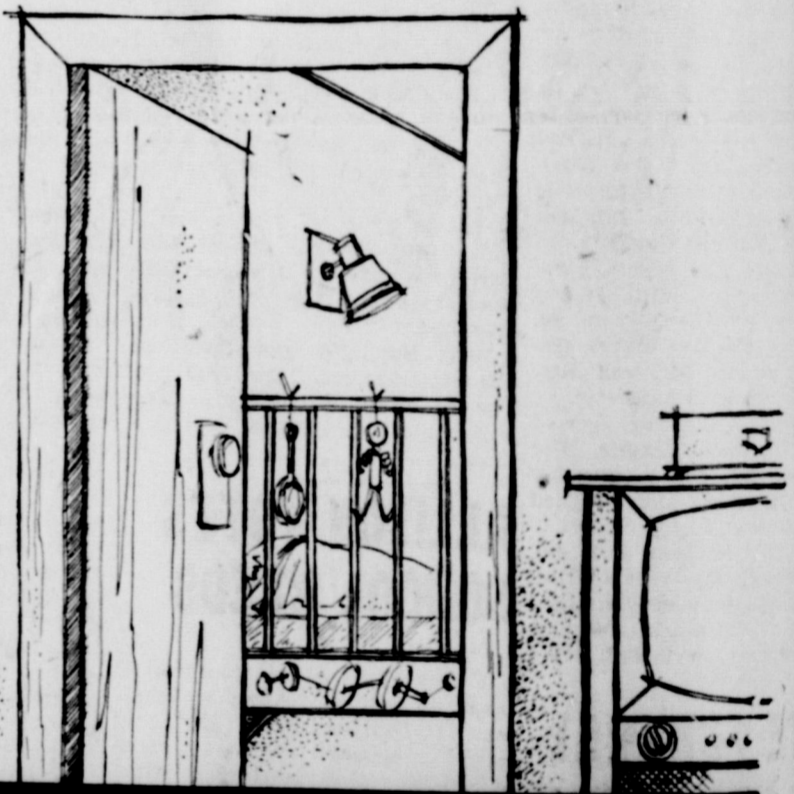

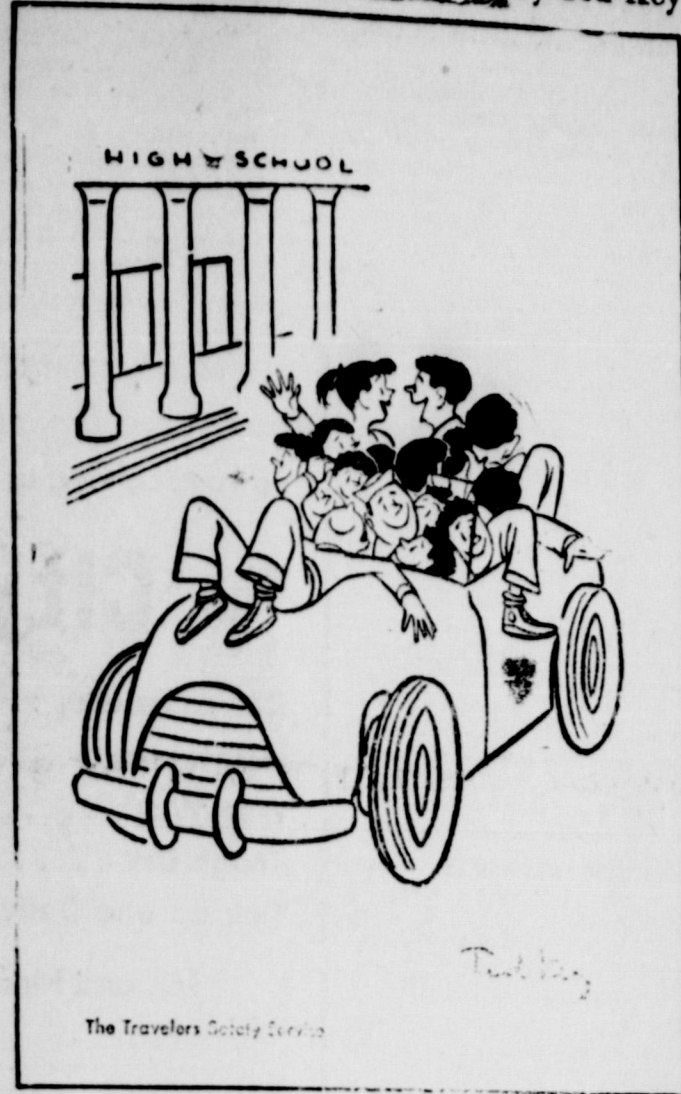

PEACE OFFICERS TO ORGANIZE

Captain J. W. Blackwell of the Texas Highway Patrol announced today that a meeting for the purpose of organizing the police officers of the 26 Panhandle counties into a Police Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Organization has been called for Friday, May 18, 1956. This meeting scheduled from 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM will be held in the classroom of the Amarillo Police Department.

Speakers on the program include Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Department of Public Safety; Inspector C. O. Layne of the Texas Highway Patrol; Sheriff Hugh Anderson of Borger; Mr. H. C. Winburn of the U. S. Weather Bureau; and other Dept. of Public Safety personnel. Mayors, County Judges, Civil Defense Directors, and members of the District Committee of the Civil Defense and Disaster Relief District have been invited along with the law enforcement administrators, according to Blackwell.

Activity has picked up with-in Wheeler Soil Conservation District since the rains the first two days of May. Most of the farmers are rebedding or running stalk cutters over land to prevent blowing. FARMERS WILL GET REFUND ON GASOLINE TAX

Farmers will be able to obtain a refund of the federal excise tax on gasoline which is used on a farm for farming purposes under a recently enacted law.

The present federal law is two cents a gallon. Commissioner of Internal Revenue Russell C. Harrington announced that under the new law the first refund payments will be made after June 30, with respect to gasoline purchased and used during the first six months of 1956. Thereafter, refunds will be made for a one-year period from July 1 to June 30.

To get his refund, a farmer will have to file his claim after June 30 and before October 1. Claims are to be made on form 2240 and are to be filed with the United States District Director of Internal Revenue for the farmer's district. The form will be available after June 1 at Internal Revenue offices, county agricultural agents and many banks and post offices.

Refunds will be limited to the Federal tax on gasoline which is used by a farmer for farming purposes, in carrying on a trade or business on a farm located in the United States. A farmer may also request a refund of the tax on any gasoline which is used on his farm by a custom operator of a neighbor in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity.

In general, the new law provides that gasoline shall be treated as used for farming purposes if it was used:

1. By the farmer or any other person in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity including the raising of livestock, poultry, etc., on the farmer's own farm.

2. By the farmer in the operation, management, conservation, improvement, or maintenance of his farm or its tools or equipment.

3. By the farmer in handling, drying, packing, grading, or storing any agricultural commodity in its unmanufactured state, but only if the farmer produced more than one-half of the commodity which he so treated during the period for which the claim is filed.

4. By the farmer in connection with the planting, cultivating, caring for, or cutting of trees for market, but only if the planting etc., is incidental to his farming operations.

No refunds of tax are allowed on gasoline used off the farm, such as gasoline used on public roads or highways in transporting family members or workmen, equipment, livestock, crops, feed, etc. Also, no refunds are allowed for tax on gasoline used in processing, pack-

aging, freezing, or canning operations.

Farmers are also given special relief from the Federal excise tax on diesel fuel and special motor fuels used on a farm for farming purposes.

Farmers who expect to file claims should keep succient records to enable the Internal Revenue Service to verify the accuracy of the amount claimed.

Commissioner Harrington said that regulations relating to the new law will be issued as soon as possible.
