coca-Cola was the first soft
 drink company to use coolers.
 "The early ones were actually
 wooden barrels, sawed in half, to
 make tubs," Mr. Burden said. "The
 first electric coolers came out in
 1933."

Mr. Burden thinks the secret
 of Coca-Cola's success is best
 summed up the way the trademark
 is phonetically translated from
 Chinese. In China, where Coca-
 Cola is a popular drink, it means:
 "Make man mouth happy."

**News Letter From
CONGRESSMAN
WALTER ROGERS**

It would be most difficult to express in words the feeling one has as he gets on an airplane in Helsinki, Finland, for conveyance to a point behind the Iron Curtain. It can certainly be said that the entire operation is surrounded by the deepest mystery and this passenger felt somewhat like he was taking part in a foreign episode. In any event you are in a state of suspended animation not knowing what will happen next.

The airport at Helsinki is an excellent installation and is served by several airlines connecting with the Western countries. Its only connection with Russia and the Eastern countries is by the airline owned by the USSR and named Aeroflot. The Finnish Airlines are not allowed to go into Russia nor are any other airlines from the Western countries. You may fly any of the several airlines serving Helsinki from many points to Helsinki, but when you reach this destination you must change over to Aeroflot if you are authorized to go behind the Curtain. We were scheduled to depart Helsinki at 3:15 p.m. for Leningrad. We were all waiting for the arrival of the Russian planes hoping to get some pictures. I had a movie camera and was all prepared to take pictures.

Instead of one plane, there were three, all the same type. They all carried the Russian emblem and came in almost simultaneously. I began shooting pictures and discovered my camera wouldn't operate. I took a quick glance inside and discovered that I had done something wrong and the entire roll of film was a twisted mass and the camera had jammed. I began to hunt for a dark room where I could take the film out and save as much as possible. The only place I could find that was not brilliantly lighted was the men's room.

I can testify without fear of successful contradiction that trying to remove twisted film from a jammed camera in a Finnish men's room is no pleasant task. I had the door locked and almost got in trouble with some of the other passengers. I finally got some of the other film out and tried to insert another roll but the camera had definitely jammed and I missed getting any pictures of the first Russian plane that I had seen. So I put the camera in the case and tried to forget it.

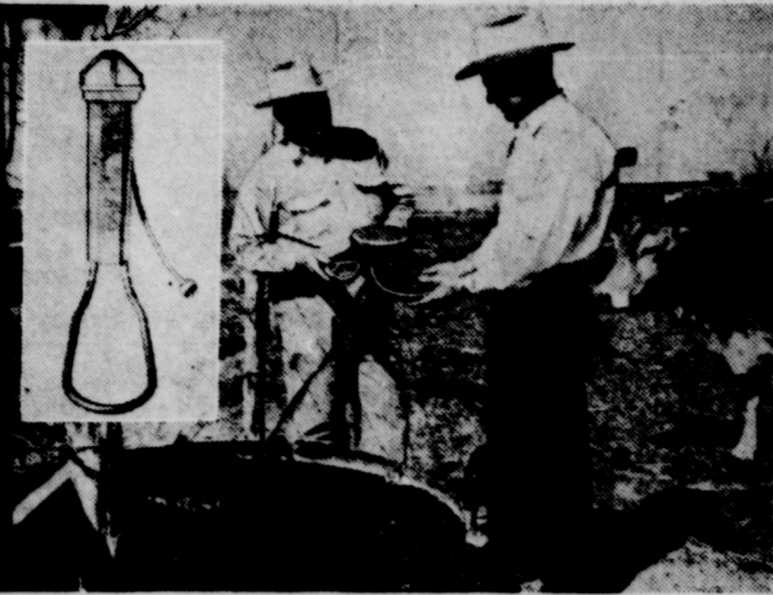
After approval of our papers we were admitted to a room from which we were later to depart for the airplane. This room was filled with many types of people who were traveling to or returning to the Soviet Union. After another round of processing we were led to the plane by a Russian hostess. One member of the party started around the front of the plane and the hostess with the speed of a quarterhorse herded him back into the fold and left no doubt in his mind that he was to proceed where she led.

The plane was very similar to a DC-3 type of plane, that is two motored and about the same size. Some of these planes have tricycle landing gear and others have a tail wheel exactly like the DC-3. The furnishings inside of the plane were typically Russian in design, color and texture. Much different from the furnishings in our planes. There were no seat belts which disturbed us to some extent. As soon as we were aboard, the motors were started and we took off without any further ado. There were no announcements or instructions of any kind, in fact we did not see anyone nor did we hear from anyone. We were quickly airborne and climbed to about 3 thousand feet. The trip in was uneventful except that we undertook to determine exactly when we passed behind the Iron Curtain. We watched for the border but were unable to discern it due to a haze. However, we were able to approximate our crossing by time. There was nothing unusual about the countryside except that there were no cities or towns in sight and we did not see any for a long time.

As we approached Leningrad we noted many railroad tracks and many trains. Where they were going I do not know, but most of them appeared to be freight trains. We landed in Leningrad in due order where we were met by some Russian officials both men and women. The airport building is about 200 yards from the landing field. The two are connected by a wide flower bordered concrete strip. We were escorted into the building and into a special room where our baggage was examined by customs officials and we were required to sign certain declarations as to what we were carrying.

One of the officials spoke English very well and I asked him a number of questions. One was, "Where and how do you buy any articles that you desire?" His answer was, "You buy anything you want anywhere at any time". As an afterthought he added the

The electric stock tank water warmer acts as its own sentinel twenty-four hours a day — and night, and is on guard against sudden drops in temperature. You are assured that your cows will have the right temperature water at all times. You are assured the profits that otherwise would be lost.

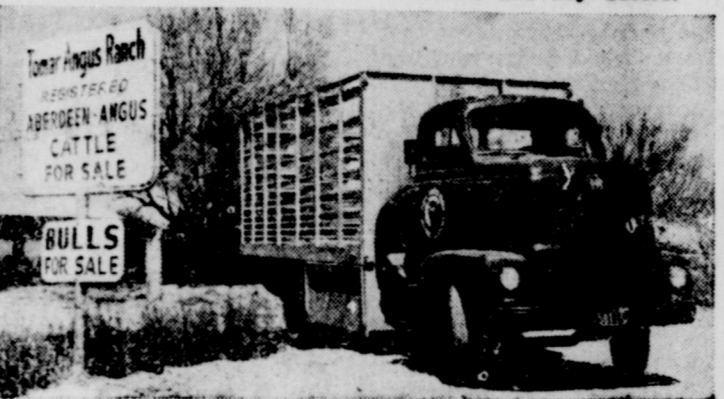

TREE SEEDLINGS AVAILABLE NOW

The Texas Forest Service has announced that anyone in the Panhandle of Texas will be able to order tree seedlings from the county agents office or the home demonstration agents office again this year. These seedlings are eligible to be planted on farms, state land, federal land, or municipal, county or other public land. Orders will be turned in at the county Extension offices and when the seedlings arrive, they will come to the county Extension offices and be picked up by the purchaser. No order for less than a total of 100 trees or 50 of one species will be accepted and payment must be remitted with the order. Trees must be ordered before March 1, 1956 and all orders will

be delivered between March 1-5, 1956. Everyone desiring tree seedlings should place their order as soon as possible.

Under this special Panhandle offer, the following seedlings are available: Ponderosa Pine, Red Cedar, and Chinese Elm. The price is \$1.50 per 100 seedlings. Each person who orders seedlings must agree to plant the trees for windbreak purposes; to refrain from using or seedlings for ornamental purposes; and to protect the planting from fire, cattle, and other destructive agents insofar as possible.

Persons who want the below listed varieties of seedlings can order them in the same manner as those listed above and they will be delivered postpaid to the person sending in the order. Other seedlings varieties are: Arizona Cypress, Austrain Pine, Cottonwood, Honey Locust, Mulberry, Osage orange, and Russian Olive.

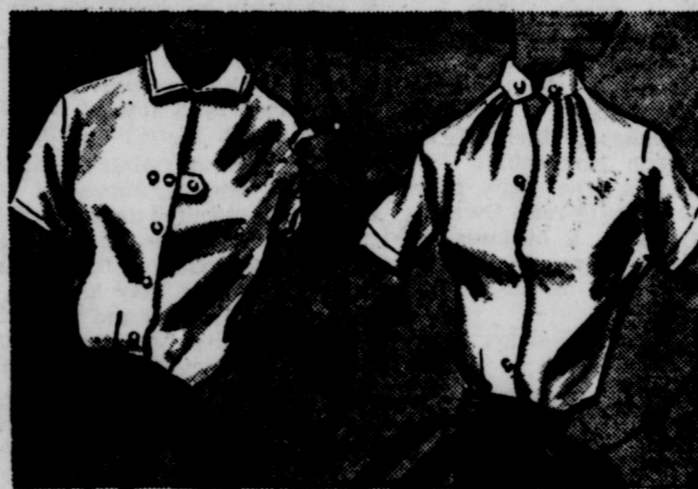

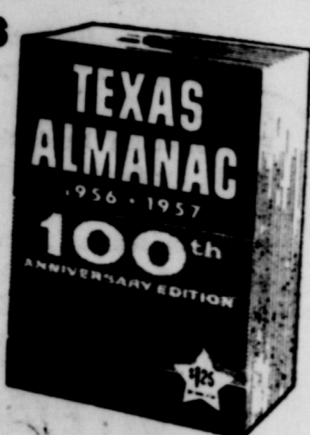

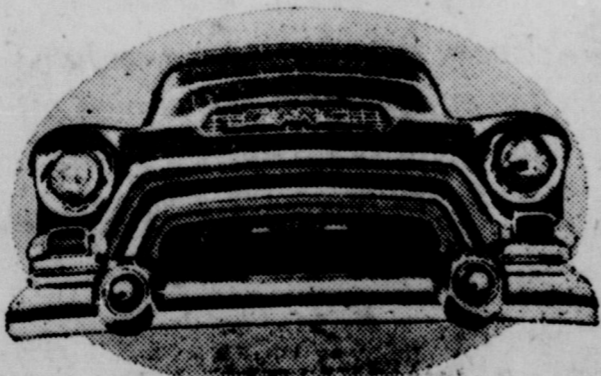

street car or a vehicle shall drive over an unprotected hose of a fire department when laid down on a street, private driveway, or street car track, to be used at any fire or alarm of fire, without the consent of the fire department officials in command.

"Section 143. Penalties (b) Every person convicted of a misdemeanor for violation of the provision of this act for which another penalty is not provided shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00

"Anyone who violates the law in either case as above set out may be prosecuted in either the City Court or in the Justice Court having jurisdiction of the offense. And a complaint may be filed in either of said courts and prosecuted by the City Attorney or the County Attorney. The complaint may be filed by the fire marshal, any fireman, or any interested citizen."

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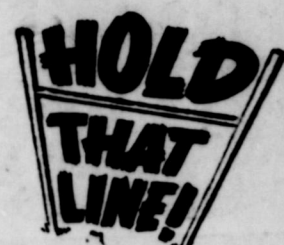
