SCHOOL CENSUS TIME NOW HERE

The annual census of scholastics between ages 6 to 18 years in the State of Texas must be taken beschool census law.

Jesse J. Dyer, Wheeler County Superintendent, in making the census taking announcement this week quoted the following law: Article 2816, V.R.C.S., October 1905. page 285, states in part:

The census trustee, between the first day of January and the first day of February after his appointment, shall take census of all children that will be over 6 and under of the following September, and who resides in the school district on said first day of February.

In taking the said census he shall visit each home, residence. shall visit each home, residence, habitation and place of abode and SPEAKER AT shall by actual observation and interrogation, enumerate the children thereof.

Engineering practices applied by district cooperators during 1956 include 1 mile of diversions, 5 ponds, 2 sprinkler irrigation systems and 52 miles of terraces. Rangeland practices applied include 22,351 acres of proper use

of grass, 19,278 acres of deferred grazing, 5,080 acres of grass seeding and 5,723 acres of brush con-

Cropland practices include 2,336 acres of contour farming, 1309 acres of cover crops, 567 acres of hay and pasture crops such as alfalfa, 115 acres of strip cropping, and 970 acres of stubble mulching. All these practices were applied for the first time in 1956. The figures do not include work done prior to 1956 and still on the
