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





Texas Southern University and Lamar State College, both established since the original amendment was passed, would be added to the list of colleges included in the college building fund financed by the present five-cent ad valorem tax

Texas Western College, Tarleton State College Arlington State ollege would be moved over to the permanent university fund.

Proponents claim the amendment would provide a method of financing permanent improvementh at all state institutions of higher learning without further drains on the states' general revenue fund. No new tax and no extension of the ad valorem tax is provided.






