Little David Gibson Is Fifth Victim Of Car Wreck Near Wheeler

David Gibson, five year old son of J. B. Gibson died Saturday, Dec. 7 in an Oklahoma City hospital. He received head injuries in the head-on collision near here Nov. 27 that took the life of his mother. He was treated in the Wheeler hospital until Dec. 5 when his father had him and his five year old half-sister Angelia, transferred to Oklahoma City where he is employed.

David was buried in Chickasha, Okla.

Four other people died as a result of injuries sustained in the crash. They were Mrs. Kathryn Gibson, Mrs. Reba Shoemaker, Miss Margaret Ann Johnson and Harold O. Donham.

Two other Gibson children, Reba Kay 7, and Linda Sue 1 1/2 were injured. They were treated here and were taken to the homes of relatives in Chickasha. Angelia is very seriously injured.

Grand Champion steer prize was won by Nancy Whitener, Saturday with her 730 pound calf which she exhibited along with 19 other calves in the Junior Livestock show. This is the second year, Nancy, a Wheeler 4-H Club member has won Grand Champion prize. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Whitener of Wheeler.

Reserve Champion prize went to Bob Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Martin of Route 1, Mobeetie. This is Bob's second year to win the Reserve Champion.

Both the prize winning calves were bred on the farm of C. J. VanZandt near Wheeler.

Two showmanship prizes were presented by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, first place award went to Dean Sims, FFA member and son of Mr. and Mrs. Lyndon Sims and second place award winner was Bob Martin.

There was 10 calves entered in the heavy weight class with first place going to Paul Range, 4-H Club of Shamrock, with his calf, weight 1028 lbs. Richard Kiker, FFA and 4-H club member of Allison took second and third places with his two calves, weighing 950 and 870 lbs. Dean Sims, FFA, Wheeler, won fourth place with his calf weighing 910 lbs. Frank Walker Jr., FFA of Wheeler placed fifth and sixth, his calves weighed 860 and 870 lbs.

Troyce Hunter, FFA of Wheeler was in seventh place with his calf weighing 960 lbs. Rayburn Corcoran, 4-H club member was in eighth and ninth places with his calves weighing 860 lbs. each. Larry Hunter, FFA of Wheeler was tenth with his 1000 lb. calf. In the light weight class there was 9 entries with Nancy Whitener winning first with her 730 lb. calf and sixth place with an 680 lb. calf. Other placings are: Bob Martin, 4-H Mobeetie, with his two calves each weighing 700 lbs., second and fifth places Dean Sims, FFA, Wheeler, third place with his calf weighing 840 lbs.

George Davis, Shamrock FFA, fourth place with his calf weighing 830 lbs. Kent Sims, Wheeler 4-H, seventh place with his calf weighing 820 lbs. Ray Corcoran, Mobeetie 4-H, calf, weight 700 lbs. was in eighth place and Dale Corcoran of Mobeetie 4-H took ninth with his 680 lb. calf.

The annual Livestock Show is sponsored by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, Wheeler County Farm Bureau and the Kiwanis club.

Mrs. W. L. Williams donated \$5.00 to be presented to the Grand Champion winner, in memory of her husband. Mr. Williams had been a backer of the Junior Livestock Show for many years before his death and it was his custom to make a donation to boys and girls who exhibited Grand Champion calves.

Wayne Maddox, cattle breeder from Miami, did the judging of the animals Saturday. The show was announced by County Clerk Harry Wofford.

Boys Ranch and Girls Town, USA, were the subjects of an interesting program presented Dec. 4 at which Mrs. R. J. Holt Sr., and Mrs. Madge Porter were co-hostesses in the Holt home.

Mrs. C. J. VanZandt gave an historic sketch of the founding of the two homes and of their founders, Cal Farley and Miss Anthony.

Boys Ranch was begun in 1939 at Old Tassosa with a superintendent, his wife and six boys.

Girls Town USA was opened March 13, 1949, at Buffalo Gap. Four months later they moved to 1425-acre tract nine miles south of White Face, its present location. Miss Anthony's motto is "To build a strong fence around the face of the cliff, rather than to pick up the wreckage at its base."

Mrs. R. Wm. Brown used as her subject a saying of Cal Farley "A Shirt Tail To Hang On To". His philosophy is, give a boy a shirt tail to hang to and you will never have to furnish him a room in a reformatory. Mrs. Brown said that Farley calls the boys at the Ranch "Ten Perenters" because most of them come from the poorest ten percent of families in the country.

Farley believes that the best way to handle boys is to be fair, sincere, consistent and positive. He is considered one of the leading humanitarians of our time.

Mrs. Harold Nash brought the program to conclusion by showing a film of Boys Ranch, which left the group see the boys in their daily routine of work and play.

Congressman Rogers Writes . . .

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18th DISTRICT:

I have many requests from young men who want to enter one of the Service Academies; that is, West Point, Annapolis or the new Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs. However, very few requests come in concerning appointment to the U. S. Merchant Marine Academy, which is located at Kings Point, N. Y. This Academy furnishes excellent training for the sea, and may be of great interest to many who have never before had notice of it.

As a member of Congress, I may nominate not more than 10 to participate in competitive examinations (College Entrance Board Examinations) to be held on Saturday, March 15, 1958. From those competing in these examinations, approximately 300 students will be selected to enter the U. S. Marine Academy during August 1958. As you can see, the designation of the student to enter the Academy is on the basis of merit. The age, educational and physical standards are similar to those required for appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy. The Academy is an accredited institution, offers a four-year course at college level leading to a License as U. S. Marine Officer as either 3rd Mate or 3rd Assistant Engineer and the Bachelor of Science degree. Qualified graduates may be commissioned Ensigns in the U. S. Naval Reserve.

Anyone who is interested in this program should write me at 1330 House Office Building, Washington, D. C., indicating his desire to participate. You will be furnished with all the necessary information on the program, as well as advice as to where and when to report for the examination.

VETERANS' BENEFITS

Rumblings around Washington indicate the Administration expects to recommend sharp reductions in many veterans benefits after Jan. 1. Some think this was clearly indicated in the speech of the President at Oklahoma City. Such a recommendation will, no doubt, cause a conflict between the Administration and the Congress. There have been many complaints by reductions in disability ratings. In some cases, a veteran in the last few years about percentage reduction has had his percentage of disability reduced on the basis that previous examinations had been in error. The veterans have found it most difficult to understand how 6 or 7 doctors on previous examinations could have committed the same error in rating their disability. Some also have found it difficult how the Veterans Administration can reach a conclusion that a disability was not service-connected even though the case had been reviewed on several occasions in the past and service-connection of the disability had always been established. Many have suspected that a program has been in effect to reduce the benefits to veterans by gradually cutting down their percentages of disability. Many veterans benefits are to be reduced, the last to suffer should be those bearing the scars and disabilities of actual battle. Watch for some fireworks on this issue.

BEWARE OF FALSE PROPHETS

Christ's warning of nearly 2,000 years ago—"Beware of false prophets, which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves"—is cited by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover in an article appearing in the American Legion Magazine for November. He applies it to communism. For communism, he writes, despite the efforts of leaders to put on smiling new faces has not weakened, its philosophy has not changed, nor has the danger from it lessened. In his words, . . . the same old communist crowd is doing business at the same old communist stand in the same old subversive way!"

Actually, according to qualified spokesmen, the Communist Party U. S. A., "is exulting that it has received a renewed lease on life." And it is intensifying its work in certain extremely significant directions. For one thing, it seeks to place members in heavy industry, steel mills and shipyards. For another, it is seeking to appeal to young people and to influence them through concealed members in church and civic organizations. Minority groups are also a prime target, and communists are experts at exploiting and warping legitimate and honest grievances. Then, the purposeful hand of communism is turned to protesting against the continued testing of nuclear weapons and other such strategic matters.

As Mr. Hoover, out of his long and intimate experience with this danger, put it: "Division and disunity are communist weapons . . . It pits race against race, worker against manager and group against group. It muddies the waters of peace while shouting 'Coexistence!'"

The personalities of communism change. We now see, for instance, Khurshchev in place of Stalin. But, as we have also seen, those who oppose Khurshchev are purged just as surely as those who opposed Stalin. It is Mr. Hoover's point that "The tactics of communism do not change! Hypocrisy, guile, deceit, and subversion are the hallmarks of communism today as they were yesterday. Here in America every walk of life has been infiltrated by the fanged salesmen of subversion cloaked in the lamb's wool of glowing promise."

Then he propounds a question: "What shall we do to insure that Americans will never eat the bitter fruit which is the dreadful lot of more than one-third of the peoples of the world?" His answer is "Learn what communism is and make ourselves aware of the tactics used by those who promote communism." Communism is purely materialistic in its explanation of the relationship of man to the universe and in its interpretation of history. It wishes to abolish religions and the economic system we know as free enterprise. Its

Benson Sticks To His Guns

No top government official has come in for more criticism than Secretary of Agriculture Benson. And on occasion, criticisms have been carried to the point of downright abuse. But the Secretary has stuck to his guns.

In a recent talk before farm magazine editors, Mr. Benson said something he has said, in essence, many times before . . . "we cannot wish the farm problem by controlling production . . ." He added that controls do not reduce production, but do impose severe restrictions upon farmers, that farm products will continue abundant and cannot be priced as if they were now scarce; and that legal formulas now governing allotments and controls are obsolete.

Every new law affecting agriculture just seems to make the surplus problem worse, and more expensive to taxpayers at large. In many instances, the price supports and subsidies have proven profitable primarily to the huge corporation-type-farms—not to the family farms which are the keynote of U. S. agriculture.

On top of that there are big areas of agriculture which do not have the supports and controls, which operate in the honored traditions of free enterprise—and which have been notably successful. Livestock is a prime example here. Meat animals move in the free market, and supply and demand determines the price. Prices rise and fall from time to time—but they do that for sound and natural reasons, not because some fallible human mind decides what they should be on this day or that. And over the years, the prices average out at levels which are fair to producer and consumer alike.

Bible Comment: The Nativity Story Signifies the Hope Of All Mankind

THE story of the Nativity never loses its power to fascinate. Shepherds in the field, watching over their flocks, had an amazing experience as angels appeared to them and announced the birth of the Messiah. This was no chance occurrence. These shepherds were undoubtedly devout men whose souls had long been filled with the hope of the coming of the Messiah who was to redeem the world.

The shepherds were not only men of devotion; they were men of action, too. They went immediately to Bethlehem to find this newborn babe of destiny. They found what they came seeking.

But here their faith must have been sorely tested. For many Jews had come to hope for a Messiah rich in a worldly as well as spiritual way. They had hoped for a leader who would stamp out opposition and make them temporal leaders. Christ was rejected by many because of this.

Instead of the glory they had expected, they found a babe lying in a manger because there was no room at the inn. But they were not daunted by appearances. They knew that God moves in mysterious ways and that He is not a respecter of persons.

They saw Mary with her child. Again it was not by chance that Mary was selected to be the Mother of God. Her devotion and faith had well prepared her. Yet it had not been without some misgivings that she received the message from the Archangel Gabriel of her impending momentous role. Because Mary had taken a life-long vow of celibacy

But she submitted to the will of her Lord: "Not my will but thine be done."

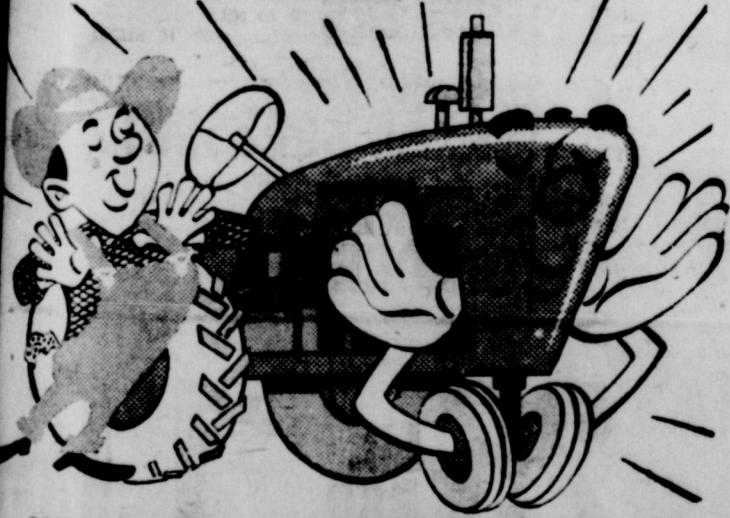

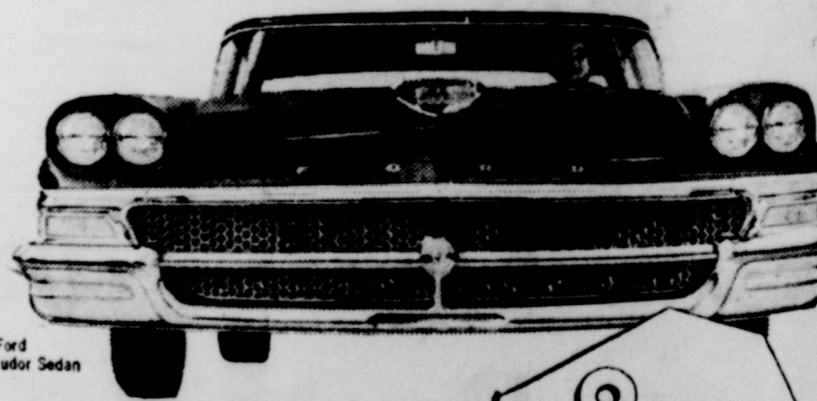
