**STEER FATENA MAKES NEWS** at RESEARCH Farm FEEDLOTS

We think this shows in a very convincing manner that cattle makes good use of Steer Fatena in turning silage and corn into beef.

A group of 800-lb. steers took only 153 days to put on gains of 400 lbs. apiece in a recent Purina Farm test. They went across the finish scales at an average of 1,227 lbs. A check of the records showed that each 100 lbs. of gain took only 5.2 bushels of corn, 106 lbs. of Purina Steer Fatena, plus 1,225 lbs. of corn silage.

These steers were on full feed of silage and Steer Fatena for the first 93 days. During the last 60 days they got 1 lb. of silage per 100 lbs. live weight and a full

### TITLE CHECK ESSENTIAL IN BUYING HOME

Thinking of buying a new home? How will you know whether you are receiving a good title to the property you purchase? The safest method is to have a title examination made — that is, a careful study of the abstract and other title evidence.

Many persons sign "earnest money contracts" believing that they are more receipts with no serious implications. In reality they may specify, among other things, the kind of title you must accept.

A "warranty deed" from a responsible seller is comforting to have but it is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. A warranty deed does not guarantee a marketable title.

Moreover, serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller on a warranty deed is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt. Even if he

It is available a good title is much better than a law suit. The fact that the seller has possession of an "abstract" does not mean that he owns the property. An abstract is only a history of a title. Possession of an abstract no more indicates ownership of land than possession of the history of Texas means that you own the state. Some purchasers of land feel safe because the title is being examined at the time of purchase by an attorney for the mortgage lenders. This seems logical but is a dangerous theory. Mortgage lenders are sometimes willing to accept less than good record title as security. This is sound business for them because, among other reasons, the chances are that the mortgage will be paid off so that no expense in perfecting the title would ever need be incurred. It is risky business for you when you are putting your life savings into the purchase. These are a few of the reasons why a title examination is an important safeguard to you. When it is completed, the attorney gives you a written opinion stating his conclusions as to who owns the land and the defects in or charges against

Words alone are hardly adequate to describe the devastation of the drought. On my recent trip home from Washington, I came by air to Dallas then to Amarillo. I stopped over in Dallas for two days and had an opportunity to visit some of the surrounding towns and talk to many of the people. The view of the country from the plane as you arrive actually foretells the tragedy, but when you hear from the mouths of natives who have lived in this section of the country for many years that this is the worst drought we have ever experienced, you then fully realize how deeply serious is the problem.

The hardest foliage in Northeast Texas is perishing for the want of a few life-giving drops of water. But water is rationed. In those places where some is available for purposes other than human consumption, the price is prohibitive. Several told me of water bills for one month of \$60, \$70 and \$80. This, in a section of Texas that has usually had an ample water supply.

There has been much talk in recent years about capturing the continually expanding population and the demands for water, incidental thereto and associated therewith. surface water, preventing the waste of some 85% of it that flows into the ocean. However the talk has not captured much of the water. There has been a definite move in the direction of water conservation and the initiating of water projects designed to cope with the problem. But, relatively speaking, the action has not been in keeping with the present needs and certainly not in keeping with future needs.

As you move West, the situation gets worse, in so far as the drought is concerned, but the people have had more experience with dry weather. Underground water supplies in many of the West Texas towns have saved the day, but these have been hard pressed in these six years of drought.

Many feel that this will be the last year, and that the rains will come next year; that this winter will bring soaking snows. In fact everyone is praying for this relief, and let us all hope it will be forthcoming. But if it does come, let us not forget what we have been through, let us not forget that unless we take immediate steps to provide ample water for the future, that in a few short years we will again face the same devastation. At that time it could be much worse because of the

Among its best qualities are a high seedling vigor and ability to produce stands, a winter-hardiness, a high average protein content. The good seed strength of the new variety apparently is due to the fact that its seeds are considerably larger than those of other strains of sidecoats grama.

The sidecoats gramas, as a species, are a "mid-grass." They cure on the stem better than tall grasses, but not as well as the short grasses. They are deep-rooted drawing moisture from as far down as seven feet.

**Wheeler County Soil Conservation District News**

District cooperators within the Wheeler Soil Conservation District need to plan now, areas to be reseeded this coming spring. This is the time of year most feed stubble is grazed. Those areas to be reseeded to permanent grass next spring can be grazed but enough cover left to keep the land protected. Of course land put in the Conservation Reserve with the ASC committee can not be grazed. Soil Conservation Service technicians have been working with the local Soil Conservation District supervisors in locating available grass seed. Some of the native grass seed are not available at present and some seed dealers are not quoting their prices. O. O. Tate a cooperator with our local Soil Conservation district has about 6,000 pounds of weeping lovegrass seed for sale. At present we have been unable to locate any sand lovegrass seed.

While discussing grasses the District Supervisors and Soil Conservation Service personnel would like to encourage all district cooperators to be on their guard against grass fires. If hunting is allowed, caution the hunters to be careful with matches and cigarettes. A careless fire could destroy your pasture very easily and cause undue hardship this coming winter and spring.

**TRAFFIC RECORD ENDS**

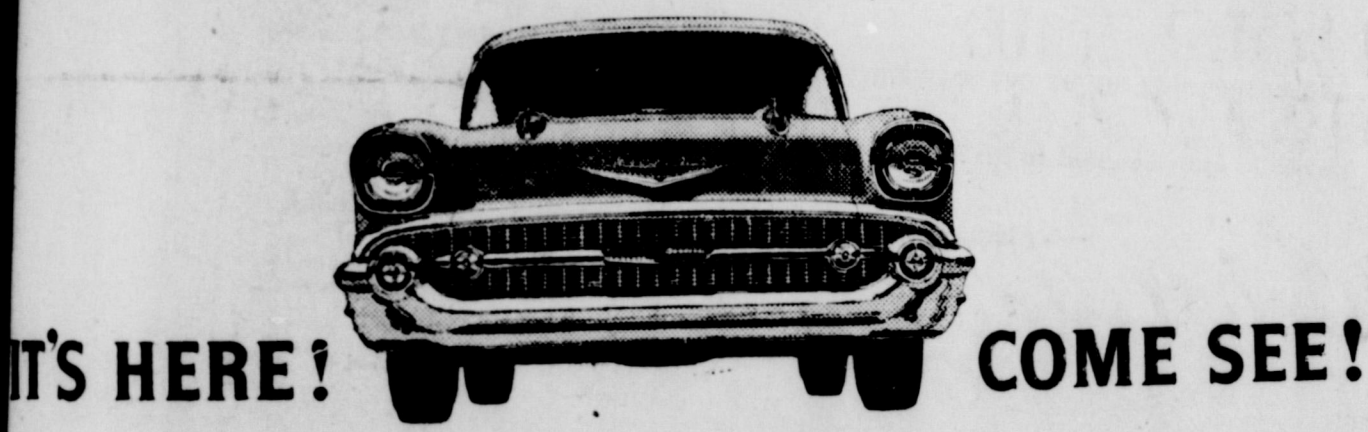

stick with their profession, it provides that no person would be eligible for retirement who has not been employed at least 10 years, and who has not reached the age of 55 or completed 30 years of service.

Those who leave such employment before they are eligible to retire, however, would be entitled to a refund of monies paid into the fund.

Seven thousand experienced teachers leave the profession each year. The profession must either hold a substantial number of these or recruit 28,000 new teachers to replace them.

Statistics show that by 1960, 350,000 additional children will be enrolled in Texas' public schools, and 15,000 new teachers will be needed. This 15,000 does not allow for the 7,000 that leave the field each year unless something is done to keep them.

Amendment No. 4 is a step in a good direction, aimed at making the teaching profession in Texas more attractive as a lifetime career.

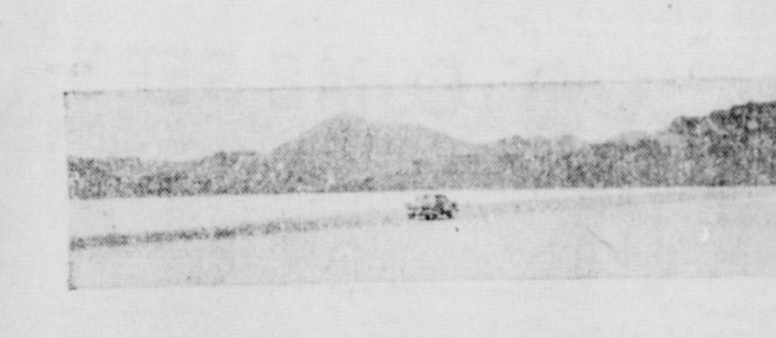

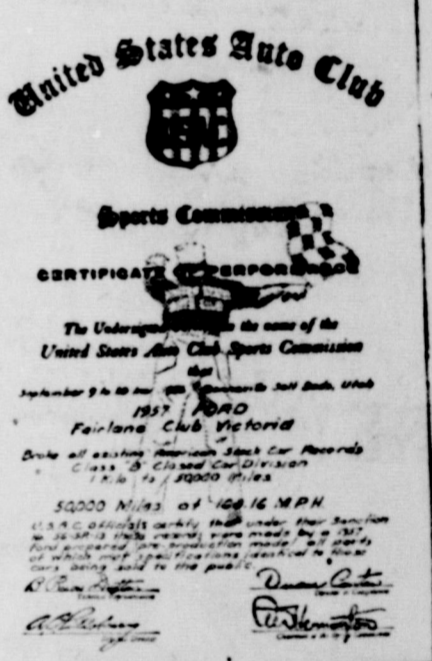
