ORDER TRIAL POSTPONED

Trial of James Whiteard, 21-year-old youth charged with the murder of his half-brother and a member of the posse which was put off when the court-appointed attorney stated that they had not yet enough time to prepare a defense. Witnesses would not be present on January 15.

Whiteard faces two counts of murder and two of attempted murder. He is accused of killing Lee Stephens, 19, Shamrock, member of the posse which hunted him and Whiteard's brother, Junior Bard Myers. Whiteard was captured after a long search by some 200 officers and volunteers in shinnery east of Shamrock. Whiteard's half-brother had wanted to murder Whiteard with intent to murder for robbery. Whiteard had stated that he and Myers when the two were separated during the night hid from the pursuers.

SERVICES FOR RIF NESBIT

Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church in Mobeetie, January 22, 1957 at 2:30 p.m. for Rufus Jasper Nesbit, with Rev. C. R. Copeland, pastor of the Mobeetie Church, assisted by Rev. Gene Grace.

Mr. Nesbit was born July 15, 1868 near Charleston, North Carolina. One of two brothers, departed this life in Wichita Falls, January 20, 1957, at the age of 88 years 6 months, 3 days. He was preceded in death by his parents and brother.

He joined the Presbyterian Church when he was a young man and was a member at the time of his death. Rip, as he was known by his friends, was a man respected by all who knew him, was known to be a man who was as good as his word, and one on whom you could depend.

Rip came to Mobeetie in 1891 by stage and went to work on the Judge Patton ranch, which is now the Stiles ranch, east of Wheeler, where he worked until he started ranching for himself, and drilling water wells.

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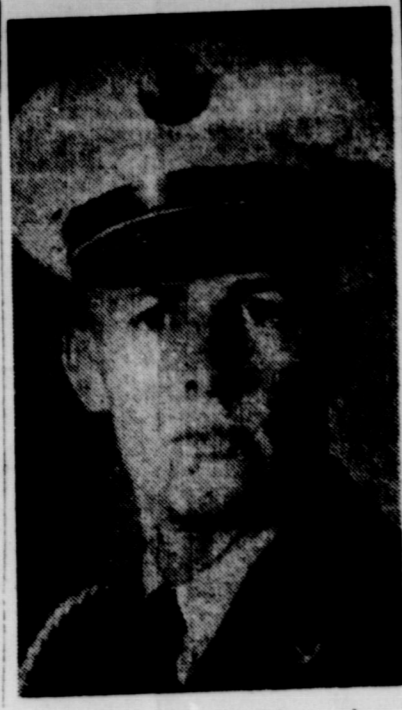

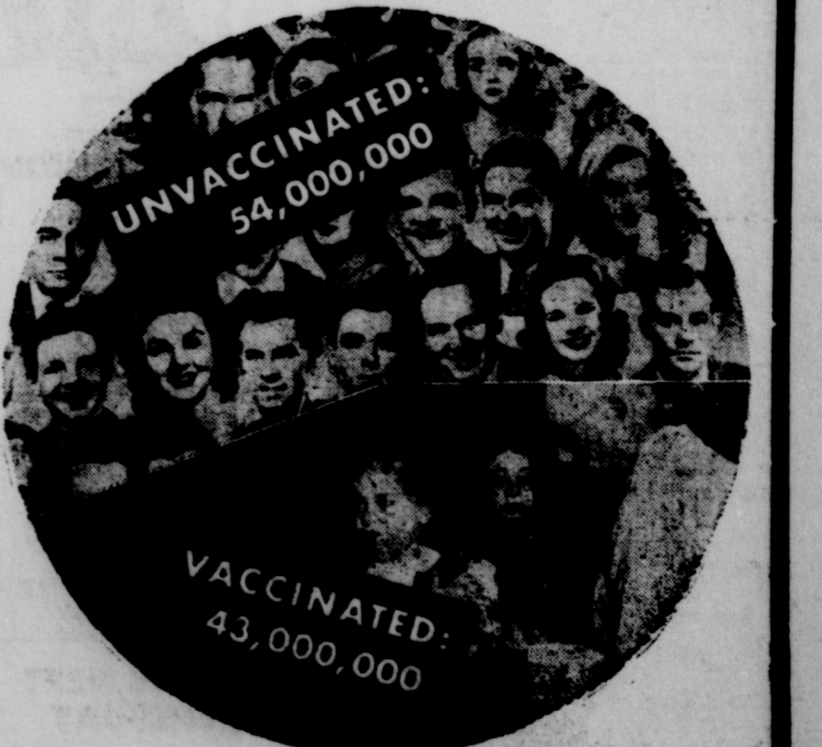

Boy Scout Week this year sees the production of the fifteen millionth copy of the "Handbook for Boys." Especially bound, it will be presented to President Eisenhower who is Honorary President of Boy Scouts of America.

Explorers in the 15,000 Explorer units and in Explorer crews in troops, with their 465,000 members 14 years and older, will observe Boy Scout Week in many ways. Some will address school

assemblies, P-TA meetings, service clubs, and radio and television audiences. Others will be guests on special vocational tours seeing the manufacturing of many products.
