## GAS PIPELINE THROUGH HERE YOW ASSURED

The Federal Power Commission has turned down an appilcation of Lone Star Gas Company for a rehearing on a 350-mile pipeline authorization awarded Natural Gas Pipeline Company of Chicago in December.

In its December ruling, the PFC authorized Natural to build a line from Jack, Wise and Parker Counties to its transmission faci-lities at Fritch.

The line will cross Wheeler County from the east to the west, running just north of Wheeler.

Lone Star was granted permission to sell Natural a maxium of 100,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily. Lone Star was competing with Natural for the pipeline grant and proposed a 230-mile line in the same general area.






