

This was a decline of 11.1 per cent in the number of farms. This census! reflects that there are fewer farms in 1954 than for any census since 1890. The largest portion of this decrease was in the family-sized farms of from 10 to 100 acres.

In 1954 this number had decreased to 130,463. Farms consisting of 500 acres or more have increased 55 per cent during the last 30 years. It might also be pointed out that there has been an increase in the number of farms of less than 10 acres reslut-






