C. J. VAN ZANDT NEW PRESIDENT STATELINE FAIR

C. J. Van Zandt, Wheeler rancher, was elected president of the State-Line Free Fair at a meeting of directors held in the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce office Thursday night when plans were put in motion to expand the facilities and program of the annual exposition.

Representing Wheeler at the state-line meeting were: Vara Crippen, county home demonstration agent; Bryan Swain, county agent; and Dick Guynes, manager of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, and Van Zandt.

Willie Knoll of Collingsworth county who has served as president the past two years, was elected vice president, and Mrs. C. G. Cantrell of Shamrock was named secretary-treasurer.

Plans for an ambitious Fair in 1957 indicate that about the only things that will remain the same is the name.

Erection of an additional livestock barn so animals may be kept on display for two days, the addition of poultry exhibits, and the inclusion of free entertainment such as a street parade, (Continued on last page)

ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL URGED

The average daily attendance in Wheeler Schools has dropped from 357 for the first six weeks to 349 at the close of the second six weeks period, according to A. E. Brown, Superintendent of Schools. However, enrollment has increased for the entire twelve weeks period in 353.

School officials are stressing attendance and are trying to maintain the average daily attendance at 348 or above for the entire school year. Mr. Brown announced that it is necessary to maintain the attendance at such a figure in order to qualify for an additional teacher which was lost from the 1955-56 term due to a decrease in attendance.

Parents are urged to have their children in school every day that it is possible unless they are ill and unable to attend.

W. B. WOODRUFF BURIED HERE

Funeral rites were held at the Baptist Church in Wheeler Wednesday afternoon for Willie B. Ervin Woodruff, 85 years old, former Wheeler resident who died in Pampa on December 10.

Mr. Woodruff came to Wheeler county from Fannin County, Texas, in 1940, and resided here until 1950 when he moved to Pampa to make his home with his children.

Born in Florence County, Alabama, September 4, 1871, Mr. Woodruff was a member of the Methodist church at Grice, Texas. He was a farmer.

MURDER TRIAL DATE IS SET

District Judge Lewis M. Goodrich set the date for trial of James Whiteard on a charge of murder with malice in the death of Victor Lee Stephens, for Monday, January 21, in Wheeler.

The judges said a special venire of 120 persons would be called. Names of persons to make up the venire were drawn this week.

Whiteard, survivor of a pair of gunmen who terrorized the Shamrock area Saturday night, December 1, pleaded not guilty Thursday afternoon in Wheeler to three of four charges filed against him.

Whiteard, 20, of Phoenix, Ariz., was arraigned on the charges of murder with malice of Stephens, Shamrock farm youth, and two assaults with intent to murder charges, according to District Attorney Bill Waters.

Waters held the charge of murder with malice of Whiteard's half-brother, Junior B. Myers in obedience pending the outcome of the trials on the other charges.

Other action scheduled by the District Court in Wheeler County was a hearing on parole violations of two brothers. The brothers are Cornelius Evans and Texola Evans, both of Wheeler County.

GAS PIPELINE COMPLETION IS SET FOR 1957

Natural Gas Pipe Line Company of America hopes to complete a 350-mile gas line from the fields of Wise and Jack Counties to Fritch by the latter part of 1957, according to N. D. Bartlett, oil editor of the Amarillo News and Globe-Times.

The line will cross Wheeler County, passing just north of Wheeler.

"Several sales meters, warehouses and cottages for personnel will be built along the line with a warehouse and cottage near Wheeler," Mr. Bartlett reported.

Permission to build the line was granted by the Federal Power Commission last week, following an effort of more than two years on the part of Natural Gas Pipe Line Company of America.

Cost of the line will be \$238,487,000 plus \$3,583,000 for producing and gathering facilities. The line will consist of 90 miles of 20-inch and 260 miles of 26-inch.

Route of the line is a point near the Lindsay field of Oklahoma, then northwest to near the Bradley field in Oklahoma, then on to Fritch, north of Amarillo.

Construction headquarters will be at Chickasha, Okla.

Gas reserves are estimated at 714 billion cubic feet.

reader sentences for trespass than if no signs were used.

Under the law it is not necessary even to use signs. The inclosing of lands inside a fence or natural barrier is null that is necessary. This applies to farming land or to grazing land. If it is not fenced or set off by a natural barrier it is not inclosed. The section of the trespass law applicable as given by Mr. Davis follows:

It shall be unlawful for any person to enter upon the INCLOSED land of another without consent of the owner, proprietor or agent in charge thereof, and therein hunt with firearms or therein catch or take or attempt to catch or take any fish from any pond, lake, tank, or stream, or therein camp, or in any manner deplete upon the same. By "INCLOSED LANDS" is meant such lands as are in use for agriculture or grazing purposes or for any other purpose, and inclosed by any structure for fencing either of wood or iron or combination thereof, or wood and wire, or partly by water or stream, canyon, brush, rock or rocks, bluffs or island. Proof of ownership or lease may be made by patrol testimony.

FAMILY INCOME FHA BORROWERS UP 50 PER CENT

Annual gross cash income grew from \$4,880, to \$8,021 in five years for a group of Texas farm families who obtained Farmers Home Administration farm ownership loans in 1950 to buy, enlarge, or improve their farms, the agency's State Director Walter T. McKay reported today.

The average net worth for these Texas farm families advanced from \$7,301 before they received their farm ownership loans to approximately \$10,900 at the end of their fifth year of operation under that loan program.

Before the loans were made the average family in the group was operating 189 acres but was operating 224 acres in 1955. The combined value of equipment and productive livestock owned by the average family in the group was \$4,598 before the loan was made, and was approximately \$6,686 in 1955.

Figures showing these advances, together with five-year progress along other lines, come from a survey of 1955 borrowers who obtained loans in 1950. A similar survey is made each year. The 1956 figures will be available in 1957 showing five-year progress made by those who got their loans in 1951.

Farm ownership loans are made to buy family-type farms, enlarge undersized farms, develop farms, and refinance debts. Funds come from private lenders under the insured loan program or from annually appropriated funds, and are amortized for periods up to 40 years. On an average the loans are repaid in 9 years.

Insured loans are limited to 90 percent of the fair and reasonable value of the farm. A loan to buy a family-type farm cannot be made if the fair and reasonable

FIELD PRICE GAS CLIMBS

A continuing increase in the average wellhead price of natural gas in the Panhandle Field was shown in a semi-annual report of the State Railroad Commission released Monday of this week.

A price of 9.6800 cents per 1,000 cubic feet at a base pressure of 14.65 pounds per square inch this November compared with 9.2332 cents last May and 8.9073 cents a year ago.

An average price of 10.8251 cubic feet at a base pressure of 16.4 pounds per square inch compared with 10.3361 cents last May and 9.9713 cents a year ago.

Price average were determined at a hearing conducted by the commission in Amarillo. The next meeting is set for May 8, 1957. The commission is required by law to hold annual or semi-annual hearings to determine the average market paid for gas produced in the Panhandle Field and used and sold for light and fuel purposes.

FARMER SOCIAL SECURITY TOLD

According to a statement from John R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, most Panhandle farmers will have enough social security coverage at the end of 1956 to qualify for social security insurance. All such farmers who are 65 years of age and who reported as much as \$400 in profits for each of the years 1955 and 1956 will be eligible for social security monthly payments.

For these farmers to receive such payments they must either be 72 years of age or be retired to the extent that they do not expect 1957 profits to be more than \$1200, Sanderson says. Even if profits for 1957 are expected to be more than \$1200, however, payments for some months in 1957 can be made if profits do not exceed \$2,080.

Farmers who expect to file application for social security payments after the end of 1956 are advised by Sanderson:

Have an extra copy of your 1956 income tax return prepared for the Social Security Office.

Claim all allowable expenses on your income tax returns, including depreciation, insurance, and taxes.

Do NOT include crop or cash rentals as income unless as the land owners you were active in the farm operations.

Do NOT include income from sale of machinery or from sale of livestock which had been held primarily for dairy or breeding purposes rather than held primarily for sale.

When contacting the social security office, bring a copy of your 1956 tax return which the social security office can keep and bring your cancelled check or money receipt showing taxes have been paid. Also bring oldest available written document showing your date of birth or age.

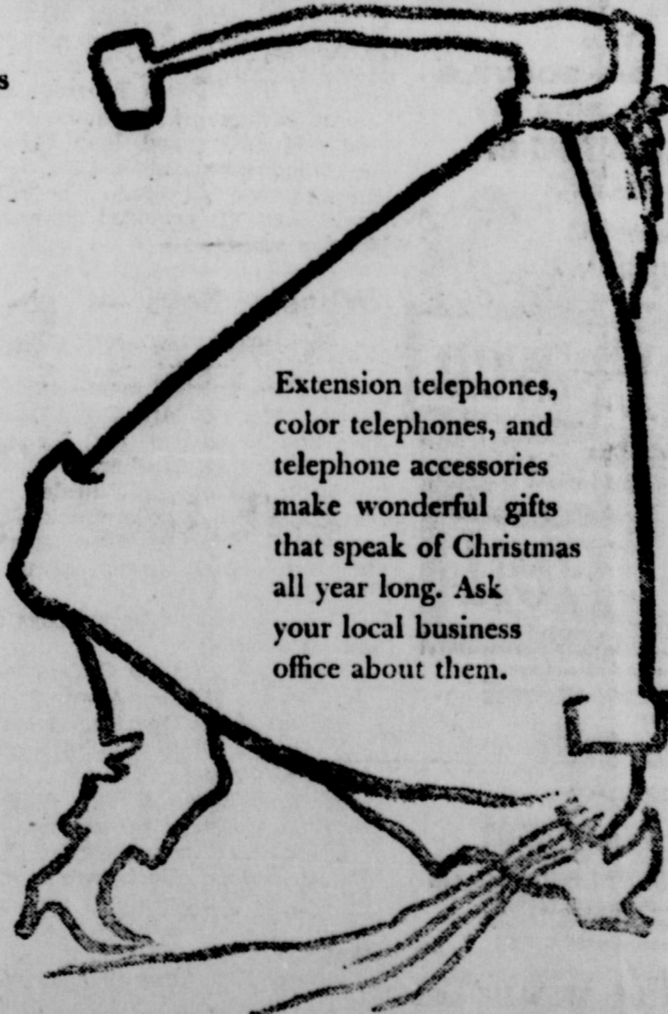

SURVIVAL 'HARDWARE'
FCDA Stockpiles Would Aid U. S. After Huge Attack

One of the world's largest "hardware dealers" sells no merchandise, has an 80,000-ton "inventory" which is constantly increasing, and hopes that none of the "hardware" will ever be used.

This vast stockpile of machinery and supplies, housed in 65 warehouses across the nation, is the Federal Civil Defense Administration's store of items which would be urgently and immediately needed if the United States were ever attacked.

IT INCLUDES such widely diverse items as medical supplies and blood "expanders" (chemicals which augment whole blood), portable emergency hospitals, gasoline-operated pumps, generators and water purifiers, and radiological "survey meters" for detecting fallout.

FCDA warehouses of all types are located from 50 to 100 miles from most major target areas in the nation, the size of the stockpile depending on the size and potential need of the target city.

While FCDA stockpiles are primarily for man-made disaster, they have also played a vital role in some recent floods.

The cities of Easton, Stroudsburg, and Scranton, Pa., depended on emergency pumps and purifiers for their city water in August 1955. FCDA medical supplies and 600 cots alleviated human suffering in Marysville and Yuba City, Calif., in December 1955, while pumps bailed out inundated Yuba City.

years may now be able to achieve maximum recovery through new treatment methods. To help the severely disabled, \$5,000,000 of the money raised in January will provide for intensified rehabilitation. Additional millions will support 20 respiratory and rehabilitation centers.

\$10,000,000 of 1957 March of Dimes funds will help provide protection for those unable to afford or obtain vaccinations.

The March of Dimes must continue to finance training of physicians, physical therapists and others urgently needed to fight polio.

March of Dimes grants supported the research that led to the Salk vaccine. Scientists are now searching for even more effective, long-lasting vaccines that are easier to make and administer. Clinical researchers will continue work to improve methods for treating the disabled.

These are the polio programs — the unfinished business — the March of Dimes must tackle in 1957.
