## Modern Farmer At State Fair

Have you ever wondered about the miracle of the modern farmer? How is the midst of this weary acres, lacking in the soil fertility they once had, he has been able to produce enough crops to feed nearly all the free world?

The full story of this miracle—how soil and water conservation farming systems are spurring Texas soils into producing a third more of all crops—will be presented by the State Fair of Texas in its huge Agriculture Show, October 6-21 at Dallas.

## Modern Farmer At State Fair

Featuring growing plants and live animals in exhibits staffed by specialists, the 1956 Agriculture Show will stress soil, water plant and wildlife conservation.

Major divisions of the show will include an exhibit of thirty of the state's most important native grasses, an information center on how the state's 172 soil conservation districts function, miniature farms depicting the exploitation and misuse of cropland in the past and illustrating how correct conservation practices are bringing the land back into balance with the forces of nature, a model of a small watershed under the proper soil and water conservation management and an exhibit of live deer, quail and fish to illustrate how wildlife fits into the conservation program.

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## JULY DEADLINE TO PLACE LAND IN SOIL BANK

Deadline for depositing land in the Soil Bank for farmers who want to draw payments on the account this year will be July 20—except that tenant farmers working for absentee owners will have an additional 10 days to get their landlords signed up.

Farmers are urged to make a careful study of the information mailed to them from the Wheeler County ASC office, as the agreement is a binding contract and the penalties or failure to live up to it are stiff.

To put crop land into Soil Bank this year, farm operators must sign a "Soil Bank Acreage Reserve Agreement" (CSS Form No. 800) and it is a binding contract and once signed must be complied with. The penalty for non-compliance is repayment of all money received from the Soil Bank plus a 50 per cent additional penalty.

## STORM BREAKS CITY ROUTINE

A thunderstorm which struck west of Wheeler in the old Corn Valley community late Sunday afternoon disrupted power service, damaged crops and is reported to have damaged or destroyed out-buildings and sheds in the community.

Hail and wind damage to crops were suffered by Leo Lamb, Lem Gaines, J. C. Moore, Jr., and Nig Clark among others in the Valley. The same storm is reported to have spilled some hail and hard rain in the area west of Twitty.

"Water pressure in the City of Wheeler became exceedingly low during the evening. This was caused partly because of the temperature causing a heavy usage, partly because the large volume of water being used had not been caught at the pump house, and partly because of the power failure," Mayor C. B. Kirk explained this week.

## JULY DEADLINE TO PLACE LAND IN SOIL BANK

The program is strictly voluntary — no one is required to sign up — but once signed, a farm operator must stay hitched.

If the farm operator is not the owner of the farm, or not a cash tenant, standing-rent tenant, or fixed-rent tenant, he must secure the signature of the landowner on the Soil Bank agreement. The farm operator must sign and file his compliance agreement with the committee.

## JULY DEADLINE TO PLACE LAND IN SOIL BANK

The minimum acreage of a cover crop may be put into the soil bank is the larger of (1) 10 per cent of the farm allotment for the commodity, or (2) 5 acres in the case of wheat or 2 acres in the case of cotton.

If the farm allotment is less than 5 acres for wheat or 2 acres for cotton, the minimum acreage will be the entire allotment.

The land placed in the acreage reserve must be specifically designated in the agreement, and is subject to these provisions:

The farm must be in compliance with acreage allotments.

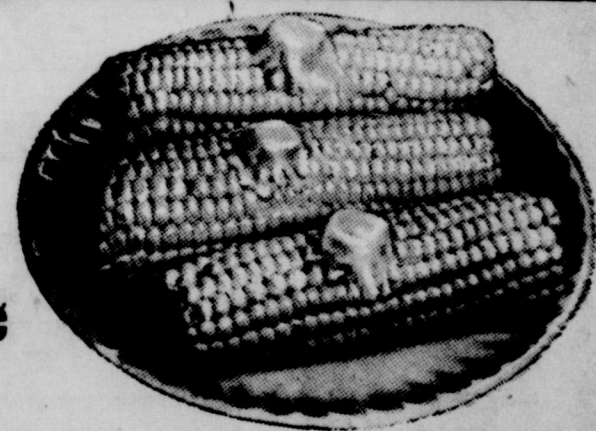

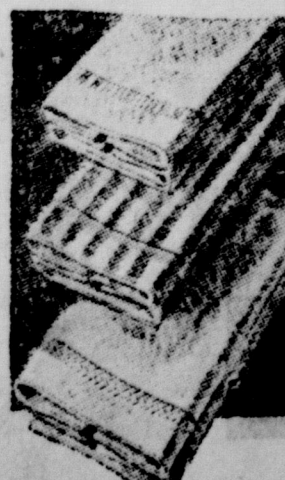

It is probable that I will not have as much time as I would like to give to this campaign, therefore, I am depending upon my friends to help elect me. I

Newsletter From Your CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS

The Anti-Slaughter Committee Although the above title is not the correct name for a new committee of the Congress recently appointed, it would seem to me to be an appropriate nickname. The Special Committee referred to has been appointed for a thorough investigation of the many and varied problems incident to our nationwide highway accident toll. The primary purpose, as stated by the Chairman, Honorable Kenneth Roberts of Alabama, is "to save human lives."

Few people realize that traffic accidents annually take the lives of more than 30,000 people and leave

same two million injured or maimed. The traffic problem is present in every community in this country, whether it be a large city or a small crossroads settlement, and daily affects the lives of practically every American.

There are many state and national traffic safety associations and organizations formed for the purpose of working out some solution. The problem has become so great in the past few years that the demands for Congressional investigation must be honored. The fine highways in all of the states of our nation, coupled with the tremendous progress that has been made in motor vehicles, result in a continuing flow of traffic across state lines and, therefore, into federal jurisdiction. Many of these vehicles are pleasure vehicles, while others are used for commercial purposes.

The laws in the several states differ widely. The color and shape of warning signs differ with each state line that is crossed. The speed limits are different. Light signals vary. Rules with relation to right and left turns are not the same, and there are many other differences such as enforcement provisions, weight loads, length of vehicles, distances to be maintained between vehicles, all of which serve to create confusion to the cross-country traveler, whether it be on the open highway or in a strange city.

How to straighten out this mess and bring about a marked reduction in the human toll exacted each year is the national problem

of this Committee. Help is being offered from all sources. Many suggestions are coming in from organizations, associations and individuals. Many of these are excellent, although some of them would settle the problem by going back to the use of the horse and buggy. One particular letter impressed me, because the man who wrote it has had a great deal of experience with law suits resulting from highway accidents. His suggestions were certainly objective and merit serious consideration.

They are as follows, and I quote them: "Speedometer readings from 30 to 45 miles per hour be painted amber; the numbers from 45 to 60 be painted red, and no numbers after 60, except the word, 'DANGER', that would flash on and off if the speed reaches or exceeded 60 miles per hour. (There is no legitimate purpose in having speedometer readings up to 120 miles per hour except as an inducement to speed.)"

"A small apparatus should be attached on top of the hood (where radiator emblems are now located) containing small lights, synchronized to work in connection with the speedometer. These lights would flash amber at 35 miles per hour, flash red at 45 miles per hour, and continue red without flashing at speeds over 60 miles per hour. This SPEED-O-METER would be visible to both the driver and other persons on the highway to alert both driver and public of the speed of the vehicle.

"The front part of the passenger seat next to the driver should be recessed back about six inches, with a foot rail, to remove the obstruction of the driver's vision to the right when those sitting in the front seat next to him have a tendency to sit forward.

"Statistics show that rarely are two taxicabs involved in an intersection accident and there are comparatively less accidents where the taxicab approaches the other driver's left."

Any suggestions that will help in finding a practical solution to an increasing difficult problem and one that involves the lives of and one that involves the lives of yourself and your children, will be deeply appreciated. I hope you will send them in.
