Bob Douglas, Shamrock, general chairman in charge of the program, said this week that almost everyone who comes to the units to be X-rayed is curious about the mobile machine and how they work. High school students ask the most technical questions, and often the hostesses have to call on X-ray technicians to satisfy their interest in the process.

Technicians operating the mac exas State College's hine are prepared to explain that the X-rays can 'see through' clothes and skin and take a shadow picture of the interior of the chest. They declare that some people can't believe this is possible, while others think the X-ray picture should be as detailed as one taken by a portrait photoghaper. 

JORDAN IN HISTORY



Jordan, situated in the heart of the Arab World, has since ancient times, witnessed the impact of successive civilizations which have greatly influenced human progress. It has seen the empires of Egypt, Assyria and Persia; it was the battlefield of the Romans and their Byzantine successors, and Christianity was born within its borders.

In April 1950, after the end of hostilities between the Arabs and Israelis, the Jordanian Parliament, representing Central Arab Palestine and Trans-Jordan proper, approved the union of these two regions into the new country called the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan.

The total area of present-day Jordan is 37,500 square miles, slightly larger than the state of Indiana. The population of 1,500,000 is predominantly Arab in race and Moslem in religion with about 12 per cent Christian Arabs and a great variety of other distinct groups and cultures. This mixture of cultures adds a picturesque diversity of dress and customs.

Jordan contains most of the sacred shrines of Christianity. Within its borders lie Bethlehem; Jericho, the site of the oldest walled city in the world; Hebron, where Abraham is buried; the River Jordan; the Dead Sea, the Mount of Olives and the ancient walled city of Jerusalem.

The country offers a great variety of climate and sceneryfrom the temperate heights of the rugged mountains of Moab, to the gently rolling hills of Judea, to the tropical Jordan Valley with its luxuriant vegetation; the Dead Sea, the fantastic, sandstone mountains of Wadi Rum and, finally, the dry arid desert of the eastern plateau.

Winter often brings snow to the mountains and Spring carpets the countryside with myriads of beautiful wild flowers. Rainfall occurs only in Winter, from November to April, so for the rest of the year the people of Jordan rarely see a cloudy day.

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Longhorn Cavern Deemed Million Years in Making

Texas Longhorn Cavern, spec-tacular scenic masterpiece of Nature, was at least a million years in the making, geologists estimate.

The huge cavern is awesome, evidence of the changes wrought through the ages by variations in climate, earth movements, the rise and fall of the seas and the slow solution of limestone by water.

Longhorn Cavern, located near Burnet in the Highland Lakes region northwest of Austin, is one of the state's favorite attractions for tourists and sightseers. Guided tours are conducted daily through the explored portions of the cave, which is one of the world's largest.





Giver of life and death, a source of feast and famine-such is the mighty River Nile which dominates the fortunes of the Egyptian people. Indeed, without the Nile there could be no Egypt, for the waters are the lifeblood of a parched and desert country. The soil is fertile only along the banks of the river, at its triangular delta and in the artificially irrigated sections.

The ancient Egyptians learned how the waters of the great river could be controlled to bring the floods into productive use. They dug channels across the higher lands flanking the river, to carry excess water to low-lying lands farther away. After the Arab conquest in 640, much valuable work was done in irrigation.

A revolutionary change in the method of controlling the Nile took place in the 19th century, when cotton was first introduced into Egypt. Although it soon became apparent that Egypt could produce the world's finest cotton, the old irrigation systems failed to provide the frequent and constant watering that the cotton plant requires. Therefore, Egyptian engineers built deep canals to conduct the low-level waters of the summer to cotton fields and built dams to protect the crop from inundation during the

Cotton flourished so rapidly in Egypt that soon greater canals like the Ibrahimia were built. Then early in the 20th century, a large dam was built at Aswan, some 550 miles south of Egypt's Mediterranean coastline. The Aswan Dam was enlarged three times. Several other dams and barrages were built along the Nile to supplement the irrigation and flood control projects.

The High Dam, envisaged also at Aswan, will dwarf all its predecessors in size and ultimate utility to the Egyptian people. A huge, 300-mile long lake will be created to eliminate the old danger of famine when the Nile is low. An additional two million acres of desert land will be irrigated. Irrigation authorities believe that Egypt's cultivated land will be increased through the increased irrigation capacity by nearly one-third, and her agricultural income boosted by fifty per cent. In addition, the High Dam will give rise to new industries by providing ten billion kilowatt-hours of electrical power a year.
