

COUNCIL GAS INCREASE

City Council of Wheeler regular session last Tuesday and among other business allowed the Gas Company a rate increase of approximately 9.2%, as reported for the group.

The increase was asked for by the company and was considerably more than the rate of increase granted for the last year. Allowance rates as follows: Minimum with first 15 thousand feet next 15 thousand feet per thousand; and all over and over at 45c per thousand.

The same breaks in rate have been in force with a flat increase in the rate of each class. For instance the first 15 thousand feet cost the consumer under the new rate the consumer will pay \$6.50 for that amount. If 25,000 feet of gas the consumer would pay \$14.75. Under the old rate the consumer would pay \$11.75.

Other items of business of the City Electric Utility Board will be set for the first Tuesday in March. Candidates must appear before March 2 with the necessary financial statements. The election will be on a city-wide basis.

Allison will have to elect an entire school board because of the change to an Independent District. The present board was appointed by County School board to serve until this Trustee election at which time all members must be elected. Voters will elect seven members to their school board.

Wheeler will elect three; Kelton three; Mobeetie two or three; Lela and Briscoe each two; and Kellerville one. Persons may file for the post of commissioner until ten days before the election in April Dyer said.

Texas Gets Lambasted

Texas has been taking a lambasting of large proportions for the last several months. It presently appears that there is more to come. Actually this all started with the closing of the Suez Canal, believe it or not. It was about that time that crude oil prices were slightly raised. This was the first raise in crude oil prices since 1953, although all other commodities had been raised several times. Nevertheless, a vicious attack was immediately made upon Texas. Columnists, cartoonists and commentators began to portray our great State as a scoundrel and a blackguard. Several European countries have taken up this same hue and cry and Texas continues

to catch it from all quarters. To listen to some of the charges that are being made, one would think that the entire continent of Europe was freezing to death, and that Texas had cornered the entire fuel market and was refusing to make it available to the cold and hungry. In fact things have gotten so bad that in some quarters the "Texan" has replaced the bogey man for scaring children. One fellow told me that children on the streets here in Washington looked at him with such fear and trembling that he had replaced his Texas as Stetson with an Ike Hornburg. Texas has been in the publicity spotlight for a long time. Any state with all of the good features with which Texas is blessed, is

bound to be in the spotlight now and then. However, a lot of publicity has been of the unfavorable variety. Many people have been led to believe that Texas has more than its share of loudmouthed, ill-bred, impolite and discourteous blackguards, and that all of them have at least 10 oil wells, 5 Cadillacs, 3 swimming pools and a police dog. The reason they think that Texas has more than its share of this type of individual is because they don't realize how big Texas is, and that there are only a few of these kinds of folks, relatively speaking, and relatively speaking doesn't mean kinfolks. As one good Texas Congressman, the Honorable Paul Kilday of San Antonio, pointed out, the proof of the gentility of Texas people is definitely proven by the fact that the head man in this country today who tells you how to be polite which spoon to pick up first, when and when not to wear a red tie, where to seat your guests when company comes for dinner and a few other niceties, is none other than a Texan. He is Mr. Wiley Buchanan, the newly appointed Chief of Protocol (the rules prescribing etiquette in ceremonies of state). (Some of these rules are all right for local use.)

gather together the true facts. Texas is not causing anyone to be cold or hungry, nor is she denying oil, that she has available for sale, to anyone. The truth is that Europe is short only 250 thousand barrels of fuel per day. At the present time, this country is importing almost 900 thousand barrels of oil per day. If about 30 per cent of the oil being imported into this country could be diverted to Europe, the situation would be alleviated. Such action would also help to solve an economic problem that is becoming very serious to independent producers in this country.

It might also be pointed out while we are speaking of criticism and truth, that there has been a rather unusual display of wealth by some visiting dignitaries to this country. Reputed tips of \$20 thousand to a ship's crew, gold watches to waitresses in a Washington restaurant and the purchase of cashmere clothes (including cashmere bathrobes at \$185 per robe from a local Washington store) would indicate that there might be two sides to some of these problems. At least Texas isn't seeking Foreign Aid.

TWO PIECES OF MUCH NEEDED LEGISLATION

"Most public officials are honest and conscientious people who make an effort to do the best job possible for those who have given them positions of trust," said Rep. Virginia Duff of Ferris, in commenting on a bill she has introduced in the House of Representatives.

"Unfortunately," she continued, "it seems there always are a few who will, given an opportunity, take advantage of loopholes that have been allowed to go 'unplugged' in our laws. Legislation must be passed to prevent their virtually robbing the very people who have put them in office."

Rep. Duff referred to one of the 15 "Better Government" bills sponsored in the 55th Legislature by the Texas Press Association. The measure will require publication of an annual financial statement by all offices, boards, agencies and commissions on all levels of government. This includes school, road, soil conservation and other districts not now covered by existing laws. The bill also contains a provision for stopping payment of state funds to a school district for failure to publish the required statement.

Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillboro has introduced the same bill in the Senate. "All of these districts are spending public funds," Martin stated. "Surely the people have a right to know what is being done with the money they provide for the operation of the governing bodies. This is a reasonable bill and one which should have been on the Texas statutes for many years."

W. R. Beaufier, publisher of the Lufkin Daily News and a TPA legislative committeeman, emphasized that "passage of this bill will mean little, moneywise, to any newspaper in the state of Texas. It will, however, mean a great deal to the people who have a right to know how their own funds are being spent. We want no more Duval County incidents in this state, and adequate legislation can prevent them."

Another of the 15 "Better Government" bills will make it unlawful for any state official to hide behind the Fifth Amendment by refusing to answer questions about the official conduct of his office. Sen. Doyle Willis and Rep. Howard Green, both of Ft. Worth, have introduced the bill in their respective houses of the Legislature.

"The Fifth Amendment to our

national constitution provides that no person shall be compelled to be a witness against himself," Willis explained. "It is a just and fair provision, but one which, when worked overtime, can result in obstruction of justice. Our bill will not deprive a person of the right to use the Fifth Amendment as an individual or as a private citizen. But it will prevent situations that have resulted when public officials have refused to answer questions where actual official mis-conduct was involved."

Removal from office of any official refusing to testify on grounds of self incrimination is a provision included in the bill.

"This is necessary legislation," Rep. Green asserted. "The spirit of the Fifth Amendment definitely is abridged when any public official uses it to hide actions, which, in themselves, are illegal. And that has happened in Texas in recent years. It must be stopped, and adequate legislation is our only means of doing so."

HIGHWAY 83 TO BE PAVED ALL THE WAY

By mid-summer U. S. Highway 83 will be paved from Brownsville to Canada, linking the favorite winter and summer vacation lands to America, members of the U. S. Highway 83 Association were told at a meeting in Abilene on Monday of last week.

Purpose of the meeting, which was attended by more than 30 persons, was to co-ordinate the activities of the Texas division of the association with those of the national group.

Walter Tensley of Junction, told the group that tourist traffic on the highway has been a life-saver to his community during the drought, bringing in thousands of tourist dollars.

Don Zimmerman, national secretary of the association from Liberal, Kans., said tourists left \$1,000,000 in Liberal last year. Figuring that each dollar was turned over about nine times, that amounts to \$9,000,000 worth of business for the Kansas community, he pointed out.

Zimmerman said American tourists are currently spending about \$20,000,000,000 a year; the objective of the association is to give cities along U. S. 83 a greater share of those tourist dollars, he added.

During 1957, the association plans to spend some \$10,000 in promoting travel on the highway.
