

Second Ranking Boy

Proclamation

WHEREAS, On March 15th, 1919, the veterans of the First World War organized an association known as the American Legion, and

WHEREAS, the organization of the American Legion is the most important representative of all veterans of all wars, and

WHEREAS, the National Commander has proclaimed that the American Legion shall celebrate from March 15th through March 17th as a birthday, and

WHEREAS, The American Legion stands for the great principals with which all men wound agree, as expressed in the preamble to its constitution, which is quoted in full herein,

"For God and Country, we associate ourselves for the following purposes: (1) To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America; (2) To maintain law and order; (3) To foster and perpetuate a 100% Americanism; (4) To preserve memories and incidents of our association in the great war; (5) To inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; (6) To combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; (7) To make right the master of might; (8) To promote peace and good will on earth; (9) To safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; (10) To consetrate and sanctify our

comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness."

AND WHEREAS, it should be the desire of the citizens of this area to honor the veterans, not only of the First World War, but of the Spanish-American War, and of the Second World War, and of the Korean Conflict.

THEREFORE, By authority vested in me under the law, I proclaim March 15th as the birthday of the American Legion and admonish the citizens of this area to think of the sacrafices that have been made by the veterans to perpetuate our freedom and democratic government.

Witness my hand, affixed at Wheeler, Texas, this 6th day of March, 1956.
