

1. A bill recommeded by a 150member statewide advisory committee, to allocate \$1,020,000 of present appropriations for statewide water planning. To create a planning division in the Board of Water Engineers. To authorize the board to enter contracts with the United States for purchase of storage space in Federal reservoirs, tranfer these rights to river au-

thorities and local districts when such agencies are able to make use of the water.

2. Registration of all persons, including lawmakers and state officials, who practice before state agencies.

3. Registration of lobbyists and regulation of lobbying practices. 4. Creation of a Crime Study Commission.

So far, four separate bills have been introduced covering registration of lobbyists and regulation of lobbying practices. One the three other subjects submitted by the Governor. The Conservation and Reclamation committee has started hearings this week on \$2.50 the water program bill, and the public hearings on the other subjects will begin next Monday, Oct. 21.


I attended the hearings on the water program, and I believe that the committee will be able to submit a plan to the House within the next few days.
