Rates to Go U As many of you know the present owners of The

Times decided six weeks ago to put the property up for sale because rising costs had made continued publication unprofitable, as far as the present owners are concerned. In all cases, prospective buyers have said they could

not undertake operation of The Times under its prevailing advertising rates. Costs of hiring employees and of buying paper material were prohibitive at the low rate in effect. Without exception these newspaper men said it would be impossible for them to set their operating costs low enough to permit a reasonable rate of return on the investment.

There is presently one experienced man considering purchase of The Times. We have discussed the advertising structure with him in detail and are fully agreed that raising of the rate to a level in keeping with the expense factor, is a must, whether we continue to publish The Times or whether we sell it. We can no longer delay for fear of what attitude the business men of Wheeler will take. It is absolutely necessary, if we or anybody else publishes a paper in Wheeler.

And so, effective December 1, the publishers are raising the advertising rate on an average of from 5c to 10c per column inch. Each advertiser will be charged on the basis of his earned rate each calendar month and there can be no deviations.

The new local rate will be 50c per column inch. Earned monthly rates will be as follows;

45c if 5 inches or more is run every week in the month or 170 inches in the calendar month.

40c if 20 inches or more is run every week of the month or 200 inches in the calendar month.

40c an inch on re-run of same ad; also 40c on standing monthly cards.

(For the benefit of readers who are unfamiilar with methods of figuring advertising space and charges, an advertising rate of 40c a column inch makes a full page ad in The Times cost \$56, 1/2 page cost \$28 and 1/4 page, \$14.)

Advertising in The Times or any good newspaper is the cheapest and best advertising a local merchant can buy. It would cost \$15 in postage alone to mail a circular to the subscriber of The Times, for instance, if a merchant had the names of its paid subscribers which of course, he does not have. It would cost several times that much in postage to send circulars or postcards to all boxholders in the territory in order to put one in the hands of every Times' subscriber.

Recognized merchandising authorities say a newspaper advertisement has six times the potential readers of the same advertisement on a free circular. And the buying power of an average paid subscriber to a newspaper is several times that of a non-newspaper reader.
