Comparison is Drawn (An Editorial)

Not far from the head of little stream called Bronco Creek in 1900 there was a school house erected and named Bronco School The lumber for the School was hauled from Memphis, Texas by wagon. Miss Emma Wine taught the first term of school in this location. The first year there were only four families represented in the school. It is not known just who these families were but the Guynes family, the Hampton famio'clock P. M., on the first Tuesday ly, the Cole family, and the Witt family were here then and may have been the four familles of children going to the school. In two or three years more families started moving North of this location and the famous argument over, where the school house should be moved, and whether it should be moved started.

The school was finally moved from the original location, which was the Southwest Corner of the John Scott section, to another location north of there for one year, then it was moved back to its original location for a few years. It was then moved to where the Lish Gaines Home now stands. It was then torn down and built larger but still was only one room.

Francis Reynolds, who later married J. A. Spikes and Dorothy Reynolds who later married George Stanley were teachers in this school while it was in this location before being moved into the town of Wheeler.

The Teachers in that day were responsible for sweeping the building, bringing in the wood to burn, and carrying water for the school. At that time there was only one newspaper in this part of the country and it was operated in Miami, by Leslie Ladd. The only stores were in Mobeetie and a person could travel across Wheeler County for quite some time with out seeing a house.

Fifty-seven years, the tenture of one mans life have passed and quite a change has been wrought. Today there are eight schools, over ten thousand people in the county, good highways crisscross the area and transportation facilities have made possible things that would have seemed far fetched in the

The School at Wheeler now has over 150 students in High School. operates numerous buses to bring in the rural children, has a plant consisting of six nice buildings, a lighted Football Field, an adequate number of Teachers; and many more improvements that are too numerous to attempt to mention. The Wheeler School is probably at this time the larest business in the town, operating on its present the school spends more money on operation per year than the entire earning power of the county was in that beginning year of 1900.



HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO.
37 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62. Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable.
