For business reasons we have not let it be generally known that in case emergency we have been extending credit to customers unable to pay their gas promptly.

Those who sell groceries, clothing, gasoline, etc., must pay for the mercha they let you have promptly to secure same at a price which will enable them to competition in surrounding towns. We have felt we were better able than t to extend credit, and if necessary loose delinquent accounts.

However, our local banker Mr. R. J. Holt, Sr., and the Mayor of our town a personal appearance before the Gas Division of our rate making authority at tin have complained of the dilatory manner in which we are handling our tions.

While our losses occasioned by this practice have been relatively small, point is well taken, as our rates are based on receipts, not on booked sales, we required to handle our collections at a minimum expense, and the opening of c accounts and handling delinquent collection naturally entails additional en of operation, and lost accounts.

Few of you know it, but the gas business is the only utility in Texas which a legalized state rate making authority. Ninety percent of our states have they call a Corporation Commission which govern prices of Gas, Water, Electric and Telephones. Texas has no such an organization or authority, except for

Business rules governing utilities require like treatment of all customers, gardless of circumstances, or inability to pay. We regret that under the circumstances, or inability to pay. stances, we are having to discontinue the practice of extending credit.


If you have a delinquent gas bill at this time, we insist that hereafter, pay your current bill promptly, and some on the back bill until it is paid in fi
