Delay in government checks, family illness, or emergency leave may create such needs. Obviously the Red Cross cannot attempt to lend money to every serviceman who finds himself out of funds

Financial assistance is given as a loan when the recipient is able to repay without hardship. Otherwise it is given as an outright grant.
