LOCAL KIDS DAY TO BE OBSERVED

Kids' Day, sponsored by Kiwanis International, will be celebrated Saturday, September 28 in Wheeler and in hundreds of other communities throughout the United States, Canada, Alaska and Hawaii using the theme — "Boys and Girls—Our Greatest Resource."

Frank O. Wofford, President of the Kiwanis Club, said that although this is the ninth annual observance of Kids' Day, it is the fourth year of sponsorship exclusively by Kiwanis International and its member clubs throughout North America. He further stated that work on this ninth annual celebration is well under way and it is expected that more clubs than ever before will participate in this annual activity for youth.

"Preliminary plans for local activities are now being formulated by the committee in charge," Wofford said. He named Watson Burgess as Chairman and 31 other members of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club as members of the committee under whose direction the activity will be carried out even though all members of the Kiwanis club will share in the project.

Wofford pointed out that youth work has been a major aim of Kiwanis International throughout forty-two years of its existence. The Kids' Day program, one of Kiwanis' major activities for youth, focuses attention on this important work of the organization on one day, and permits each club to develop a local program best suited to its community while integrating it with the club's year-round program for youth.

Mr. Burgess, Chairman of the Kids' Day Committee, indicated that further details will be announced in the near future. He urged all citizens to wholeheartedly support Kids' Day (as they have in past years) and join with other civic-minded residents of Wheeler in observing this day set aside especially for helping youth.

Wheeler School Program For Year To Get Underway

Activity of the 1957-58 school year at Wheeler Public Schools gets underway today. At 9:00 o'clock this morning the faculty, cafeteria workers, bus drivers, custodians, and board members met at the high school building.

At 2:00 p.m. today the faculty and principals meet at their respective buildings. At these meetings final arrangements will be made for the enrolling of students and meeting of classes.

On Friday, August 30, there will be a general meeting of school employees, board members, pupils and parents at the Grade School Auditorium, at 9:00 o'clock. At 9:45 enrollment will begin, all fees are to be paid, books distributed, lockers assigned, and similar activities. Buses will run on regular schedule as last term. Lunch will be served in the cafeteria. Pupils will remain at school until the buses run at 2:30 p.m.

Monday, September 2, Labor Day, will be the first holiday of the 1957-58 school term. Class work will resume on Tuesday, September 3.

Other holidays during the year will be: Wednesday, November 27, 4:00 p.m. begins the Thanksgiving Holidays. Classes will resume on Monday, December 2, Friday, December 20 starts the Christmas Holidays, classes resume Monday, December 30, Wednesday, January 1, New Years Holiday. Schedule for the last part of the year will be given at a later date.

Clip this list of holidays and keep for future planning of times that pupils will be out of school so as to help maintain as high an average daily attendance as possible. The number of teachers that can be used in a school system depends upon the ADA of the preceding school term. Let's keep the kiddos in school as regularly as possible.

RODEO STARTS HERE FRIDAY AUGUST 30, 1957

The Rodeo sponsored by the Wheeler Riding Club will get off to a good start with a gigantic street parade at 5 p.m., according to parade marshals Lindsey McCasland and Howard Caswell. About 250 horsemen from various riding clubs are expected to participate along with various floats, comics, and other parade items.

Bands have been invited but the number expected could not be obtained this week as school is just getting started in most districts.

Frank Caswell, president of the Riding Club said that the stock for the rodeo would be in Wheeler Thursday evening ready for action. Charlie Plummer, who is furnishing the stock, said that all of it had been in the pasture for the past month and that it was in excellent condition for the show. Amateur performers are already signing up for participation in the show here and four excellent performances are expected.

The parade will start at Cowboy Headquarters, Paymaster Gin, travel west along highway 152 to the City Drug corner then south to the Methodist Church, west one block and north to the corner at the postoffice. Here it will turn east along Texas street to cross highway 83 thence back to point of origin, Paymaster Gin. All entries, contesting for prizes, must stay in the parade until after 83 highway is crossed to be eligible to participate in the parade prize money.

Rodeo performances will be held at 8 o'clock each evening except Sunday when the show will start at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon. Blackie Johnson will serve as clown during all performances.

Schedule of events in the show is: Bareback riding and calf roping (2 sessions each) followed by saddle bronc riding and ribbon roping (2 sessions) barrel race, bull dogging, and the Rodeo will close with the bull riding. A full 2 1/2 hours of fast moving action is assured, Frank stated. All rodeo entries must be in by 5:00 p.m. Friday, August 30, Fat Jones keeper of the rodeo books said.

Approximately 600 people can be seated at the rodeo arena with space for between 75 and 100 cars. There will be NO reserved seats. First come first served in seating arrangements. About 400 can sit in elevated bleachers with 200 on a bench extending around the arena. Thus persons in cars can see the action over the heads of those seated around the arena, a spokesman said.

INSPECTION TIME HERE

Inspection time has rolled around again for more than four million automobile and truck owners in Texas.

The inspection period has been lengthened this year under a provision of a state law setting Sept. 1, 1957 until April 15, 1958 as the time in which all vehicles must be checked for mechanical defects.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, in announcing the opening of the inspection period, recommended that every owner have his cars and trucks inspected at the beginning of the period. This, he said, will enable vehicle owners to obtain inspection stickers before the holidays and before the last minute "log jam" at inspection stations.

Garrison said that more than 4,200 licensed inspection stations in the state would have stickers on hand by the starting date and would be equipped to check vehicles without delay.

The Church, he used to say, had acted as a balance wheel for him during good times, and a bulwark during bad times.


