

Blockhouse Honors Hero

Built by the British as a stronghold to repel Indian raids in the early 18th century, this blockhouse at Erie, Pa., is preserved in honor of an American Revolutionary War hero, General Anthony Wayne. A new fire-resistant asphalt roof now protects

A two-century-old blockhouse still stands on the site of the British-built "lake posts" at Erie, Pa., a memorial to one of America's great Revolutionary War generals, Anthony Wayne.

The blockhouse has been preserved in all its original detail except for the roof, which has been protected with fire-resistant asphalt shingles, the same material used on most new homes.

Wayne, who earned the nick-name "Mad Anthony" for his feats of incredible daring at the lake posts while in command of occupational forces there in 1796.

At his request, he was buried at the base of the blockhouse, but his remains were removed ten years later to the Wayne family burial ground in Radnor, Pa.
