Voters Near Time Of Decision

Home Folks Start Campaign To Boost Candidacy Wheeler Man

Whether Wheeler County loses the important office of State Representative in Saturday's Democratic Primary, will be decided by how large a majority that voters of his home county give to State Representative Grainger McIlhany, candidate for re-election in the 87th district, composed of Gray, Collingsworth and Wheeler counties.

State Representative McIlhany is being contested by Johnny Willis, youthful Pampa resident who has been conducting a hard campaign, particularly in his heavily populated home county of Gray which has a potential vote of more than 10,000.

McIlhany, manager of the McIlhany Department Store of

Wheeler, has been spending as much time on his political campaign as his regular job permitted bus has been at a disadvantage in view of the fact his opponent has been able to devote his full time to the job of soliciting votes.

Because of measures he has consistently promoted in the interest of farm people, McIlhany has been publicly commended by the Texas Farm Bureau and other agricultural groups, and is expected to outrun his opponent in Collingsworth County which is predominantly rural. Likewise a portion of Gray county in the McLean area is considered favorable to the Wheeler county candidate.

Gray county supporters of McIlhany are emphasizing his author-

ship of the discriminatory tax on the manufacture of carbon black which resulted in keeping many valuable plant payrolls in the Panhandle. They are also citing State Representative McIlhany's repeated legislative battles against increases in the production tax on natural gas which were unfair to both royalty owners and producers.

Several Wheeler County friends have started a quiet campaign in behalf of McIlhany, urging local voters to support the home county man. They believe if Wheeler County voters give the Wheeler candidate the majority to which his past record entitles him, that he will have an excellent chance to be re-elected despite the heavy population of Gray county.

2,500 Are Registered For Saturday Primary

Wheeler county polls will open at 8 a.m., and close at 7 p.m., Saturday as local citizens join the Texas parade in the Democratic Primary to select nominees for precinct, county and state offices.

There have been a total of 2,501 polls registered, according to Tax Collector Thurman Rives, which would indicate a potential vote of around 2,800 including exemptions. In 1954 Wheeler county Democrats cast 2,728 ballots with 2,390 voters registered.

JUDGES NAMED TO SUPERVISE COUNTY VOTING

In order that prospective voters may have an opportunity to check with Democratic Precinct Committeemen regarding voter qualifications and where to vote, County Democratic Chairman A. B. Crump this week released a list of the election judges in each of the 15 regular county voting boxes.

Chairman Crump said polls will open at 8 a.m., and close at 7 p.m., and that voting will be at the customary places. He advised voters to check with the election judges on any other points needing clarification.

FARMERS VOTE TO RESTRICT WHEAT ACRES

Farmers voted last Friday for the fourth consecutive year to allow Uncle Sam to restrict the production and sale of wheat.

The vote in Wheeler County was 88 for and 11 against — a majority of 88 per cent.

Unofficial returns from the 36 wheat producing states gave 228,839 votes for federal marketing quotas and 32,767 against.

This was a favorable majority of 87.5 per cent, which is far in excess of the necessary two-thirds. In a similar referendum a year ago, producers voted 77.3 per cent in favor of quotas on this year's crop.

In approving controls, farmers assured themselves of a national average price of \$2 a bushel on next year's production, the same as this year. Under farm law, the price support would have dropped to around \$1.21 a bushel had the quotas been rejected.

Balloting will be at the customary places in all 15 county precincts. A. B. Crump, County Democratic Chairman, said in issuing an appeal for voters to go to the polls as early as possible so that counting of votes may be facilitated and outcome of local races made known sooner.

Despite the lack in number of contested precinct and county races, warmer than usual interest in Saturday's election would be indicated by the 130 absentee ballots that had been cast Tuesday afternoon as the deadline hour neared. Clerks in the office of Harry Wofford said 24 additional applications for ballots were received but ballots had not been cast up to Tuesday.

Democratic Chairman Crump warned all persons having absentee ballots which were notarized on or before July 24 that they must be in the office of the County Clerk at Wheeler by 1 p.m. Saturday to be counted. He said the ballots must be notarized prior to July 25 and must be mailed so as to reach the Clerk's office by 1 o'clock.

Wheeler County voters will find only two contested county races on their printed ballots—those of tax assessor-collector and county attorney, C. G. Cantrell, Jr., and B. F. Chance, Jr., both of Shamrock, are contesting Assessor-Collector Thurman Rives in his bid for re-election.

D. O. Beene of Wheeler and Jim Dougherty of Shamrock are asking election to the office of county attorney. Guy Hardin, incumbent, is not a candidate for re-election.

There are four candidates for commissioner in precinct No. 1; W. L. (Shorty) Erwin, incumbent, Shelby Pettit, Frank (Jacko) Lee, and Lewis Underwood. (Continued on last page)

Primary election results will be available to the public as rapidly as they are received from election judge of the 15 county boxes. A. B. Crump, County Democratic Chairman, said in requesting those holding the election to phone in the returns promptly after counting is completed.

There will be an election party held on the Courthouse lawn and the public is cordially invited.

In view of the small number of contested races it is expected that outcome of local races should be determined earlier than usual providing precinct election officials call in their returns immediately after completing their count.

3 PROPOSITIONS ARE SUBMITTED IN REFERENDUM

In the heat of campaigning by various precinct, county and state candidates, many Wheeler county citizens may have lost sight of the fact they will be called on to cast ballots on three referendum propositions when they get to the polls Saturday.

The referendum on intergraded schools, inter-marriage between white persons and negroes, and use of interposition to halt federal enforcement on state rights, was placed on the ballot when the State Democratic Executive Committee was directed to do so in petitions signed by more than 180,000 voters of Texas.

Robert Cargill, Chairman of the Texas Referendum Committee, said that Texans who opposed mixed schools, mixed marriages and "illegal" federal interference should vote "FOR" on all three propositions.

A majority of votes for the three questions would move them to a place in the official platform of the Democratic party of Texas (Continued on last page)

GET EXTENSION ON SOIL BANK

The final date for farmers to sign acreage agreements to put their land in the 1956 Soil Bank Program has been extended through July 27, according to Albert Marshall of the Wheeler county ASC office.

The disposition date for cotton has been extended through August 3 and disposition of wheat through August 27. As of July 20 Wheeler county had 102 agreements on wheat in the amount of \$29,214 and 42 agreements on cotton in the amount of \$10,460.

The county ASC officer said a penalty rate of 17.7c per pound has been announced on cotton produced in excess of allotments for 1956.

Safety Week is here, and with it comes reminders to be careful while doing your work at home. Studies have shown that a high percentage of home accidents occur during the times that you are cleaning house. Many of these could be avoided if house wives would use a normal amount of caution.

Some good general rules to follow are:

1. Take your time. Don't try to do too much in one day. When you hurry, that is when you might have an accident.
 2. Before you start cleaning, make sure you have the right tools to do each task properly and safely. Particularly, make sure the cords on your electrical cleaning appliances are in good condition.
 3. Avoid overwork and excessive fatigue, as a tired mind or body makes you an easy prey to accidents.
- Some additional safety rules to consider are:
- Use only ogod step ladders for reaching high places. A chair is a dangerous substitute.
 - Keep a wary eye on scatterer rugs and loose objects lying around rooms or on stairways.
 - Avoid lifting or carrying heavy objects that may cause a strain.
 - Double check all poisons used in the home to make sure they are well labeled and stored safely away from children.
 - Keep all oil-soaked rags in a closed metal container.
 - When waxing or varnishing the floors, be sure no particles are left on floor to cause dangerous skidding.
 - Use cleaning fluids only outdoors and stick to the non-toxic non-flammable compounds of which there are a number on the market.
 - Let's try to make Safety Week a truly safe week, and let it grow into a safe year.

On June 22, 1956, the Executive Office of the President, Bureau of the Budget, in answer to a question propounded by a Member of Congress concerning the public debt situation, gave out some very interesting information. The information being that at the end of fiscal year 1952 the national debt was 259 billion dollars. That interest on such debt was 5.9 billion dollars. This means that the American taxpayers at that time were paying, in interest alone, the staggering sum of approximately 16 million dollars every day.

This, however, is not the whole story. Because during the fiscal years since 1952 the debt has continued to move upward. At one time it moved upward to the highest point it has ever reached in the history of this nation. So high in fact, that the Congress had to pass legislation to authorize the Secretary of the Treasury to put this country into debt over and above the legal debt ceiling. I cast my vote against granting the Secretary of the Treasury such authority. Incidentally, he still has that authority and will, no doubt, use it as soon as tax collections begin to fall off. Because of the peak collection period in the spring and early summer, the national debt on June 30th was down some from the record high. The Bureau of the Budget said that it was 274 billions of dollars. That is an increase in the 4 years from 1952 to 1956 of 15 billions of dollars. This increase of 15 billions of dollars means an additional increase in the interest that has to be paid on the public debt. This increase in interest is 500 million dollars per year, or the additional sum each day of 1 million, 300 thousand

dollars. This means that the taxpayers of this country are now paying over 17 million dollars every day that passes for interest alone on the public debt.

The Secretary of the Treasury has been doing a lot of trumpet blowing lately about balancing the budget and you will, no doubt, hear a lot more about this in the future. Frankly, the whole picture is somewhat confusing. Yours Truly was never considered an outstanding genius in the field of mathematics. However, I have employed simple arithmetic in an effort to gain enlightenment, but no matter how I figured it, borrowing more money in order to balance your budget is a very difficult way to get out of debt. Perhaps this is a new method of financing that will work fine until pay day. The Secretary of the Treasury has been advertised as a very brilliant financier. I am wondering if he has discovered some new scheme of financing that permits the borrowing of money without worrying about having to pay it back. If so, he really is a genius.

CONGRESS WASTES A WEEK

During these last days of this session, both of the major parties have permitted a complete week to be wasted for the sake of politics. I have reference to the time that has been consumed in the debate on H. R. 627, the mis-named Civil Rights Bill. The leadership in both parties are grasping and clamoring for the credit of having passed this bill through the House. The bill was written by the Attorney General (lawyer?) Brownell, and has been repeatedly referred to in the debate as the Eisenhower Civil Rights Bill. Everyone who has read the bill recognizes it for what it really is, a loosely drawn, political Mother Hubbard intended to cover everything and touch nothing. From a Constitutional standpoint it is about as legal as murder with malice aforethought. The bill itself, coupled with the political

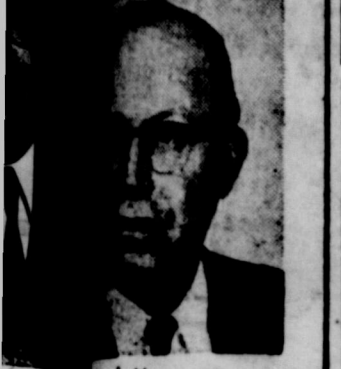

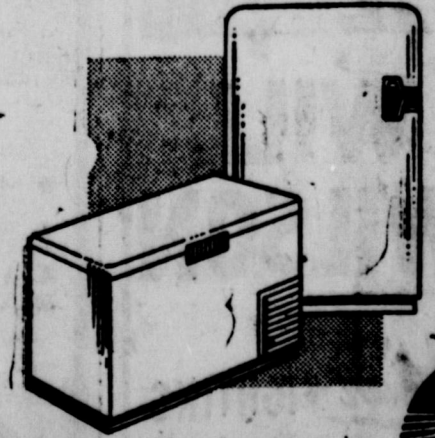

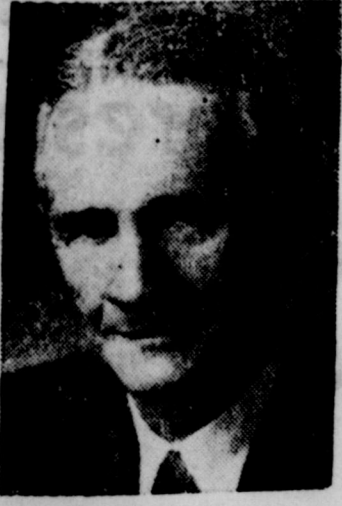

and from that point action will be up to the State Legislature which would be expected to act favorably upon such an expression from the voters of Texas. (NO. 1) FOR (or against) specific legislation exempting any child from compulsory attendance at integrated schools attended by white persons and negroes. (NO. 2) FOR (or Against) specific legislation perfecting State Laws against inter-marriage between white persons and negroes. (NO. 3) FOR (or Against) the use of Interposition to halt illegal Federal encroachment.

Chairman Cargill in discussing the proposals pointed out that the one relating to schools is not in defiance of any existing court rulings, but would merely provide a free choice of schools for all school children of Texas. "Regardless of personal feelings on the part of anyone in the segregation issue, no fair-minded person could deny that the individuals of both races are entitled to free choice in the matter of school attendance," he said.

Commenting on the second question he said: "Because of recent ruling to outlaw segregation of the races in public schools, parks, playgrounds and on trains and buses, stronger state laws against intermarriage are necessary to protect the social customs so long accepted and observed."

The third question calling for Interposition is described by Cargill as "The legal means by which a state objects to the Federal action in cases where people of the state feel that rights reserved to the states have been violated."
