**FREE PAMPHLET AT POST OFFICE**

Helpful facts about wrapping and shipping packages are contained in a well illustrated pamphlet "Package and Wrapping for Mailing" available free at the Wheeler Post Office October 15, 1955, Postmaster Virgil Jamison, announced today.

A new publication excerpted from the Postal Manual, this pamphlet describes the types and sizes of cartons best suited for outer and inner shipping containers; gives details for the internal protection for goods being shipped; lists hints on wrapping chinaware, stemware, framed pictures, books, and other goods; and gives instructions for making various types of parcels to insure the quickest possible delivery.

Written instructions are highlighted by numerous illustrations showing how to wrap and tie packages securely. Drawings of various types of containers and boxes and the best way to use protective material to guard goods against breakage are also used.

The Postmaster emphasized that much of the delay in delivery of parcels, particularly at Christmas, and most of the damage enroute is due to lack of knowledge of basic rules to follow in mailing packages.

"I have patrons of the Wheeler Post Office will avail themselves of free pamphlets, which will answer most of their mailing questions, demonstrate the best methods of packing goods, and help the postal employees throughout the nation in their important work of moving the huge volume of Christmas parcels," Mr. Jamison said.

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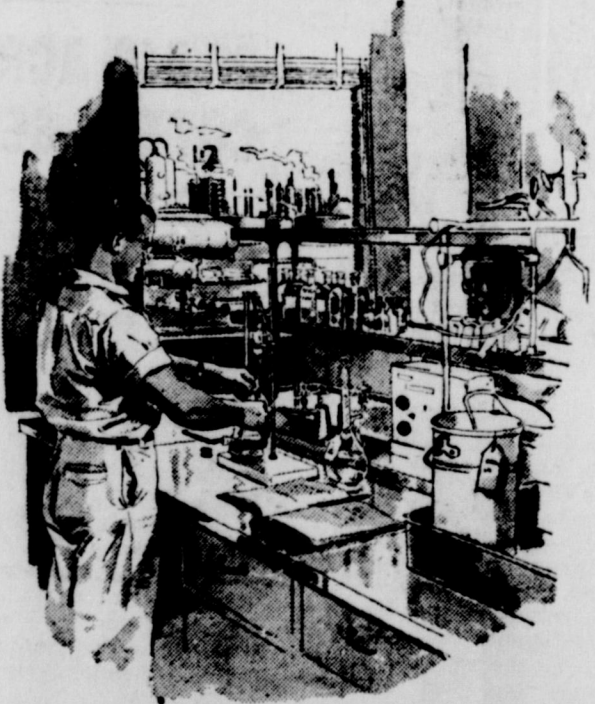

BROWN, GANDY AT MEETING

While desegregation may not be a problem for the Wheeler school district for several years, a helpful suggested program for handling intergration when the time arrives was brought home by A. E. Brown, Wheeler school superintendent, and Geo. Gandy, board president, from the meeting last Friday and Saturday of the Texas Association of School Boards held in Austin.

Desegregation was the principal topic during the two day session, high-lighted by a message from Dr. Frederick Eby, professor of the history and philosophy of education at the University of Texas.

Dr. Eby said intergration is not a matter for the politicians to play with, but a problem to be solved by educators. He offered these suggestions:

- 1. Recognize the Supreme Court's decision as the law of the land and take such measures as are necessary to eradicate the evils of segregation.
2. Suggest that the State Board of Education order the local districts to comply with the law as soon as practicable.
3. Send Negro students in sparse population areas to integrated schools immediately.

## FHA INCREASES FARMER CREDIT

Further improvements in credit services to farmers are being made by the Farmers Home Administration.

Walter T. McKay, the agency's Texas state director, said today. Improvements in the management of the agency's operations were discussed at a training meeting held in St. Louis, Mo., recently which Mr. McKay attended. Farmers Home Administration officials attending the meeting

were urged to take every step possible to further increase the participation by private lenders and insured by the agency along with funds appropriated by Congress are used by farmers to buy, and operate family-type farms.

"With the expansion in our activities that has taken place in the last two years it is more important than ever before that we place our operations in high gear and give prompt and careful attention to every loan application," McKay said.

The increased cost of developing farming systems that will make full use of farm family's land and labor resources and provide a good income, and the emergency conditions brought on by the drought, were the main reason for the increase in agricultural loans made last year.

Wheeler and Hemphill Counties are served through the Wheeler FHA Office in the Courthouse in Wheeler. Two new employees have been added to the staff in the Wheeler office, to speed up our loan program. Mrs. Lavada Helton of Wheeler is Assistant County Office Clerk, and William C. Houchin of Dalhart, formerly from Pampa, is Assistant County Supervisor. Mr. Houchin is now living in Mobeetie. John Manning, County Supervisor, states that applications can now be serviced with greater speed and efficiency than has been possible in the past.

Mr. Manning and Mr. Houchin will be in the office at Wheeler each Monday for interviews, and to review the farmer's needs.

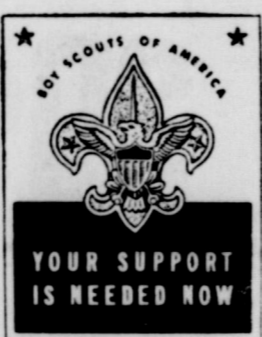

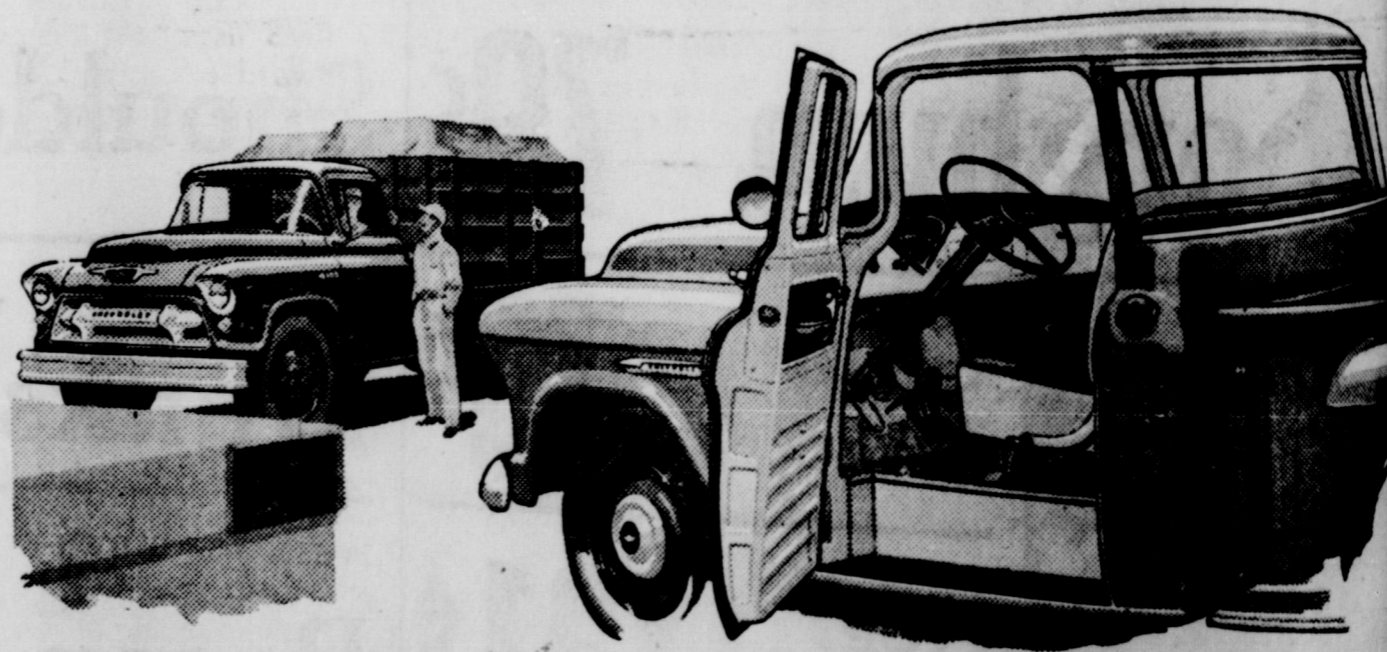
