Mobeetie Church Starts Revival

The Baptist Church of Mobeetie this week announced they would start a one week revival on Sunday, September 8. Rev. Don Anderson, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Cactus will do the preaching.

Services will be held twice daily, starting at 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. Rev. Anderson stated he would bring a series of sermons on the book of Philippians in the morning services.

Rev. Anderson began preaching in 1937. He graduated from Howard Payne College in 1942. Finished Southwestern Seminary in 1947, and is a native of the Texas Panhandle. He has been pastor of the First Baptist Church at Cactus since 1952. He has served District 10 as R. A. Leader since 1951.

The public is cordially invited to come out and hear Brother Anderson at any or all of the services, Rev. B. Gene Grace, pastor of the Mobeetie congregation said in announcing the meeting.

The site of Old Fort Elliott, the Panhandle's historical early day army post, is being commemorated by the erection of a park on Highway 152 west of Mobeetie.

LOCAL SCHOOL ENROLLMENT HOLDS STEADY

Enrollment in the local school system which got underway this week is holding steady with the past few years. If the average daily attendance can be kept up during the term Wheeler will retain the extra teacher earned last year.

An ADA of 348 pupils is necessary to hold the number of teachers we now have. Supt. A. E. Brown said this week.

Carroll Killingsworth, Grade School Principal, reported an enrollment of 254 in the grades. This compares with a total of 265 last year. The high school has an enrollment of 109 this year as compared with 101 last year Mr. Brown said. Last year the eighth grade was one of the largest in the system which accounts for the increase in high school enrollment and the drop in the grade school.

Mrs. Ida Farmer holds seniority for continuous service in Wheeler Schools. She has been connected with the local system for the past 12 terms. Other teachers and administrators with continuous long-time service are: Mrs. Lola Weems, eight years; Mrs. Leo Hubble, six years; B. Barham, high school principal, six years; and Supt. A. E. Brown, five years.

Mrs. Gordon Whitener has been in the system for a total of 10 years, but they have not been consecutive. Mrs. Weems had taught here prior to her current eight-year continuous period of service.

Let's all make an effort to keep the children in school as many days as possible in order to maintain a high average daily attendance. Supt. Brown urges.

Terrace construction should in-
crease as the crops are harvested
this fall. Terracing will save your
soil and water and increase your
crop production.

George Hefley, who farms east
of Twitty, has just completed the
rebuilding of a system of terraces.
He said that the land on which
terraces were first constructed in
1942 has become a better soil than
it had been previously. Land that
had not been terraced shows where
erosion has taken place.

Loam and clay soils that are on
moderate slopes up to 4 to 5 feet
fall per 100 feet are most suited
for terrace construction. Terraces
are constructed for several rea-
sons. They slow down the flow of
water, allowing it to spread over
a large area and to soak into the
ground. They prevent erosion from
taking place. Erosion that cuts
deep gullies as well as taking off
the top soil in thin sheets. Other
reasons are: Production is increas-
ed from the additional moisture,
and expense of operation of machi-
nery is reduced by farming with
the terraces of level rows. For as-
sistance in laying out your con-
servation terrace system, contact
Soil Conservation Service person-

nel, assisting the Wheeler District.

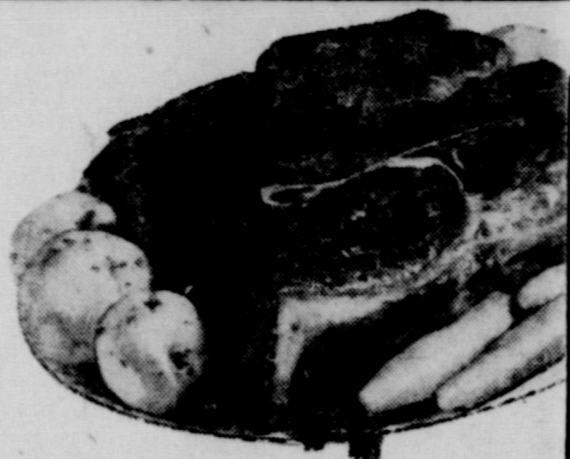

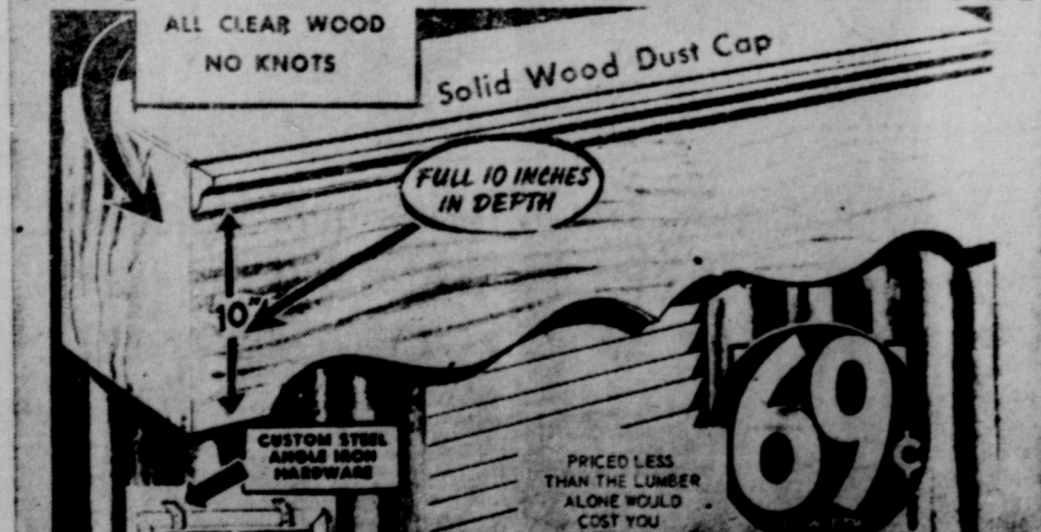
