Juvenile Crime Gang Is Believed Broken

Apprehension of four teen-agers near Shamrock last Wednesday has broken up what local officers believe was a well-organized juvenile crime gang.

Three of the teen-agers are from Shamrock and a fourth is from Illinois and has been visiting in Shamrock.

James Dyer, 17, of that city, leader of the gang, has already been indicted by the Wheeler County Grand Jury. He pleaded guilty to burglary and car theft and was sentenced by District Judge Lewis Goodrich to six years in the penitentiary on each charge, the terms to run concurrently.

The youth is being held in the Collingsworth County Jail in Wellington, charged with theft of the Wellington High School and the Shamrock School.

The other three boys, whose name are being withheld because of their age, will be tried in juvenile court this week before Wheeler County Judge Clarence Morris.

The boys have confessed to operating out of Shamrock as the "Chain Gang." They were identified by a tattoo mark on the calf of their leg. The design was a heart-shaped series of links with the letter "G" in the center.

Dyer, the leader, is a former inmate of the state reform school, and once a member of the Pacheco Gang in Amarillo, officers said.

Dyer and three other members of the gang have admitted participating in a series of burglaries in Shamrock, Wellington & Shamrock. Three other members all of whom reside in the Shamrock area, are being investigated. So far their companions have not implicated them in any of the de-

County Democrats Back Sen. L. Johnson

Delegates to the Wheeler County Democratic Convention voted Tuesday to instruct delegates to the State Convention to back Senator Lyndon B. Johnson as chairman of the National Democratic Convention and also as Texas' Favorite Son Candidate.

The unit rule was adopted. The county convention, held in the district courtroom consolidated a movement originating in the precinct conventions held last Saturday.

Delegates selected to attend the State Democratic Convention were: Siebert Worley and H. B. Hill of Shamrock and A. B. Crump and Harry Wofford of Wheeler.

Roy Scribner and Guy Hardin of Shamrock and H. M. Wiley and P. L. Farmer of Wheeler were named as alternates.

A. B. Crump, Wheeler County Democratic Chairman, called the convention to order and served as temporary chairman. Harry Wofford was appointed temporary secretary. Both were elected as permanent officers of the convention.

Worley, Glynn Bell and E. E. Johnston were selected on the credential committee.

In addition to voting to back Senator Johnson as Democratic Chairman and Texas' Favorite Son, the county delegates adopted the following resolutions:

1. To support a resolution against federal aid to education.

FARM PRODUCTS IN '54 VALUED AT \$3,913,119

The value of products sold in 1954 by operators of 853 farms in Wheeler County was \$3,913,119, according to a preliminary report of the 1954 Census of Agriculture published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The value of all crops sold was \$2,549,420 and included \$2,547,272 for field crops, \$1,360 for vegetables and \$768 for fruits and nuts.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$1,363,699 and included \$166,566 for dairy products, \$77,277 for poultry and poultry products and \$1,119,856 for livestock and livestock products.

The value of farm products sold does not include income of farm operators from non-farm sources, government payments for soil conservation, nor subsidy payments, etc.

Information on the value of farm products sold is presented for each county in a preliminary state report, copies of which may be purchased from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C., at 10 cents each.

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NEW BLEACHERS FOR STADIUM

Supt. A. E. Brown this week announced that new bleachers, with a seating capacity of 480, have been ordered and will be installed at Nicholson Field here before the football season starts in 1956.

At the regular school board meeting last Thursday evening representatives of the various clubs and organizations of Wheeler met with the board, promised support in raising the funds, and recommended the purchase of the bleachers.

The bleachers are dual purpose type and are constructed of steel. They have steps through the middle and a walk across the front. The new bleachers, costing \$2,384, will be installed on the west side of Nicholson Field in time for the opening game this fall. The old wooden bleachers are unsafe and something had to be done with them before the season this fall. This seems to be the best answer to the problem.

CAPROCK SEEKS MORE MILEAGE

Of interest to Wheeler patrons of the Cap Rock Bus Line is an application by W. D. Peery, owner, for an extension of the line from Wellington to Mangum and Altus, Okla., and on to Vernon, Texas.

Two of the three schedules would be changed to service the line east if present plans are worked out, it was indicated. Originating at Pampa, these schedules would pass through Wheeler, Shamrock, Wellington, Vinson Reed, Mangum, Altus and to Vernon.

East bound passengers would meet the same schedule boarding transcontinental buses at Vernon rather than Childress. The bus to Childress would service those going to points directly south of that city, and on to Abilene.

Mr. Peery recently put into operation all new, 14-passenger air-conditioned buses. These smaller buses are built along the lines of limousines and for lines of the Cap Rock type, have proved both popular and satisfactory.

TEXAS HIGHWAY PATROL SEEKS MORE MEMBERS

The Texas Highway Patrol is accepting applications between now and June 10 for appointment as State Patrolmen.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said that statewide examinations would be given late in June and that successful candidates will be selected to begin training in September to fill the remaining original vacancies authorized by the last Legislature when the Patrol strength was increased by 200 men.

crop damage. Reports from the United Department of Agriculture indicate that farmers will need on the lookout for "hoppers" Panhandle and southward from the caprock and from the River into deep central Texas.

If conditions are favorable, wingless grasshoppers begin hatching this month, possibly in June. Appropriate insecticides should be applied as possible after hatching, as the insects are numerous, and applications may be necessary.

In applying insecticides, farmers and ranchers should look for hatching grounds on road field margins, ditch banks and used land bordering crops. Treatment of these areas will prevent hoppers from moving the fields where such operations plowing and discing may have cut down the number of hatching eggs.

In the use of any insecticide, instructions of the manufacturer should be carefully followed to avoid harmful residues on crops.

A number of insecticides available are effective in hopper control. Aldrin, dieldrin, heptachlor and toxaphene among those listed.

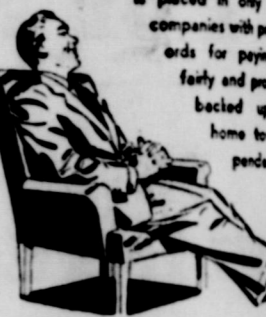

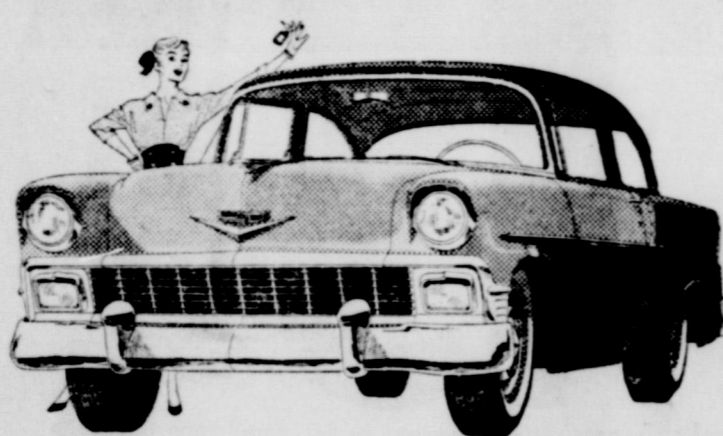

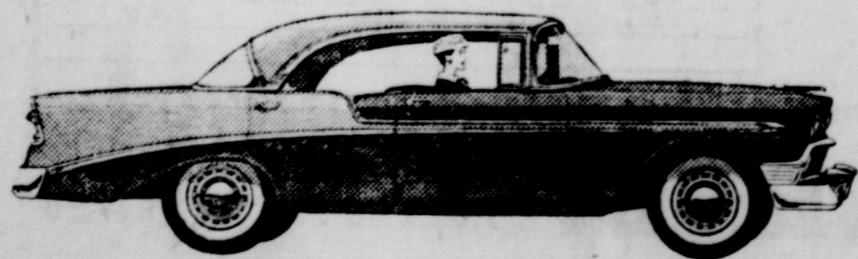
