1. Space. A flat roof rules out an attic, while a pitched roof automatically creates attic space which can be used for storage and future expansion to serve a

growing family. 2. Ventilation. Pitched roofs permit free circulation of air above the living areas of the house. This is particularly im-portant in summer. Louvers in-stalled in the gables act as an escape hatch for the hot blanket

of air under the roof. 3. Individual appearance. Pitched roofs normally are cov-ered with colorful asphalt shin-gles. Color in roofing helps set a house apart from its neighbors, even when homes in the area are similar in architectural design and it gives a home-owner op-portunity to express his individual taste.


