The move to give Benson power to ease planting curbs on the other five crops would accompany his bid for authority to reduce federal price supports on all six major crops

The price-slashing proposal got a cold-shoulder in Congress last summer. Administration officials hope to attract more support by combining it with a provision that could allow farmers to expand planting of some controlled crops.

A plan under consideration by Benson's aids would give the Secretary discretion to raise allotments over the level fixed by formulas in the present farm law.





"Winters in the northern United States will get colder gradually." he said, "with the coldest period lasting probably from 1975-1995. Of course, they will not be continuously cold year in and year out. There will be the normal ups and downs in temperatures.

"Winters in other parts of the country will get correspondingly colder, and even the summers will probably be a little cooler throughout the country."

One new case is found every 5 minutes. As yet, there is no miracle drug which can permanently cure a case of TB and there is no satisfactory vaccine to prevent TB. Tuberculosis is still a major health problem.




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
