Property Values In City Are Set

Total gross valuations amount to approximately \$4,000,000, a spokesman of the board said, and the basis for the new valuations is 32 per cent of actual value. Property owners are being notified they may appear before the board in County Commissioners Court room between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., on Tuesday, June 26, for the purpose of hearing on the new valuations.

DEATH CLAIMS ROBERT IRONS

Death again thinned the ranks of Wheeler's senior citizens with the passing of Robert Irons, 79. Mr. Irons died at 1:30 p.m., a few hours after being admitted to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Always well and active, Mr. Irons was stricken at his home on April 15 while working on a crowding pen for his sheep preparatory to shipping a load. Two days later, not feeling better, he went to Amarillo for medical examination. He had remained there since that time, staying at the home of a daughter and receiving treatment from specialists. "Uncle Bob" as he affectionally known to old and young in Wheeler was a familiar figure daily on the streets of his beloved home town. It is unlikely that any person loved Wheeler and its people more than he; and it was an unusual day that did not find him in town visiting with his neighbors and friends. In the past few years his failing eyesight had caused him sorrow and much concern; but his keen hearing and ability to recognize everyone by his voice kept him in close touch with family and friends. MRS. SPIKES BURIED HERE

Funeral services were conducted in Richerson Chapel at Shamrock last Friday for Mrs. Frances Spikes, 77, former Wheeler county treasurer, who died Wednesday in Shamrock General Hospital. Interment was in Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Richerson Funeral Home. Rev. Jim H. Sharp, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Shamrock, officiated at the funeral service. Mrs. Spikes was born September 2, 1878, in Mississippi and came to Wheeler County with her parents in 1906. Her father, the late Judge J. B. Reynolds, established the first law practice in Wheeler. Mrs. Spikes taught school, served as county treasurer and was postmaster at Wheeler before her marriage to J. A. Spikes in 1911. The couple moved to Springfield, Colo., where they lived for several years before moving to Arkansas. They returned to Shamrock in 1948. She is survived by her husband, J. S. Spikes; a sister, Miss Agnes Reynolds of Shamrock, and two brothers, M. Reynolds of Shamrock and Arlington, and Dennis G. Reynolds of Guyton, Okla.

TO STUDY HIWAY FATAL MISHAPS

Appointment of a five-member subcommittee to investigate traffic deaths was announced today by Chairman J. Percy Priset of the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce. Chairman of the subcommittee is Rep. Kenneth A. Roberts (D., Ala.), author of a resolution adopted by the House on March 27 authorizing an investigation of highway fatalities by the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee. Other members of the subcommittee are Representative Walter Rogers (D., Tex.), Samuel L. Friedel (D., Md.), John V. Beamer (R., Ind.), and Paul F. Schenck (R., Ohio). The subcommittee will study all factors involved in the increasing number of traffic deaths. Chairman Priset said. This will include speed, intoxication, unsafe vehicles, inadequate laws, and poor highway conditions. The subcommittee will try to determine what steps can be taken by the Federal government to reduce fatal highway accidents. Chairman Roberts called a meeting of the special subcommittee for 10 o'clock Thursday morning. It will be a closed session to discuss procedure. "We plan a thorough investigation," he said. "One knows the answer to the problem of what must be done to reduce the appalling highway death toll, costing nearly 40,000 lives a year, but we are going to look into this as thorough as possible. I am sure we can come up with some definite and consaructive suggestions after we study the views of experts who have studied this problem."

CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS

The predictions as to when Congress will adjourn are increasing daily. Most of the older and more experienced prognosticators talk about the 15th of July, which really means August 1st. Add 15 days to the last figure, and you have an approximate time for the adjournment of Congress, if past history can be used as a yardstick. I had predicted that we would get out about July 15th, and I feel that this date is about right, give or take 5 days either way. However, it must be remembered that there are several additional elements to be considered this year. One of these would be the National Conventions of the Parties. Since the Republican Convention is not expected to provide any fireworks, it is not anticipated that the Republicans would be anxious to adjourn early in order to make preparation for their Convention. But, it must be remembered that the Republican Party is the minority party in Congress, and that it has always been good policy for the minority party to bring about the earliest adjournment possible. The theory being that the longer the Congress is in session, the longer the majority party has to do things that might have extra appeal to the voters. The Democrats will, no doubt, be pressing for an early adjournment, because the National Convention of their Party bids fair to provide an ample of fireworks. Such probability necessitates much preparation by all of the factions concerned, not only for the purpose of furnishing their part of the fireworks, but also for the purpose of setting up sufficient defenses to prevent themselves from being annihilated when the lid goes off. So, the Democrats will not be anxious to continue (Continued on last page)

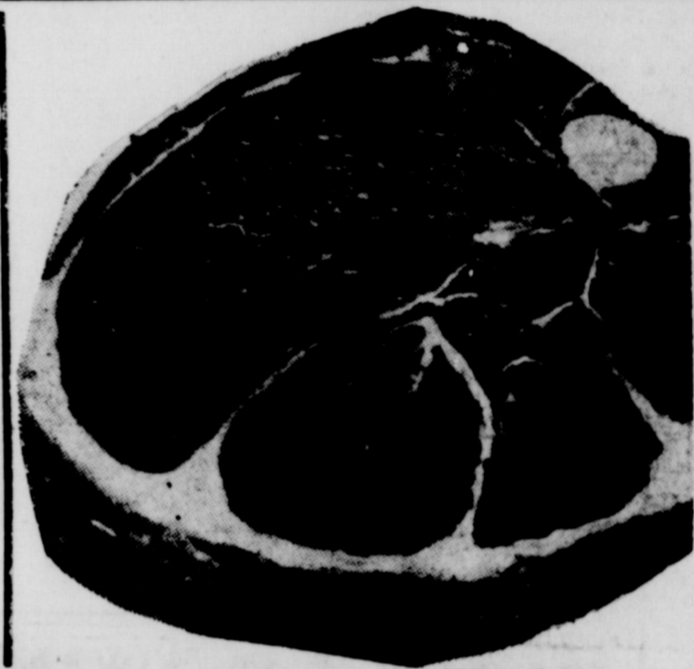

Conservation

Summer legumes for soil im-
provement should be planted in
the next three weeks. Most com-
mon summer legumes are cowpeas
and guar. Both are good soil con-
ditioners and will increase soil
fertility.

Jake Allen of Mobeetie has used
cowpeas for several years on sandy
land with very good results. B. A.
Schlegel of Shamrock used guar
last year in strips with cotton. If
the strips that are not in cotton
are four or more rows wide, the
area will be measured out when
cotton acreage is measured.

Grass crops are also good soil
conditioners. The fine root system
of grasses adds organic matter to
the soil in its best form. When
grasses are planted for soil im-
provement, it is best to use the
one that will make most growth
on the soil being planted. It is
not necessary to consider season
of use or palatability.

The Board of Supervisors, at
their June meeting, decided to
start overhauling their grass drills
for next year. They will begin on
the one located with the Wheeler
FFA boys.

Soil Conservation Service per-
sonnel assisting the Wheeler Dis-
trict report that nearly 300 acres
of newly seeded grass is up to a
stand. A number of fields have not
been checked. They hope to have
at least another 1000 acres this
year.

citizens, having come to Wheeler with his family on March 13, 1918. At that time the family moved to their section of land two miles west of Wheeler where he was living at the time of his death. During this almost 40 years he had continued his residence here except for a few years he lived in Canyon while his daughters were attending college. It was his particular pride that he was able to give each of his children a college education. He was a stockman in the best tradition of the cattle country and sincerely loved and personally cared for his cattle each day until his fatal illness. Just recently, in spite of being at an age when most men retire, he had added a herd of sheep to his livestock. During his illness his constant thoughts were of when he would be able to return to Wheeler. All of his hopes and plans for the future began and ended that way. On May 2 he was able to return to Wheeler for a few hours visit with friends and too see about his

stock. Although he was critically ill for the past 7 weeks, he was never bedfast. He was able to dress and be up and about the house a large portion of each day. Last Tuesday he became worse but continued to be able to be up until Friday. He became much worse Friday night and was so critical Saturday morning that he was taken to the hospital. However, his death was very sudden and unexpected. Funeral services to the memory of Mr. Irons were held Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler, of which he was a member. The final rites were read by Rev. M. B. Smith, minister of the Trinity Baptist Church of Pampa and former pastor of the local church. Rev. Darrell Taylor, minister of the church, sang "Oh, Come Angel Band" and "Sunrise Tomorrow" as special music. Mrs. Harold Loyd Lee was at the piano. Mr. Irons was born November 16, 1876 at Blackjack Grove, now known as Cumby, Texas, Hopkins County, the son of Jonathan and Rebecca Bledsoe Irons. One son, Robert Lincoln Irons, preceded him in death.

Pallbearers were Loyd Lee, Ed Riley, Kenneth Franklin, Bus Walker, Marion "Spud" Moore and Loubet Moore. Honorary pallbearers, all friends of many years were J. C. Moore, R. G. the session longer than absolutely necessary. To these reasons we can add the further non-partisan, or perhaps better, "bi-partisan" desires on the part of many to terminate this session before some highly controversial legislation hits the floor. Every legislative body is confronted with such measures. They could probably be termed, legislative time bombs. These measures usually involve some such matter that is hotly opposed in one section of the country, but very popular in another; or, some subject matter that may be look-

ed upon with great favor by one segment of the economy, but equally disipised by another segment. The division is many times so very close on these measures that both the proponents and opponents are hesitant to see them brought up. They find themselves in somewhat the same position as the two little boys who were about to have a fight. Each one was scared of the other, and both were glad of it. In any event you can see that the chances for early adjournment appear to be good, and I'll stick to my first prediction — July 15th — give or take 5 days either way.
