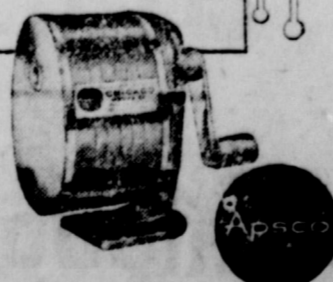

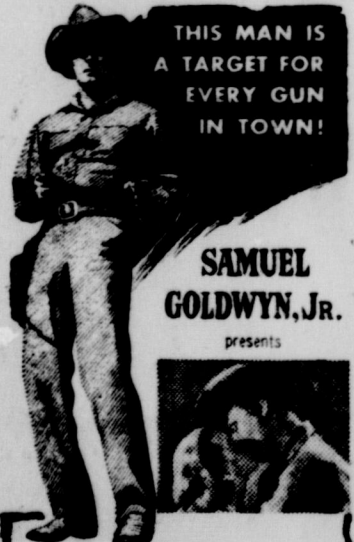

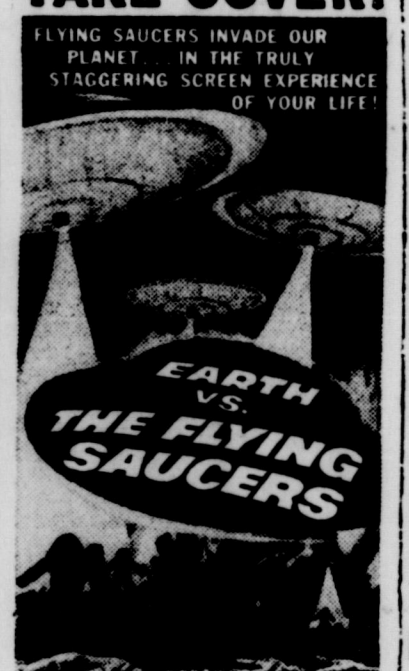

Under this part of the program a farmer will be able to earn two types of payment; an annual payment to help compensate for income which he would have received if the "reserved" land had been in crop; and a payment representing a percentage of the cost of establishing conservation practices on such land.

certifies that he underplanted (a) in anticipation of complying with the 1956 Acreage Reserve, or (b) because of adverse weather conditions.

2. He has underplanted his 1956 allotment for winter wheat and certifies that this was done because of adverse weather conditions.

3. He has complied with his farm allotment for a particular crop, but an acreage of the crop was not harvested because of destruction by natural cause.

The payment which a farmer may earn for taking part in the

Soil Bank program is to be determined by a formula which depends on the "base rate" for the crop multiplied by a "yield factor."

In the case of the 1956 wheat crop, a flat payment for underplanting 1956 winter wheat because of drought conditions has been set at \$4.00 per acre.

For wheat which has been planted and then plowed up, the payment will be based on either an appraised yield for the field or the normal yield for the farm, whichever is smaller.

For underplanting cotton, the payment rate will be based on the normal yield for the designated acreage. Base unit rate for cotton is 15 cents per pound.

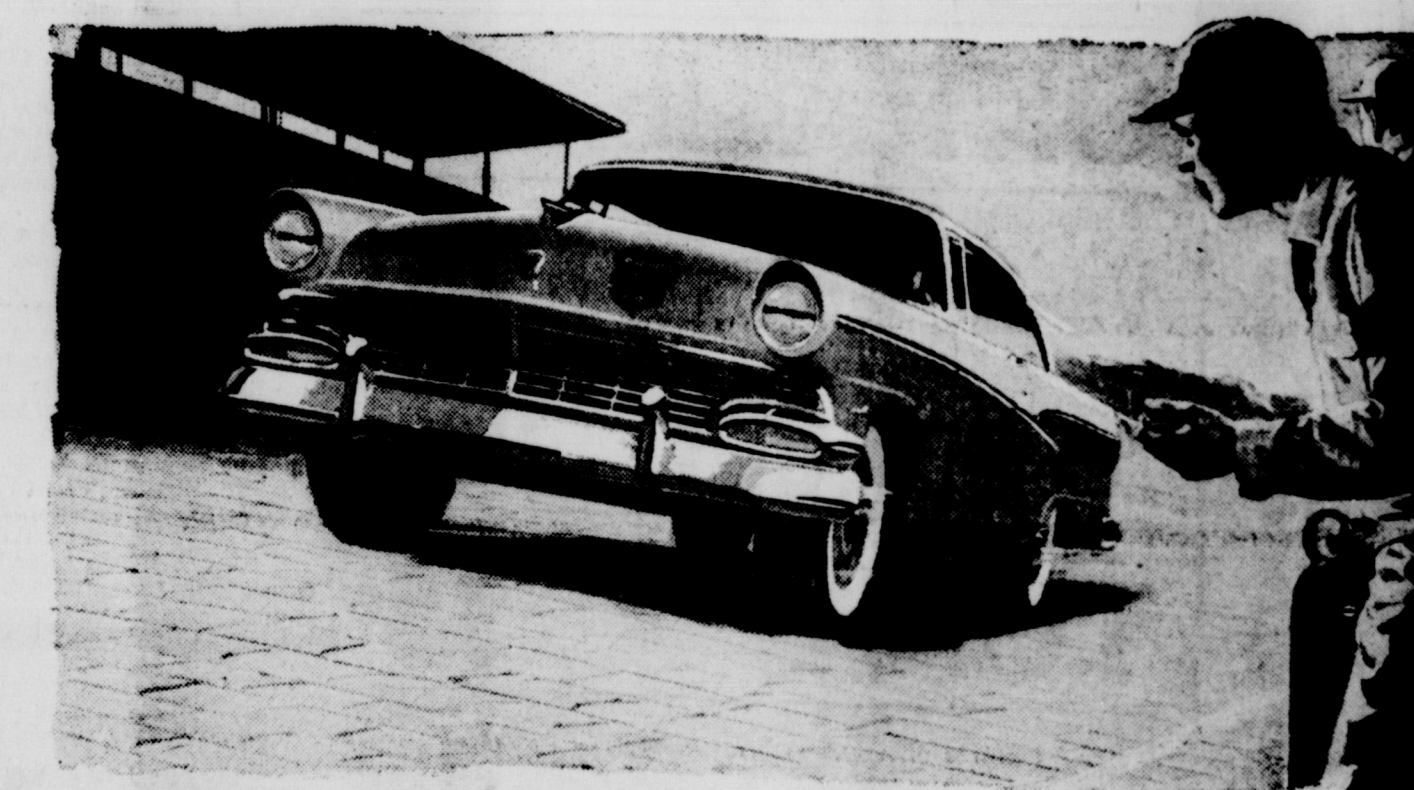
