WHEELER HIGH STUDENTS GET TRIP TO CITY

The entire student body of Wheeler high school plans to go to Oklahoma City, Thursday, April 26, to attend the "Atoms for Peace" exhibit of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission a feature of the Southwest American Exposition to be held from April 22 to 29.

Wheeler school officials decided to sponsor the trip after receiving publicity material from the Texas Education Agency.

About 20 cars with adult drivers are needed to transport pupils, in addition to the one school bus that is available for the trip, said Supt. A. E. Brown.

Persons having cars and drivers are asked to contact Supt. Brown. "We in Oklahoma are proud that we were selected for this public showing," wrote Okla. Gov. Raymond Gary in a letter to Texas Governor Allan Shivers. "Prior to its opening in Oklahoma City the fabulous exhibit has been viewed only by the world's foremost scientists. Oklahoma City is the only place the exhibit will ever be shown to the public."

"This is the exhibit which was prepared for the International Conference on the Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy in Geneva, Switzerland, late last year. It is truly America's showpiece of atomic energy."

STORM SIGNAL TWO BLASTS

Last Thursday afternoon the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department sounded two different signals to determine which could be the most easily understood as a storm warning signal. After the test it was found that the TWO BLASTS were more legible so that will be the signal used to alert the populace in case of storm.

Fire Chief Holt stated that the sounding of the alarm did not mean that a severe storm would hit Wheeler, nor that the failure of the whistle to blow did not mean it would not hit our community. The signal will be used as needed to call attention that storm conditions exist and may hit here. Each person is asked to decide his future course after the sounding of the alarm for himself.

No all-clear signal will be given, the chief said.

GRAND JURY INDICTS THREE

The Wheeler County Grand Jury last week indicted three men in their session at the Court House in Wheeler. Two indictments on counts of burglary were returned and one for forgery.

Leon Crosby of Erick, Okla., age 28, was indicted for burglarizing Bill Owen Service Station. Leon is under a 5-year probation in Wheeler County for forgery.

Jimmy Ross, 25, also of Erick, was indicted for the same burglary. He is under a 5-year probation in Gray County.

The other indictment returned was against Geo. Winston, colored, of Shamrock on a charge of forgery.

District Court will convene here on Monday, April 23, at which time Earl C. Westerfield will be tried on the charge of burglarizing the Manse Lisle home West of Shamrock. He was indicted by a former Grand Jury and is awaiting trial.

Some of these indicted last week will probably be arranged at this term of District Court, Sheriff Gus Dorman said this week.

Ballots for absentee voting may be obtained at the office of County Clerk Harry Wofford. The absentee balloting will continue until Friday, April 22.

All persons who have rendered property for taxation in the city and who resided within the corporate limits for at least six months holding either a paid poll tax or exemption, are eligible to vote in the election.

The call asks for \$61,000 for waterworks improvements and extension and \$49,000 for sanitary sewer system improvements and extension.

The exact cost of property owners cannot yet be determined.

The city council has appointed a board of equalization to equalize the valuation of property within the city limits. This board is now engaged in the study of the conditions and fixing a system of evaluation. It is working on the actual sale value of the property based on prices that have recently been paid for actual property and affixing those values to property that has not been sold.

After the gross value is obtained the board will apply a percentage stick to arrive at the \$1,200,000 total valuation needed in this instance. Some pieces of property will be assessed at a lesser value than now are while others will be raised. The board says it is trying to fix all city property at the same dollar value for like properties.

After the valuation is finished the city council will determine the rate needed to meet expenses of the city and retire the bonds, both old and new. This will be the tax rate for the ensuing year.

Maps showing the exact location and the intended improvements are being made and will be on display in various places of business over town, that an interested public may acquaint themselves with the project as it is being planned. The city council what it proposed to be done with the \$110,000. (Continued on last page)

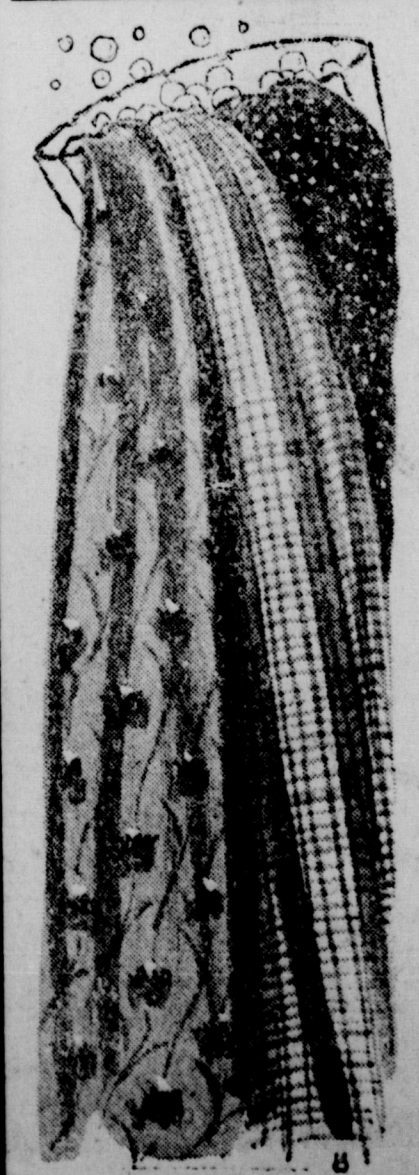

it advisable and to the best interest of said City to submit to the resident property taxpaying qualified voters of said City the propositions for the issuance of bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS:

That an election be held in the City of Wheeler, Texas on the 1st day of May, 1956, which date is not less than 15 nor more than 30 days from the date of this order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of said City, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

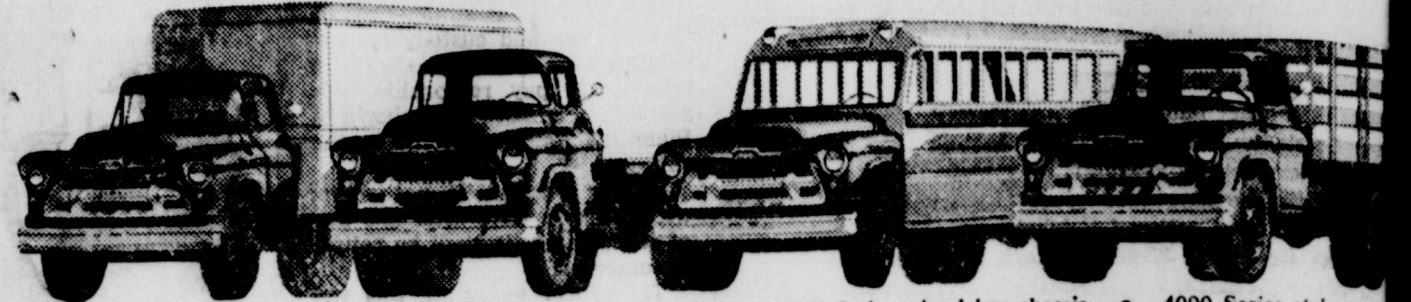

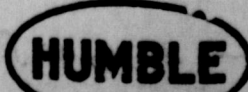

Wheeler County Soil Conservation District News
