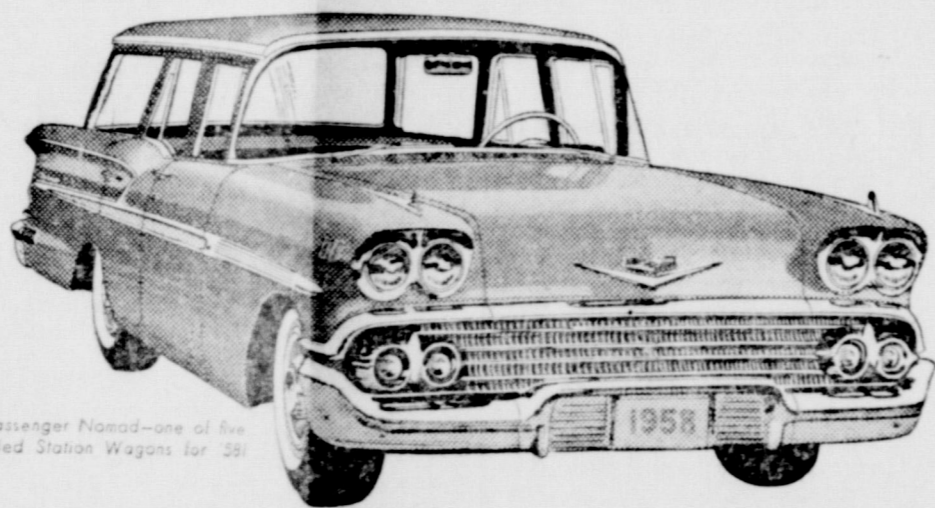

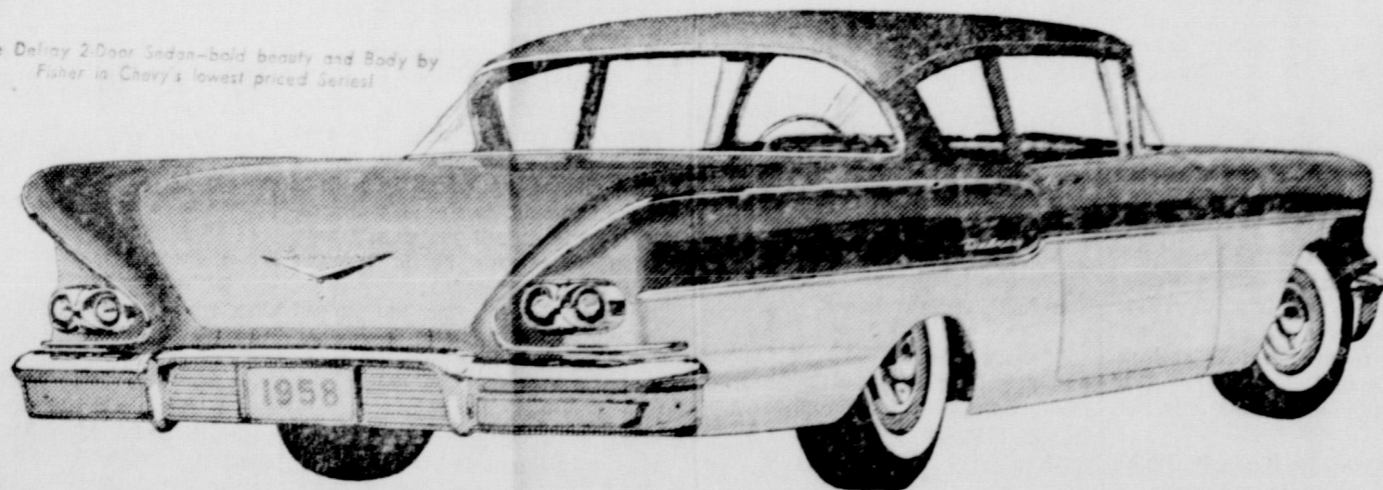

Wheeler high school Senior girls who have had Homemaking class have been invited by Mrs. Gordon Whitener, Homemaking teacher, to take a competitive examination Dec. 3.

The girl making the highest grade in next Tuesday's examination will receive a pin and also be eligible to compete for title of State Homemaker of Tomorrow.

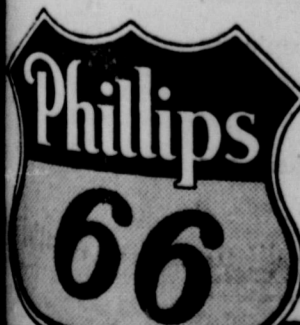

There has been a number of bills introduced in regard to the closing of public schools if Federal troops are brought to the scene, but so far none of them have come before us for consideration on the floor of the House.
This week I introduced House Bill No. 18 which changes the wording of the Department of Agriculture appropriation in regard to insect control so that part of this \$25,000 appropriation can be used in eradication of crows.
This morning the House Appropriations committee gave this bill a favorable report, and it should come up for passage in the House next Monday. This bill is not within the Governor's call at the present time, but he has indicated to me that he will extend his call to include this bill so that we can get some financial help from the state in our area's fight to reduce the damage that is being done to crops by the crows.
