Richard Brock, Motor Vehicle Patrolman says it is imperative that motorists respond more quickly this year to the appeal for the inspections as the station making the inspection must pull one wheel at least and inspect the brake drum and lining as well as checking lights, horn, wipers, etc. If the brake linings or brake drums are worn too badly they must be replaced or repaired before an inspection sticker can be placed upoc the vehicle


