### Twitty Man Is Charged With Kidnaping

(Reprint From Amarillo News)

William R. Lasater, 24, of Twitty, Tex., an AWOL soldier from Brooks Army Hospital in San Antonio, Tex., is being held in the Roswell, New Mexico city jail under \$2,500 bond on charges of kidnaping and assault with a deadly weapon.

Lasater forced the owner of a car to drive him from Las Cruces early Saturday before he was picked up by Roswell police on a tip from a service station owner.

William Pack, owner of the car, said he and Robert Tidwell, his friend, were forced by gunpoint to drive Lasater from Las Cruces toward Amarillo, Tex. The trio picked up a fourth man, Walter Howe, a hitchhiker, after they left Las Cruces.

Tidwell told authorities that Lasater said he "could kill all three of us."

Pack said he managed to tell his predicament to R. A. Dorsey, attendant at the service station where the car refueled in Roswell. Police stopped the car a few minutes later before Lasater got out of town.

Sheriff Bus Dorman of Wheeler County said Lasater is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Lasater of Twitty.

### MARCH 31 LAST DAY FOR TAGS

The deadline for purchasing 1958 license plates for motor vehicles is Monday, March 31, which means that motorists have only three more days to purchase their tags.

The last day that 1957 license plates can be used legally is Monday, March 31.

The tags may be purchased at the office of Thurman Rives, Wheeler County Tax Assessor-Collector, in Wheeler; or from Lyman Benson, deputy collector, at Benson Hardware and Furniture Company, in Shamrock.

Sales are running about the same as last year, but many motorists still haven't purchased their plates Mr. Rives said today.

The law says that failure to have the 1958 plates on motor vehicles by the required time could result in a fine and a 20 per cent penalty over the price of the plates.

Owners of vehicles are reminded that they must have the title to the vehicle and the receipt for last year's plates when they apply for new plates.

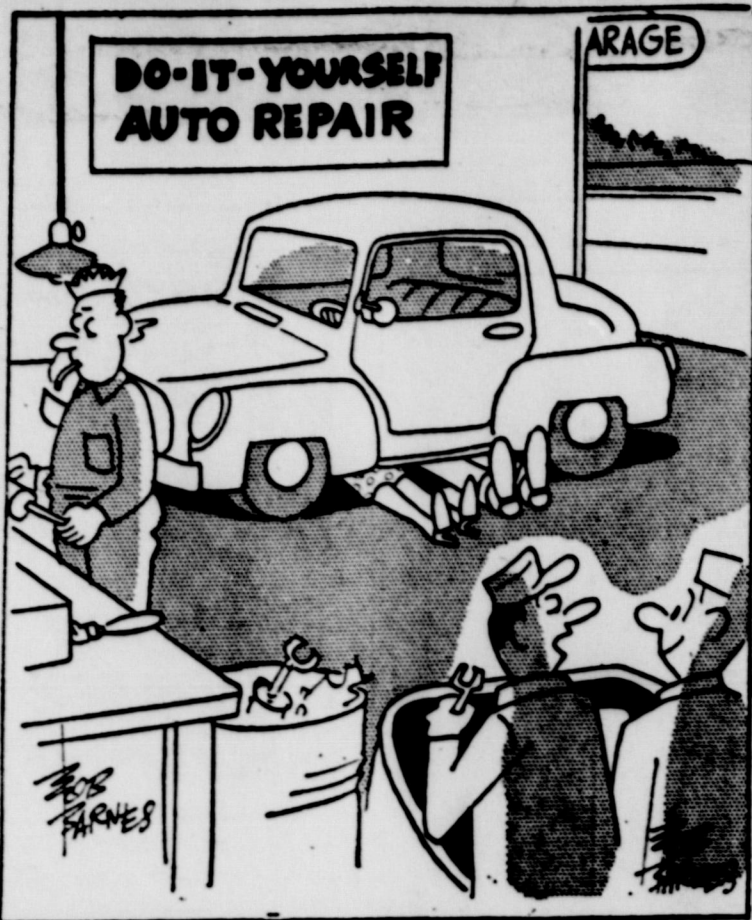

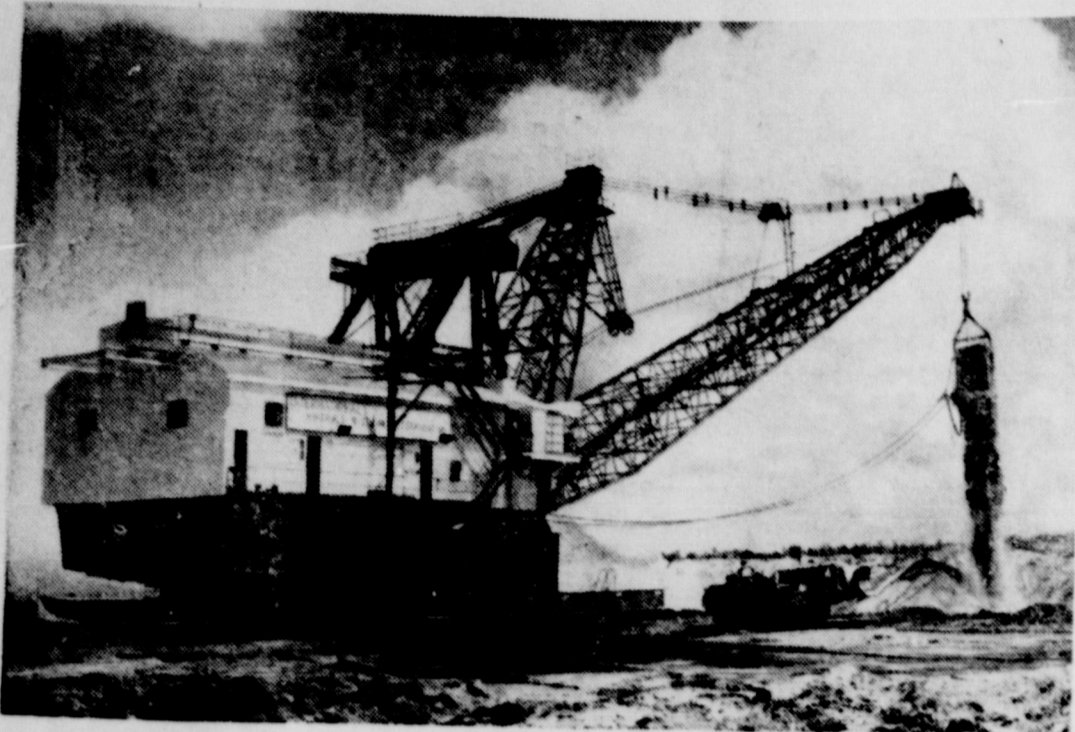

Early spring moisture has been rare in this district for several years. This year we have a good chance for early grazing on small grain planted for pasture and cover crop. Last year, some district cooperators made as much as 50 pounds of beef per acre from rye. This was exceptionally good considering how late it was before moisture was available to make good growth.

Many areas are using small grains such as rye for soil improving crops. The residue, with nitrogen fertilizer added, will do as much to recondition soil as legumes. Nitrogen fertilizer is much cheaper than it was a few years ago and it is often more profitable to grow rye instead of a legume. It is sometimes hard to get a stand of legumes on upland. A few misses can make the cost of seeding very expensive.

Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the Wheeler District report the largest acreage of cover crop on the land since the district began operations in 1950. Spring seeding of sweet clover will increase the amount. There is nothing better than a close drilled crop to protect land from erosion.

## Taxpayers Can Deduct Disaster Losses On Tax Returns

Taxpayers suffering casualty losses from tornadoes, floods and other disasters during 1957 may deduct their losses on their Federal tax returns for that year. Wiley E. Davis of Internal Revenue Service, Pampa, Texas, said: "Amount of loss to be deducted is measured by the fair market value of the property just before the casualty, less its fair market value immediately after the casualty (but not more than the adjusted basis of the property) reduced by any insurance or compensation received." Mr. Wiley E. Davis explained that the term "casualty" means an identifiable event of a sudden, unexpected or unusual nature. Generally, this means that the loss must result from a sudden destructive force.

"Damage from a normal process or from progressive deterioration of property through a steadily operating cause - such as the steady weakening of a foundation from usual weather elements - is not a casualty loss."

For taxpayers with casualty loss headache from storms and such, Mr. Davis prescribes Revenue's free ten page Publication No. 255.

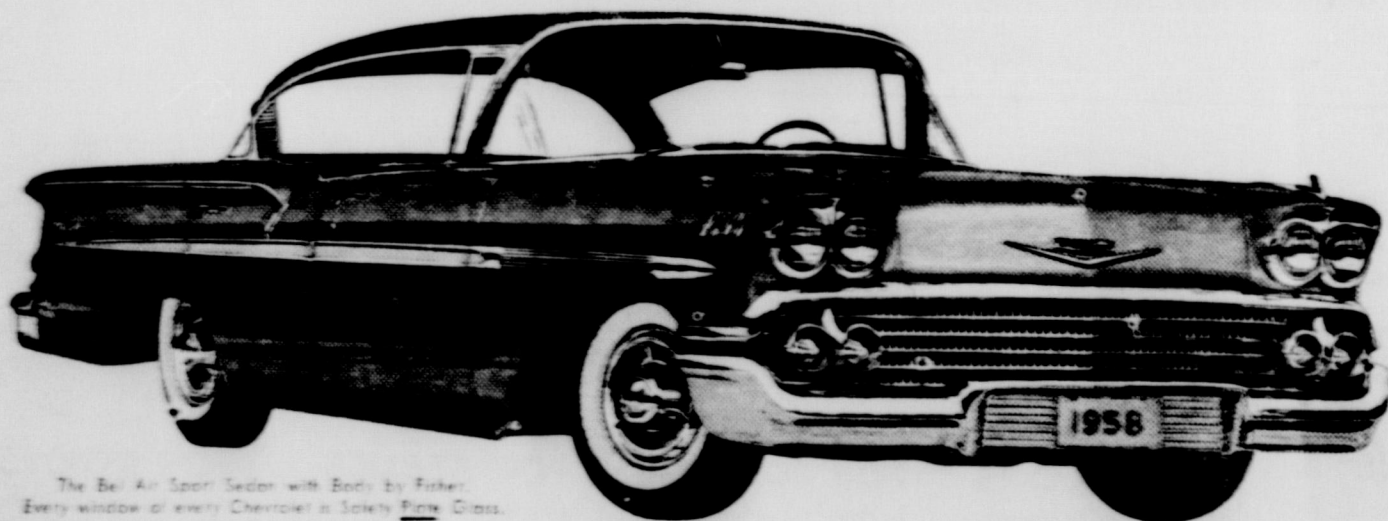
