The Mustangs who were hosts of the Estelline gridmen here Friday night in a homecoming game, has been ranked as the No. 3 team among the top 10 class B clubs in the Panhandle.

The ratings are made by the sports department of the Amarillo Daily News.

The only two teams rated higher than the Mustangs are Kress and Gruver. Rated below Wheeler, in order named, are: Claude, Darrouzett, Groom, Estelline, Matador, Stratford and Farwell.

The fine Wheeler Mustangs climbed into the No. 3 spot after running rough shod and fancy free over Luckless Lakeview, 58-0, last week.

It was the fifth triumph for Coach J. D. Atwell's team against two setbacks. The win left Wheeler tied with Matador for the District 2-B leadership.

The Mustangs have stacked up victories this season over Erick, Okla., Quitaque, Silvertown, Turkey and Lakeview. They have been defeated by Price College and Canadian.

The 1955 Mustang Football Queen will be crowned during the half-time period Friday night in the game between Wheeler and Estelline.

The Estelline Bear Cub record is as follows: They lost to Price College by a score of 32-0 and to Matador, 39-0. They defeated the Vernon B team 14-13; Lakeview, 14-0; Turkey 20-13 and Quitaque, 24-7. Running up 72 points to their opponents 104.

The Mustangs have a more impressive record of 191 points scored against 68 for their opponents. Wheeler lost to Canadian, 6-13; and to Price College 27-6. They have won over Erick, Okla., 25-21; Quitaque, 38-0; Silvertown, 31-7; Turkey, 27-0; and Lakeview 58-0.

The free chest X-ray clinic ends in Wheeler at noon today (Thursday) and those in charge hope at least 1,000 persons will have taken advantage of the health service by that time.

The mobile X-ray machine of the State Health Department operated in Mobeetie for a half day Tuesday, and has been in operation here since Wednesday morning. It will close here at noon today and move to Shamrock where it will be in service all day Friday and Saturday.

All persons 15 years of age and older are invited to have their chests X-rayed free of charge. Allison, Briscoe and Kelton Schools have been invited to participate in the program at Wheeler.

Approved by all the medical doctors in Wheeler County, the health program is being sponsored here by the Kiwanis Club. Sponsors in Mobeetie were the Lions Club and the American Legion Post.

Every effort has been made to reach the goal of 1,000 in Wheeler, because if an increase is not shown over last year's figure of 887, it is possible that the machine will not be brought back here next year. The county health officer last year was 360.

Local residents may soon know whether the Natural Gas Pipe Line Company of America will be permitted to construct a big-inch natural gas line through Wheeler County.

The company applied for permission to build the line a year ago, and the right-of-way has already been obtained.

The Federal Power Commission called for an initial decision on competing applications. The other application — of the Lone Star Gas Company — would permit a line to run south of Wheeler County.

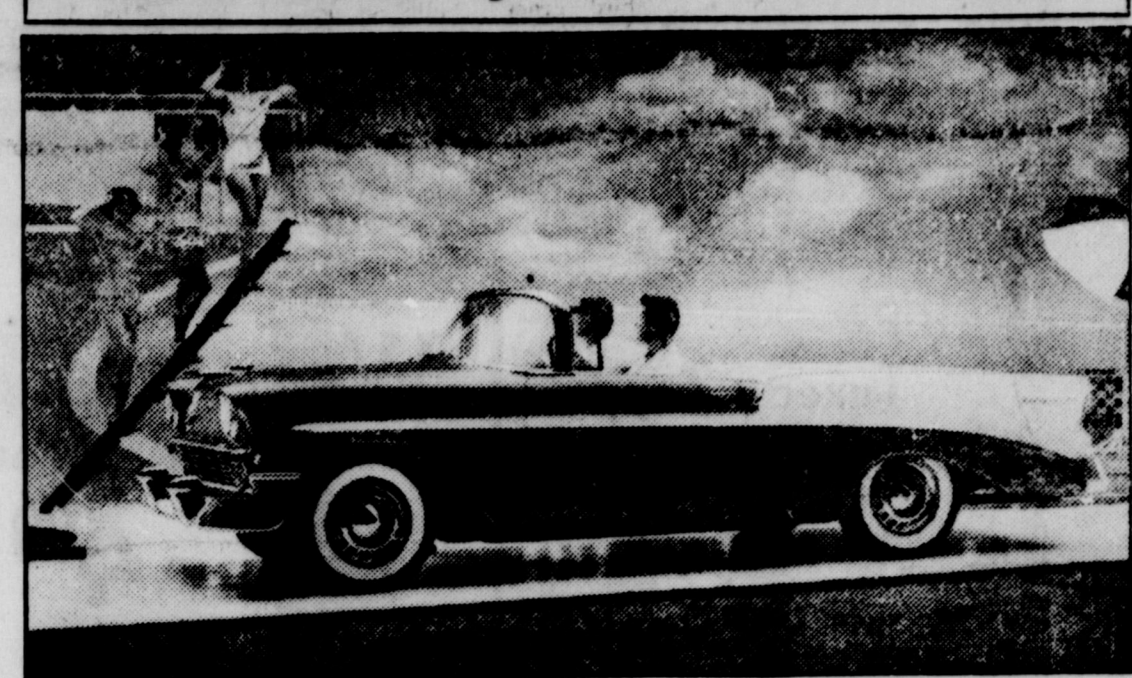

### COUNTY RANKS FIFTH IN OIL

Wheeler County ranked fifth in average daily production of oil in the Texas Panhandle counties in 1954.

The average daily production in this county was 3,394 barrels. Gray County repeated as the top producer with a daily average of 33,983 barrels. Hutchinson Co. rapidly coming to the front in both oil and gas production, had a daily average of 33,442 barrels.

Carson County ranked third with 8,709 barrels, and Roberts County fourth, with 3,771 barrels. Wheeler County with 3,394 barrels led; Collingsworth County with 3; Hansford with 200; Hartley with 9; Moore with 17; Ochiltree with 56 and Sherman with 49.

Production of oil for the entire region was nearly 31,000,000 barrels in 1954.

At the end of 1954, more than 8,600 oil wells produced in this area.

Nearly 3,800 gas wells were operating, many of them located in Wheeler County.

Gas processing plants in the Panhandle number 34, with a daily average capacity of 3,400,000,000 cubic feet of gas.

Carbon black, a product resulting from burning certain types of gas, is an important Panhandle commodity. One of the eight carbon black plants in the Panhandle, largest concentration of such plants in Texas, is the United Carbon Co. of Shamrock.

This product is essential to the manufacture of automobile tires, printers ink, phonograph records and various paints and lacquers. Its production reached 233,112,000 pounds in 1954 from the eight plants.

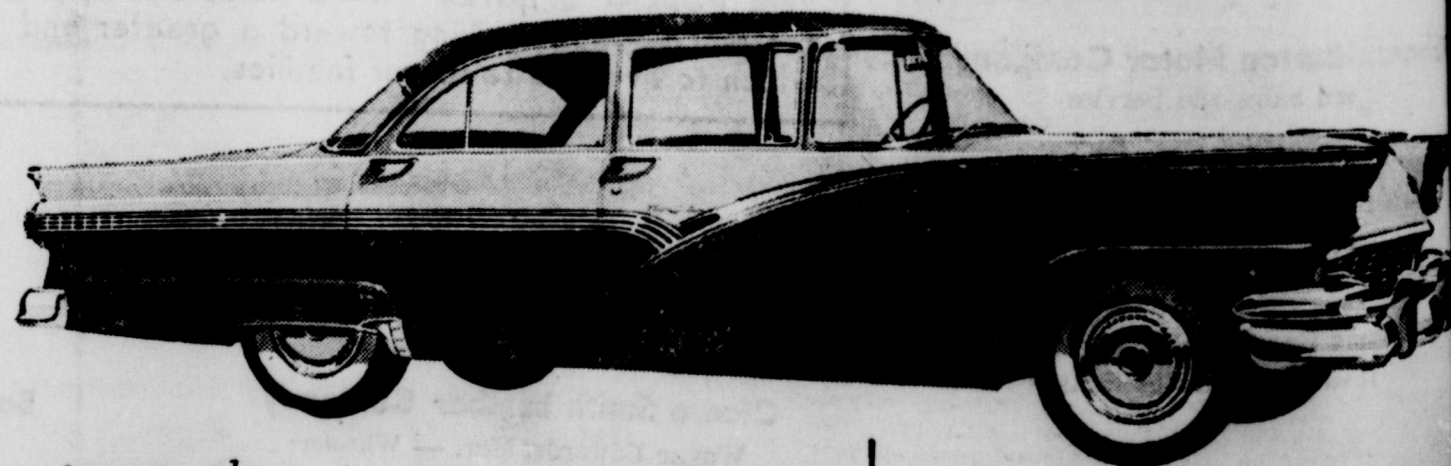

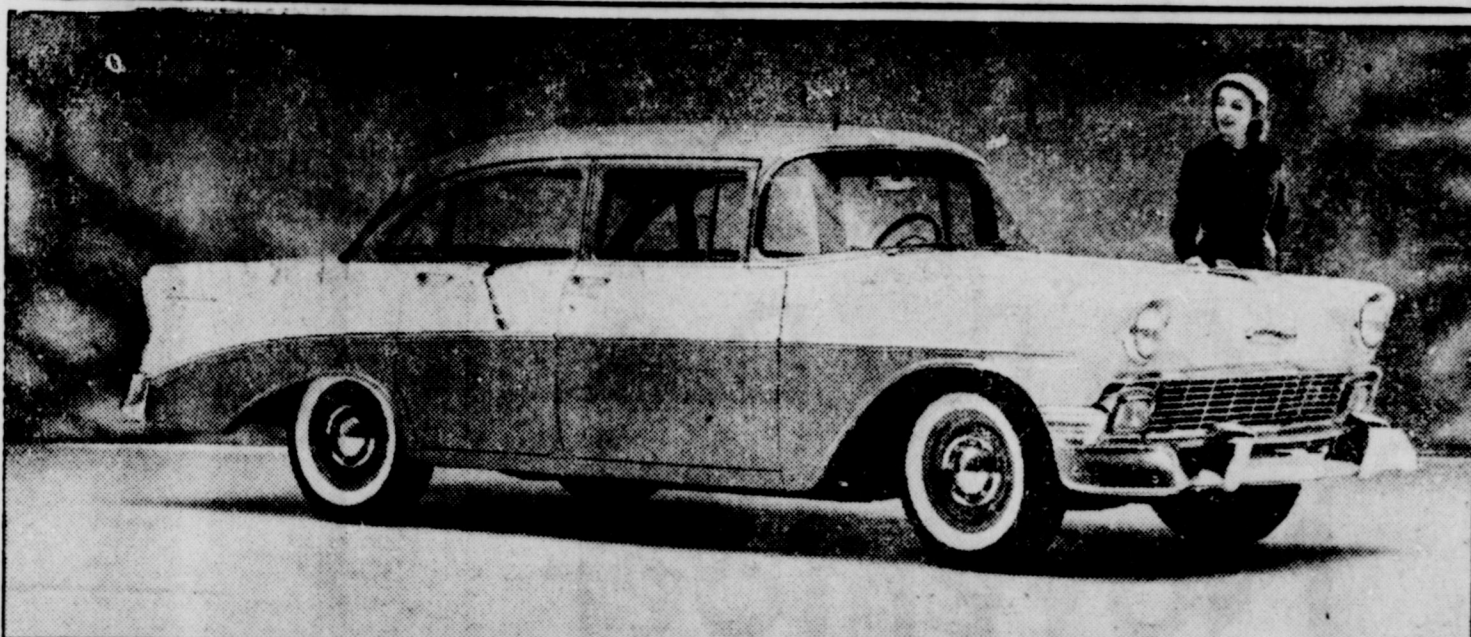

### GET YOUR CHEST X-RAY NOV. 1-3

"Every citizen owes it to himself, his family, and his neighbors to give the few minutes of his time necessary to finding out that his lungs are free from tuberculosis, that he is not one of the unknown people innocently spreading the disease in this community," declared a spokesman for the State Health Department.

"Tuberculosis strikes without warning, showing no obvious symptoms in its early stages. Healthy looking people may have the disease and be spreading it to those about them. A chest X-ray can detect early TB.

"Every person who comes to the unit will be registered by the hostess in charge and will be requested to give the name of a doctor to whom he wishes a report of the X-ray to be sent. The only requirement is that heavy coats and any jewelry or metal objects in shirt pockets be removed for the few seconds required to take the X-ray picture.

"If there is some technical defect on the film, or if it shows suspicions of TB or some other abnormal condition, notice will be sent out with a few days and large film X-rays will be offered free of charge to determine whether TB is actually present."

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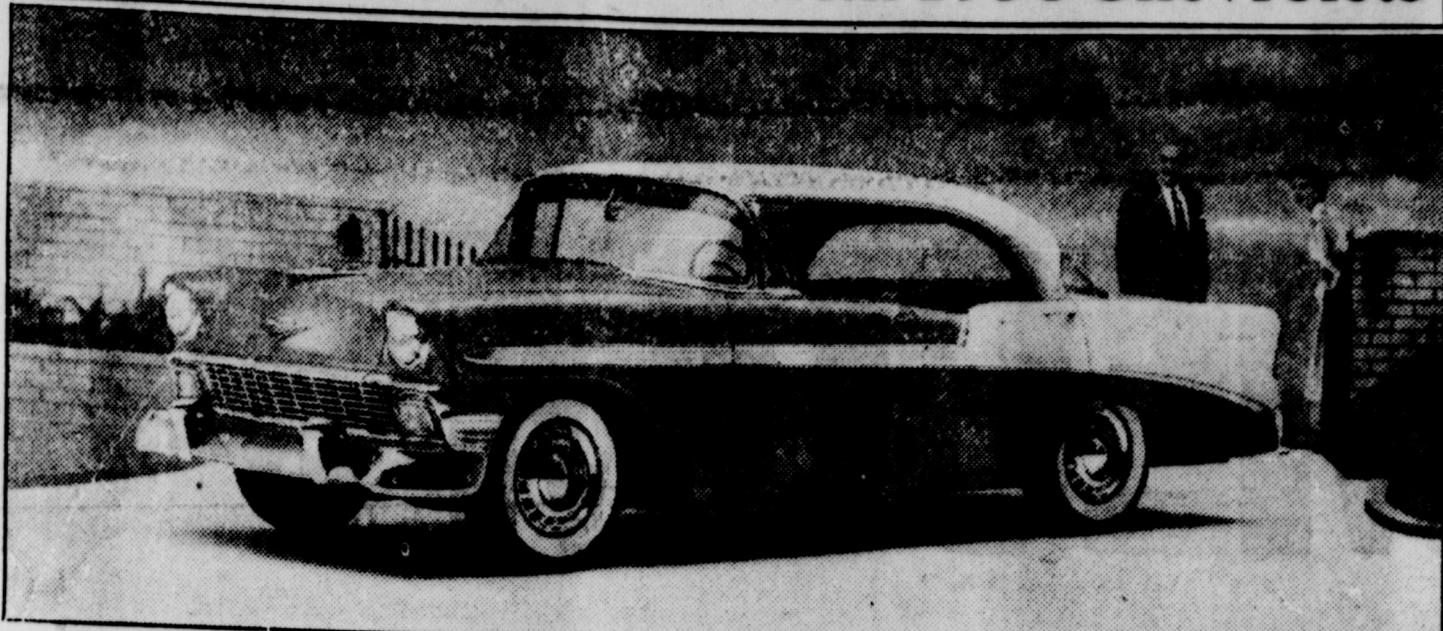
