Grass fires should not be taken lightly. Grass is one of the Wheeelr District's greatest natural resources and deserves to be treated accordingly.

The extended drought has reduced growth on most ranges and the subsequent over grazing has left much of our range with little or no cover to burn. There are many acres of good grass, however, that will continue to be a hazard until general rains relieve conditions.

The District has about 50,000 acres of grassland that still have enough feed to winter the cattle now on them. There are nearly 20,000 acres that have been rested all summer to have grass for this winter. Clipping tests made recently by Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the district showed 700 to 800 pounds of usable hay per acre on grassland of G. W. 




