City schools offer advantages rural children can not have. City schools have disadvantages rural schools do not have or want. Idleness, gangs doing depredations at all hours of day or night, stealing, gangfights and mobing. This group is a small percent of the student body, in rural communities the number does not give power enough to get rolling. It is bad for a decent child to have an opportunity to take part in such conduct. It is impossible for a rural child to attend a city school without being invited even pressured to join such a gang. For an older child to come into such enviorment seems hazardous than togrow up in it.

In the early days of any portion of this country all schools vere rural and necessarily small. There never has been a large rural school. As towns and cities grew up schools became larger. Some eight percent of the children today live in towns or cities and attend schools larger than rural schools can be. A city school is not good for a rural child. The only limit on the size of a rural school is time of travel based on distance and road conditions. The educational opportunities of some children would be improved if the school they attend were consolidated with another school or schools. There are many small rural schools that can not be made larger. The need is for an adequate small school program. We do not have a small school program. If you would advise on improvng rural education go to a disrict that cannot be made larger and get the facts or the approval of a permanent citizen. If you think, and they agree, that the school is worse than no school then perhaps the school should be destroyed. Do not destroy any school unless or until you can offer better educational opportunities. Thouroughbred cattle are better than scrubs.
