You have only a few days left in which to pay your poll tax and to vote in the coming elections to be held later on this year.

Any person who has reached the age of 60 before January 1, 1957 will not be required to obtain a poll tax. Also they will not be required to obtain an exemption as today.

"Some people are of the opinion that they have paid their poll tax when they paid their property tax This is not the case unless a separate poll tax receipt was issued. Poll Tax is not assessed on the statements", he said.






