Thirty-eight absentee ballots had been cast and 28 applications received at the office of County Clerk Harry Wofford up to noon Tuesday, and predictions are being made that Wheeler County voters may duplicate their feat of 1952 by casting a record-shattering number of ballots in next Tuesday's General Election.

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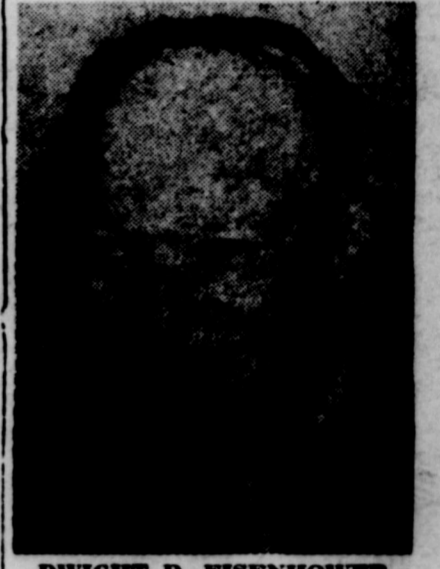
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DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER

Wheeler County has a potential vote of approximately 3,000, and if voters go to the polls as some observers are predicting, there could be an all-time record set. In 1952, a total of 3,199 ballots were cast to shatter previous records. Eisenhower carried the county by a margin of 91 votes, with the Republican candidate scoring a slight majority in the north seven county boxes and Stevenson carrying the south eight boxes by a few votes.

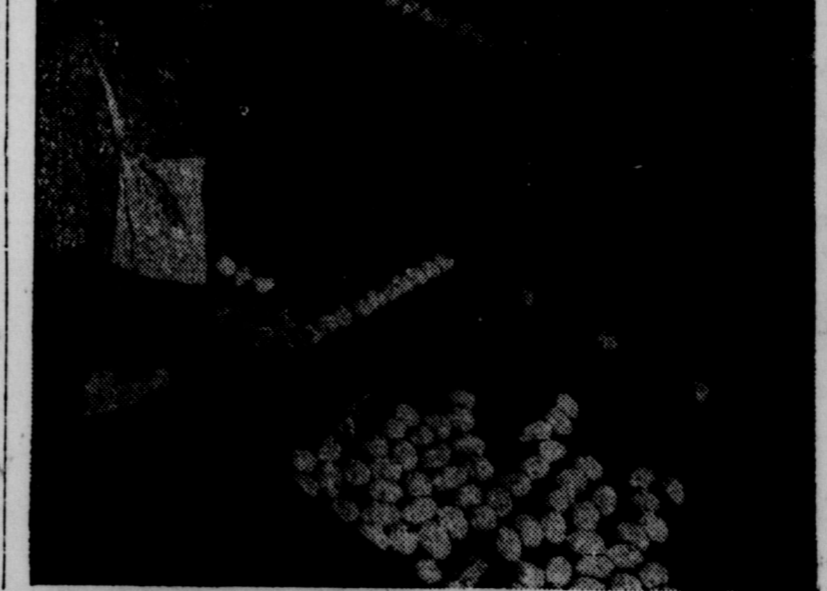
### ELECTRIC EGG HANDLING HELPS PROFITS

Of all the world's manufacturing enterprises, only the hen "manufactures" and "packages" its product in a natural protective covering, ready for immediate use by the consumer. Poor egg handling practices can undo all the effort that the hen puts into its product. Quality and value can be lowered by failure to clean eggs which are dirty, failure to keep eggs cool (authorities recommend 55 degrees for daily or weekly marketing of fresh eggs) and failure to properly candle eggs. At the Ayers Feed Company, in Slaton, Texas, these problems have been solved through the use of electric egg cleaners, electric refrigeration and electric egg candling. Charles G. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, today announced the reactivation of the AFBP Cotton Committee to give specific study to the establishment of a non-governmental cotton classing review board...

This action is a direct result of efforts by Texas Farm Bureau leaders to obtain accurate classing of cotton by the government's Smith-Doxey classing service.

A Congressional hearing — requested by Farm Bureau leaders — was held Sept. 18 in Greenville. One result of the hearing was a promise by members of the cotton subcommittee of the House Agriculture Committee that the Congress will act immediately after it convenes in January to get a "light spots" classification for cotton put in the government loan.

The net result of this as been that most of this year's cotton crop has been forced into the government loan.

Do You Get Enough Milk?  
Milk is one of the best foods you can get. It furnishes about 100 dif-

ferent nutrients—a long list of vitamins, and minerals, fats, sugars, and high-quality proteins.

Milk is outstandingly important for three nutrients that people should use in larger quantities. These are the mineral calcium, the vitamin riboflavin, and protein. Three-fourths of the calcium, nearly half of the riboflavin, and one-fourth of the protein in our country's food supply come from milk. It is hard to get enough calcium or riboflavin without using a good deal of milk.

Nutritionists consider calcium needs chiefly when they figure the amounts of milk to include in daily food for good nutrition. From infancy all the way through the teens, it takes large amounts of calcium to keep up with the growing body's calcium needs.

Prospective mothers and nursing mothers need a great deal of milk for calcium. Here are the amounts recommended for use daily: children, 3 to 4 cups; teen-agers, 1 quart or more; adults, 1 pint or more; expectant mothers, 1 quart or more; nursing mothers, 3 pints. Milk products, such as cheese and ice cream, and prepared dishes made with milk can provide some of this quota. So can skim milk or buttermilk, especially for those whom weight control may be a problem.

In up-to-date diets for losing weight or gaining weight, milk is relied on as a basic food. When reducing weight is the goal, milk

shake up the list of colleges under the building fund financed by the state and would make the university of Texas and Texas A&M system responsible for financing their own building programs.

Texas Southern University and Lamar State College, both established since the original amendment was passed, would be added to the list of colleges included in the college building fund financed by the present five-cent ad valorem tax.

Texas Western College, Tarleton State College, Arlington State College would be moved over to the permanent university fund.

Proponents claim the amendment would provide a method of financing permanent improvements at all state institutions of higher learning without further drains on the states' general revenue fund. No new tax and no extension of the ad valorem tax is provided.

tor in 19 per cent of the fatal accidents in Texas. Last year, that figure had been reduced to 5 per cent.

"These figures show beyond a doubt that a person whose car is of good mechanical condition is much less likely to be involved in a fatal accident," Morris said. "A person who waits until the last minute to get his car inspected is taking a dangerous gamble with his own life."

Last year, 43 per cent of the vehicles inspected in Texas needed some adjustment or repair, and the average cost for such services was only eighty-eight cents, according to the Department of Public Safety.
