Voters in the Allison Common School District went to the polls in a special election on Saturday, March 24, to approve the conversion of the county-line common school district to an Independent School District.

The vote in the Hemphill County portion of the district was close, 27 voting for the conversion and 24 against; but measure carried by a wide margin in the Wheeler County portion of the district where the vote was reported, unofficially, as 67 for conversion, 2 against.

The change to an Independent School District will become official upon action of county school board in Hemphill and Wheeler Counties.

C. B. Kirk Elected Mayor of Wheeler

C. B. Kirk, owner and operator of Kirk Funeral Home was elected mayor of the City of Wheeler in Tuesday's election, edging out the incumbent, R. H. Forrester, by four votes.

Kirk polled 118 votes to 114 for Forrester, who is serving his seventh term as mayor.

From a field of five candidates for places on the city council, voters re-elected Hiram Whitener and A. O. Vanpool and selected Dorsie Hutchison for a seat on the five-man body.

Whitener and Vanpool led the ticket with 168 votes each. Hutchison polled 131 votes. Albert Thomas received 111 votes and C. L. Lewis, a candidate for re-election, polled 89.

The election results as reported are unofficial. Official results will be released after the proper canvass has been made.

C. D. May served as election judge. The election attracted the greatest interest of any in several years. Percy Farmer and Kirk are hold-over members of the city council. Kirk will now have to resign from the council to qualify as mayor.

His successor will be appointed by the aldermen.

Improvement Issues Will Be Considered Separately

The Attorney General of Texas ruled this week that the bond and sewer issues being considered by the City of Wheeler must be submitted to the voters as two proposals.

The Attorney General, when asked for an approval of the issues, suggested that they be broken down into two proposals as follows:

1. A definite amount of bonds to improve and extend the water works.
2. A definite amount of bonds to improve and extend the sewer system.

The first petition circulate specified the amount of \$110,000.00 calling for water and sewer extension. Another petition is now being circulated, complying with the requirements set forth by the Attorney General. The petition will be presented to the City Council Thursday night.

The petition now in circulation, upon the suggestion of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce specifies \$61,000.00 for water and \$49,000.00 for sewer. The figures may be changed by the City Councilmen, if they deem it necessary.

District News**

Carlene Zybach, Secretary of the
Wheeler Soil Conservation District
Board furnished the program at
the last Implement Dealers-District
meeting. These meetings have
been informal discussion meetings
on timely subjects of interest to
farmers and ranchers.
The last meeting was on grass
seeding and seed harvest. The
purpose was to stimulate planting now
and to try to get more seed har-
vested this year. One point em-
phasized at the meeting was that
native grasses should be harvested
in the general locality where they
are to be planted. Seed grown in
Nebraska will do well in this dis-
trict.
Soil Conservation Service per-
sonnel assisting the Wheeler Dis-
trict pointed out some instances
where grass seedings had failed
because seed were moved too far
north or south. Seed can be moved
farther east or west but home
grown are still best.
These meetings, which have been
held regularly on the last Monday
of each month, are to make best
use of local information. It has

Presumably the county boards will appoint the seven members of the old common school district to continue as trustees for the new district until next election.

When it comes to helping others in distress the Red Cross has never weighed the cost. No matter how great the disaster it provides freely of its funds until all humanitarian needs are met. This policy in the last nine months, unprecedented by the severity and scope of disaster in the organization's 75-year history, has brought the Red Cross dangerously close to disaster itself — an economic one.

With six of the heaviest disaster-frequency months still ahead in its fiscal year, Red Cross disaster relief funds have shrunk to less than one million dollars after the record-breaking drain of funds needed to restore families to normal in the floods, and several major tornadoes.

All needs of emergency relief and restoring disaster-stricken families back to homes have been met so far. Thanks to the outpouring of generosity of people everywhere the Red Cross received nearly \$16,000,000 in its special flood relief campaign last August. But total cost of the two coastal floods has mounted to over \$27,000,000 absorbing these funds and nearly depleting the organization's total disaster reserves, too.

Nor has the Red Cross held back in expending for its other services. During the last fiscal year, the Red Cross provided services to servicemen and their dependents, here and overseas, and to veterans and their dependents at an average expenditure of \$88 per minute. Red Cross made available free blood that you donated for fellow Americans at an average expenditure of \$24 each minute. Safety and health services were provided at an average of \$11 per minute.

In total, the Red Cross provided all its services, at home and abroad, at an average financial expenditure of \$167 each minute. These expenditures for alleviating human suffering and distress went on with each tick of the clock, night and day, each day in the year.

Yet, to balance all this good work, the Red Cross asks our help just once a year, during its March campaign. And then it asks for only enough, from each of us proportionately, to fulfill its obligations.

"Over 9,000 Texans died of cancer in 1955 and the total for 1956 will be even higher if present rates continue. Moreover, at present rates one American in four now living will some day be stricken by cancer; two of every three homes in Texas are threatened by this dread disease."

"Although in the last decade there has been marked progress in the diagnosis and treatment of cancer," the Governor continued, "only one patient in four is being cured; two out of four could be saved if they were treated early enough."
