HIGHWAY TOLL IN PANHANDLE 8 IN OCTOBER

On the eve of nationally publicized Safe Driving Day which has been proclaimed by President Eisenhower for December 1 the Texas Highway Patrol in the Panhandle district announced eight persons were killed and 87 injured in highway accidents they investigated during October.

Property damage was estimated at \$99,299.00.

These figures do not include those which occurred in cities over 2,500 population.

During the corresponding month of last year, 15 persons were killed, 66 injured and property damage totaled \$84,350.00.

During the first 10 months of this year, 81 persons have been killed, 685 injured and property damage totals \$703,058.00. For (Continued on last page)

Christmas Seals, Pleads Dr. Nicholson

Dr. H. E. Nicholson of Wheeler, president of the Wheeler County Tuberculosis association, this week called on the public to join the fight to stamp out the dread disease by liberally supporting the annual Christmas Seal Sale now in progress.

Asserting the best way each individual can help fight tuberculosis is purchasing the colorful Christmas seals, Dr. Nicholson warned the public that tuberculosis is a communicable disease which can

invade any home in Wheeler county at any time.

"Modern methods of treatment," Dr. Nicholson said, "have steadily reduced the death toll from tuberculosis." He pointed out, however, that in 1954 the disease claimed the lives of 910 persons in Texas and its economic cost remains a heavy burden to the taxpayers.

Two sheets of seals worth \$1.00 each are being mailed to every person in the county whose name and address can be obtained. The seals are accompanied by letters asking the recipients to forward payment to: Wheeler County TB Association, Wheeler, Texas.

By having a local, active association, 80 per cent of each \$1.00 received from the sale of Christmas Seals is kept in the county to help combat the spread of the disease. The other 20 per cent goes to the national association to be used in research work.

This is the tenth annual sale sponsored by the county association, which was founded by Dr. Nicholson, who has served continually as its president.

NEW TAG RULE ON TRAILERS

A new ruling pertaining to license tags for trailers and semi-trailers, effective December 1, has been announced by Thurman Rives, Wheeler county tax assessor and collector.

All trailers and semi-trailers having a gross weight of 4,000 pounds and over must have serial numbers on the vehicle, and each number must be shown on the license receipt, said Rives. This will have to be compiled with before a license receipt can be issued.

The serial numbers may be obtained at the tax collector's office in Wheeler.

The assigning of these serial numbers to those trailers with a gross weight of 4,000 pounds or more is a requirement but if any one desires a serial number for smaller trailers or semi trailers it may be obtained the same way by making application at the tax collector's office.

The assigning of these numbers will be carried on in the tax collector's office until the re-registration period is over and then it will be done by the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT SALK VACCINE

Q. What is polio?

A. It's full name is poliomyelitis (once known familiarly as infantile paralysis), and it is a communicable disease caused by a virus. It occurs mostly between April and November and is usually a mild sickness, with symptoms much like those of a summer cold. The first signs of polio might be sniffles, a little fever, sore throat, headache, upset stomach, crankiness, or sore muscles. Most cases of polio do not get worse than this and never actually appear to be polio. However, if the virus gets into the patient's nervous system, it may cause paralysis of some part of the body.

Q. Is this serious effect what the

Salk polio vaccine prevents?

A. Yes. The purpose of vaccine is to prevent paralytic polio by keeping the virus away from the central nervous system.

Q. Is the polio vaccine safe?

A. It is safe as medical science and the finest biological laboratories can make it. No one can guarantee the absolute safety of any vaccine, but the latest systems of testing and double-checking the polio vaccine afford are maximum degree of safety.

Q. How much protection does the polio vaccine give?

A. The report of the 1954 Field Trials judged the vaccine to be 60% effective against Type I polio, and 70-90% effective against Type II and III, and since that time much work has been going on to improve its effectiveness toward 100%.

Q. How does this polio vaccine work?

A. It stimulates the production of antibodies against polio in the bloodstream. These are the same antibodies that would appear in the bloodstream naturally if the person had suffered a case of polio. However, it is much better to build up the antibodies beforehand in a careful, regulated manner, while the person is well. Then, even if a strong infection of polio virus gets into the bloodstream, the person has sufficient advance protection. The antibodies are already there, and they can neutralize the infecting virus. Thus the virus does not enter the nervous system and does not cause paralysis.

Q. Does the vaccine always "take"?

A. No vaccine gives immunity every time.

Q. What is meant by "types" and "strains" of virus?

A. Polio is caused by three main types of polio virus. Within each type there are various strains, many given individual names by research workers. However for most of us it is enough to know that there are three types. The importance of this is that a person must be immunized against all three of them, for immunity to one does not give protection against all three of them, for immunity to one does not protect against the others. The Salk polio vaccine is made of all three types.

Q. How soon after inoculation does the vaccine begin to give some immunity?

A. The first protective antibodies do begin to appear in the bloodstream within a week or ten days after the first inoculation and immunity will slowly build up for one or two weeks after that time. Full protection should not be expected until after the entire series of three inoculations has been given.

Q. Why do people have to have three shots of the polio vaccine?

A. This is not a new idea in vaccines. For years people have been getting three injections of vaccines for various diseases because it takes that many to achieve maximum immunity. In the case of polio vaccine, one shot does not give enough protection. Two produce stronger immunity, and the third, or "booster", shot steps up the immunity and makes it last longer.

Q. How far apart should the three shots of polio be given?

A. The spacing of the shots should be decided by the physician. However, experience has shown that the second shot can be effective any time from two weeks to about six months after the first shot. The third shot seems to work best if it is held off for at least seven months after the first one or before the be-

ginning of the next season.

Q. How long does the protection from three shots of polio vaccine last?

A. It will take time to discover this accurately. Experts estimate it should last about two and a half years. Perhaps after that time, "booster" shots will again be advised.

Q. Is there a simple test to tell whether a person is immune to polio?

A. Not yet. There are tests, but they require special laboratory facilities, and are very expensive.

Q. Can people who have allergies safely be vaccinated against polio?

A. The physician performing the vaccination should decide, but thus far no troublesome allergic reactions to the vaccine have been noted, not even when a group of highly sensitive adults volunteered to take the shots or when a group of sensitive children were tested. Any substances in the vaccine to which a person might be sensitive appear to be present in such slight traces as to be harmless.

Q. Should a child be vaccinated when he has a cold or other minor illness?

A. No, it is usually not advisable. Q. Should children who have been in close contact with polio cases be

vaccinated?

A. Usually not. As a rule, persons in close contact with a case of polio are already infected and there would not be sufficient time for the polio vaccine to benefit them.

Q. Should children be vaccinated while there is an epidemic in their community?

A. This is up to the health department and the local organized medical profession. If the mass immunization programs are undertaken the physicians may exclude some children for individual reasons.

Q. Is the vaccine treatment for children who are suffering illness from polio?

A. No, it is only a preventive for paralytic polio.

Q. Should a person who had polio and recovered be vaccinated?

A. Yes, as pointed out, there are three types of polio and having a case of one type will not confer immunity against the other two. The vaccine is aimed at giving immunity to all three types.

Q. How can parents get the vaccine?

A. In all communities you can go to your family physician.

Q. If parents can pay their own physician, why can't he vaccinate anyone in the family who wants to

be vaccinated?

A. The vaccine is still scarce, and all the authorities involved in administering it have agreed that it should go first to those who need it most.

Q. Who decides which groups need it most?

A. The priority groups are recommended by the National Advisory Committee on Poliomyelitis Vaccine, which is made up of representatives of national organizations concerned with this problem, such as the American Medical Association, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, and others. They take into consideration (1) how much vaccine has been produced and approved, (2) which people in the nation's population are most susceptible to polio, and other factors. In addition, there are advisory committees in each state who consider the local problems of their state.

Q. What groups have the priorities?

A. The very first polio vaccine available to the public was distributed by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and at that time the vaccine was given only to children in the 1st and 2nd grades. The next priority group, named by the National Advisory Committee on Poliomyelitis Vaccine, was chil-

dren aged 5 through 9. Eventually it is expected to give priority to all children under 20 and to pregnant women.

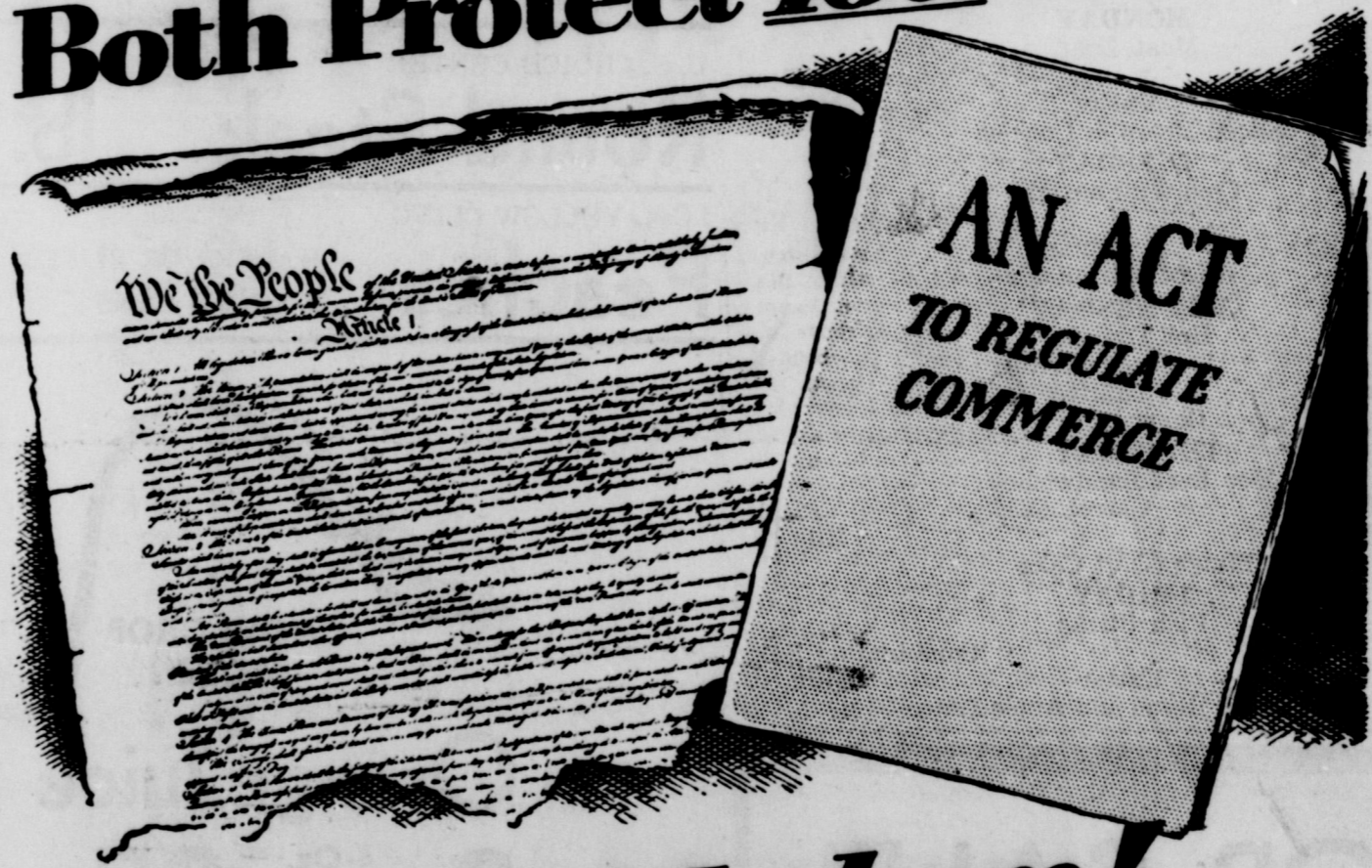
A gift was presented to Mrs. Daisy Thomas and a handkerchief from each member was given to Mrs. Viola Williams who has moved away.

Wheeler County Soil Conservation District News

Pastures rested through the growing season this year have shown a lot of improvement. They have produced seed and seedling plants are plentiful. F. M. Grimes rested all his land south of Mobeetie. T. A. Treadkimer deferred a section of grassland near Briscie and Harry Wofford deferred all of his place west of Wheeler. This rest has largely overcome the bad effects of the drought.

Paul George has just completed four dug-out tanks near Magic City. These tanks make good permanent stock water in sandy bottomland where dams cannot be used.

Bus Dorman has completed a diversion terrace on his place south of Wheeler.

Grass seeded this spring on C. J. Van Zandt's place west of Wheeler looks very good. Over 4000 acres were seeded in the district this year and most of it is well established.

SAVINGS BOND SALES CLIMB THIS COUNTY

Sound financial condition of Wheeler county is reflected in U. S. Savings Bonds sales for the first nine months of 1955 which place Wheeler high among counties of the Panhandle.

Wheeler county residents purchased 97.9 per cent of their 1955 bond quota for the entire year, during nine months, according to Jesse L. Adams, area sales manager. The 1955 quota is \$220,000, and up to the end of September, bond purchases amounted to \$215,271.

The next highest percentage of buying in comparison with set quotas was in Hemphill County. Residents of that county purchased \$136,735 worth of bonds during nine months against a quota of \$145,000.

Throughout District Two, the 1955 quota was 84 per cent complete in nine months. Sales in the district, totaled \$1,718,730, compared with a quota of \$2,025,000.

Sales throughout Texas showed an increase of 20 per cent and the state quota was 73 per cent complete at the end of the nine months. Sales totaled \$147,370,000, compared with a quota of \$210,000,000.

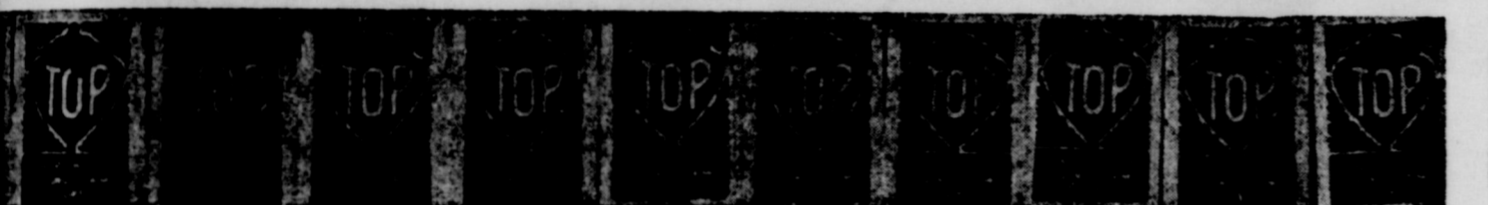

S-D DAY IS SCHEDULED DECEMBER 1

Practice makes perfect. So the nation's auto drivers were urged today to practice for the next 7 days to insure a "perfect" performance on S-D Day.

The second national observance of Safe-Driving Day, sponsored by the President's Committee for Traffic Safety, will be held on December 1 in an attempt to prove that voluntary individual and community action can hold traffic death and injuries well below the normal toll.

In asking that the next 6 days be used as a practice period, safety leaders hoped that the S-D Day record this year would show an improvement over the 15 per cent reduction in deaths achieved on S-D Day last year.

One good way to practice, according to the experts, is to observe the driving errors of others for the next 6 days. By watching the mistakes of other drivers, the rules of the road and the dangers in failing to follow them are brought home much more forcibly.

Here are some potentially dangerous driver actions to watch for:

1. Excessive speed, especially at night, in bad weather, and in heavy traffic.
2. Passing several cars at once, or on hills, curves and intersections where there is not a clear view ahead.
3. Following too closely.
4. Weaving and sudden lane changing.
5. Sudden stops.
6. Turning from the wrong lane.
7. Passing on the right, except on multi-lane highways where it is permitted.
8. Speeding through traffic lights on the yellow.
9. Jackrabbit starts with other drivers.
10. Failure to observe especially making rolling intersections.

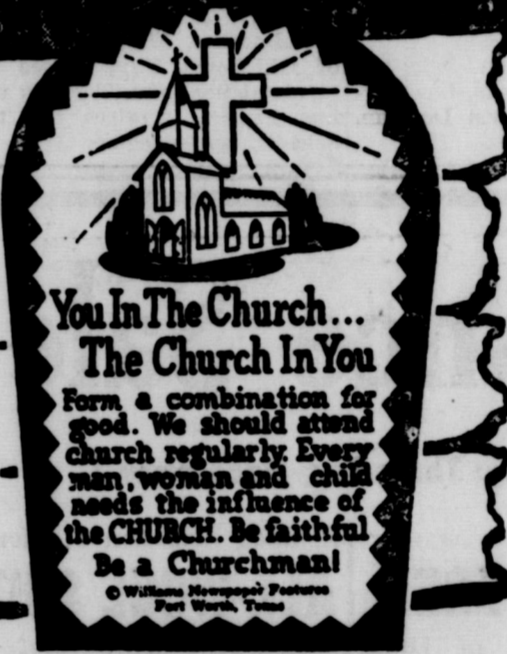

same period in 1954, there were 76 killed, 555 injured, with property damage amounting to \$694,902.00.

Of the accidents investigated during October, 98 occurred on state and federal highways, 22 on farm-to-market roads, 19 on county roads and 11 in towns of less than 2,500 population.

Principal violations as causative factors, listed in the order of their number were: speeding, driving while drinking, failure to grant right-of-way, miscellaneous hazardous violations and improper passing.

In carrying out their basic duties of traffic law enforcement, the 21 patrolmen of this district, composed of the 26 Panhandle Counties, performed the following activities during the month: investigated 150 traffic accidents; made 681 traffic arrests, including 321 for speeding and 36 for driving while intoxicated; issued 1,580 warnings for hazardous violations; served 19 safety responsibility police demand orders and made seven investigations for restoration of driver's license.

The patrolmen worked 3,333 day hours and 2,033 night hours, and travelled 82,253 miles.

A. New Trailers: (1) Sellers invoice-recording serial number.

B. Out of State Trailers: (1) Out of state registration receipt. (2) Out of state title if issued.

C. Shop Built or not currently registered trailers: (1) Bill of Sale, affidavit of construction or affidavit of ownership as of December 1, 1955.

D. Renewal of Texas registered trailers: (1) Previous years registration receipt showing serial number. (2) If no manufacturer's serial number is affixed to trailer,

must obtain assigned number. (Owners own serial numbers are not acceptable.)

Sheriff, urges all pedestrians and motorists alike to adhere to the traffic regulations in an endeavor to hold traffic accidents to an absolute minimum on this day. We have had more than our share of traffic fatalities this year. He stated in urging all to participate wholeheartedly in the drive to eliminate traffic accidents.

Enforcement of traffic laws will not be given unusual emphasis for this special day. Instead, officials hope that arrests will be lower because of increased observance of safe driving practices.

Purpose of the day, the committee said, is to increase awareness of the traffic accident problem and inspire drivers and pedestrians to assure their individual and personal responsibility for highway safety. They will be urged to:

1. Obey the letter and spirit of all traffic regulations by driving at speed prescribed by law or indicated by road and weather conditions, by signaling turns and stops, by being extra alert and slowing at railroad crossings, and by crossing streets correctly at intersections.

2. Be courteous to all drivers and pedestrians, give a break to pedestrians and turning motorists, and to practice good sportsmanship by keeping to the right, staying in their own lane and avoiding unnecessary use of the horn.

3. Give full attention to driving and walking, practice the fundamental of safe driving by keeping two hands on the wheel and attention on the road, keep windshields and windows clean and clear, and be alert to traffic conditions well ahead of and around their own cars.

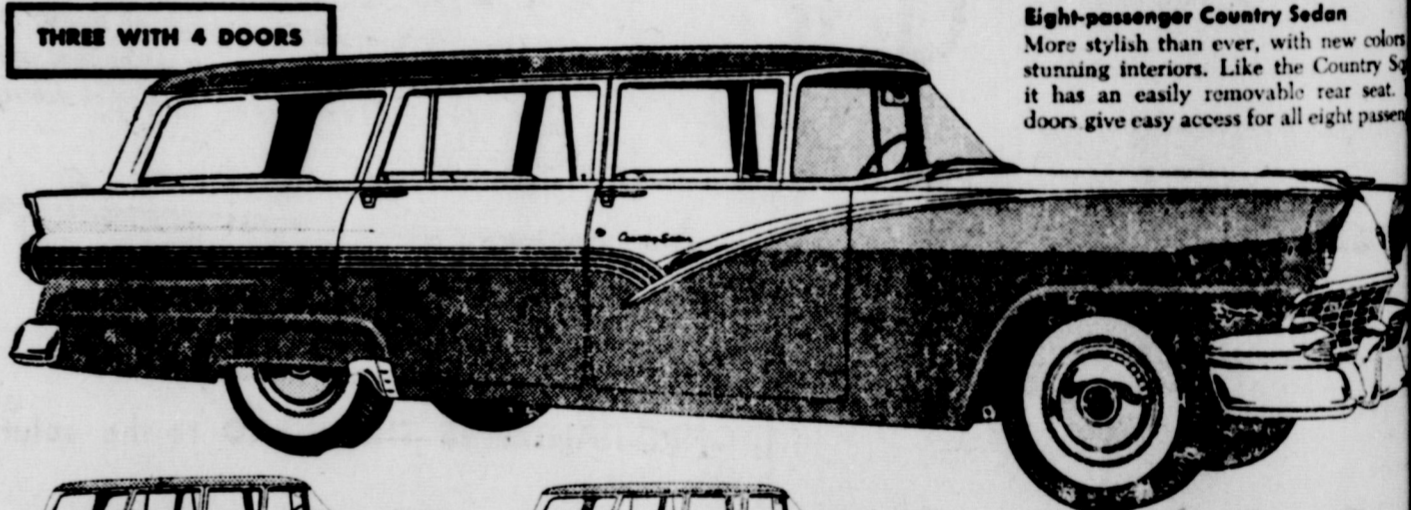

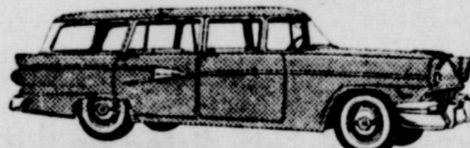
