Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the district will be glad to help farmers select land for the Soil Bank, Soil surveys are available on a lot of cropland and a limited amount can be made for this purpose. These surveys can help a farmer decide what land he should put into the bank and are just as helpful in deciding what kind of grass or legume is best adapted to that particular land. Very few grasses are equally adapted to all soils.
