fought to preserve liberty and to keep the Union intact. It was re-

garded as a sacred duty of the nation, and the nation kept faith with

In those days, as now, were many who had been disabled by the struggle. Their ability to compete in life had been reduced by wounds suffered in battle. Even as a boy I remember hearing how it seemed

they were thought of only on such days as Memorial Day, when orators, fervent in their patriotism, remembered, if only for a day, the long continuing sacrifice made not by those who had died in battle, but by the disabled who were to live for many years following

The heroes of World War I and World War II and the Korean

War are, of course, men who, with no concern for themselves, gave

their lives that freedom might live. We can never do them adequate honor. And, we must never forget them. They died in their young life, forsaking the opportunities of the years that the rest of us might

However, there are other living heroes who deprived themselves of either physical, emotional, or mental health for us and for their fellow countrymen. It would be as wrong for us to neglect or forget them as their buddies who today sleep on some Pacific Island or in a European cemetery. A hero dead or a hero maimed and disabled are both due our equal gratitude and our unceasing devotion.

We must never forget that the most effective way of honoring those who have died is to remember the living disabled, that their lives may be rich and full. They are a great asset to our country as the living embodiment of devotion to freedom. A country is recreant indeed which does not everlastingly keep alive grateful appreciation to those

who suffered disability to perpetuate everything that we Americans







in Establishing FUTURE Cotton Allotments IF YOU do NO PLANT or RELEASE Your 1956 Cotton Acres

If you have a 1956 Cotton Allotment and do not plan to Plant all it, you can RELEASE ALL or ANY PART of it BEFORE May 29 at still receive the SAME CREDIT next year as if you had planted it all.

If you release acreage it can be re-apportioned to other farms in the County. By this method you and WHEELER County will NOT B PENALIZED. You must release this acreage ON or BEFORE May 29.

Future Cotton Allotments WILL be BASED ON PLANTED COTTO ACRES in Wheeler County. If allotted and not planted they work again you in future allotments.


