Egypt's Coptic Church



Although most Americans consider Rome as the seat of early Christianity, an equally ancient branch of Christendom - the Coptic Church-was established during the first three centuries of the Christian era in the city of Alexandria, Egypt.

The Church of St. Sergius marks the site of the home of the Holy Family during the traditional Flight into Egypt. From this early beginning, Christianity flourished and by the end of the Second Century it was firmly established in Egypt. The Coptic faith received its strongest impetus during the Third Century when St. Anthony, a native Egyptian, laid the foundations of the church's monastic tradition.

Up to the Fifth Century, the Coptic Church at Alexandria played a leading role in the history of the Christian World. The earliest churches were cut out of rocks and caverns, but in the days of Constantine and Justinian, basilicas of great splendor were erected. The use of the dome by Coptic architects was universal; most churches had at least three domes overshadowing three altars.
