

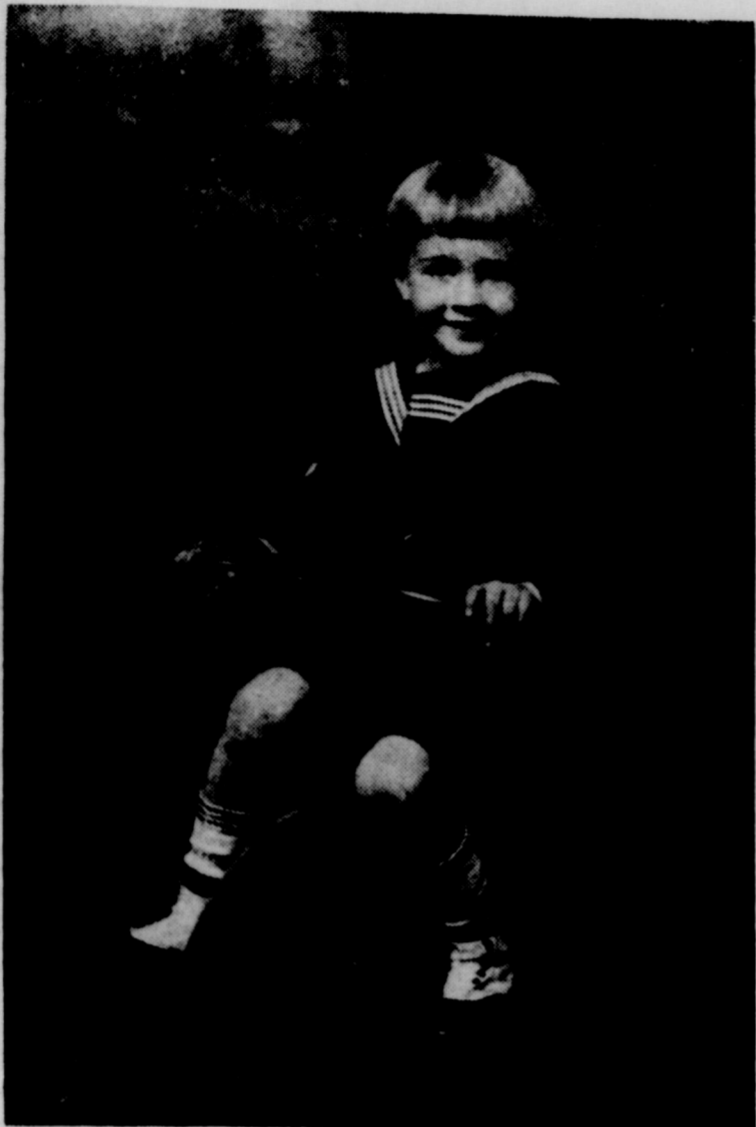

Tag Agent Says Sales Are Normal

More than 400 tags have been sold in Wheeler County since they went on sale February 1st according to Thurman Rives, county tax assessor and collector.

Rives reported that 288 automobile tags had been sold, 52 farm tags, 3 truck tractor tags, 7 trailer tags, 1 motorcycle and 3 dealer tags had been sold so far this year, which is "about normal" he said.

MERCHANTS TO PARTICIPATE IN STOCK SHOW

The Top-O-Texas Junior Livestock Show and Sale will be held in Pampa starting March 3 with the sale on Wednesday the 5th. There will be approximately 20 head of hogs and 10 calves from Wheeler County in this show and sale.

County Agent Bryan Swain and Production Credit manager James Verden sponsored a coffee break Tuesday at which time it was decided to pool donations to buy some of these animals. The money will be used to pay a premium to the boy or girl whose animal is purchased. The animals will all be resold to a packing company.

Watson Burgess and Thurman Rives were selected to attend the Pampa show and bid on the Wheeler animals. Many local firms and individuals have pledged money for this project, however, more money is needed, "if we plan to pay the premium the boys and girls deserve," Swain said.

Money for crow eradication was appropriated by the bill that representative McIlhenny authored at the recent special session of the legislature.

Bryan Swain, who is in charge of the program said the purpose of the meeting is to "make plans for immediate action against the crows and also to plan a long range program."

TRADE WITH MERCHANTS IN WHEELER

(Editor's Note: One Man's Opinion will be a weekly feature of the Wheeler Times, each week we will select a different business, church or civic leader to express his opinion, pro or con, on Wheeler. This week we have selected R. H. Forrester as our guest columnist).

A man asked me, the other day, what I would do if I knew that I only had one more year to live. Even the thought of this possibility is fraught with divergent implication. Passing by the religious, moral and physical aspects, thinking only of the economic meaning, as a citizen of the community, one would, I think, do his utmost to widen the circle of acquaintance, cultivate, more assiduously, his consociation of friends and treat the stranger he met with greater and kinder consideration.

One would forget the little inconveniences of his town; be more willing to buy his luxuries as well as his necessities from the local merchant, even if that local merchant were a few cents higher than what the big town merchant would sell it for. He would make out on what his local merchant had to offer or wait until the local merchant could order the merchandise one thought he had to have. He would use the local doctor, lawyer, carpenter, painter or even printer, even though he felt their qualifications were not so good as those of other places, because he could meet them day after day with more good will, let alone, increasing the number of mourners when his time came to die.

The difference in price of an article in his town or in some other town would make little difference, in as much as one cannot carry the saving with him when he leaves at the end of the year. But this condition should prevail, if one was not under sentence of one more year to live, because 25% or more of his savings go for income tax purposes anyhow. The good will of ones home-town merchant should and does mean more than the increased (supposedly) efficiency of the imported technician. The local tactician can and will offer more condolence to your loved ones and he might send flowers, while the foreigner cares little or nothing about your passing, unless one still owes for the work performed by the outside protagonist. And again, if one saves any money on the job, 25% or more of the savings goes for income taxes.

Consequently, I vote for a better social adjustment, whether one lives a year or many years, a fuller understanding of the social good of my fellow townsmen.

Rural Route Changes; Includes More Patrons

Postmaster Virgil Jamison announced this week that the Post Office Dept. had approved a change in the rural route out of Wheeler to include some mail patrons who had not had rural delivery before or were long distances from the route. The change calls for the rural route to go north to service the boxes of the community in which Domer Reed, W. H. Frye and others live. The change will become effective on March 7, 1958 on which day the Rural Carrier will make the new route for the first time.

The Postmaster also wished to call to the attention of all the patrons on the Rural Route that from the Six Mile corner East of Wheeler on the highway on around the route the mail would be about thirty minutes later at each persons box after the change becomes effective so that anyone wanting to meet the carrier at the box would be able to estimate the time at which he would arrive. This change is in accordance with the department policy to strive for better service to everyone possible. The change will certainly improve the mail situation of about twenty families of our community.

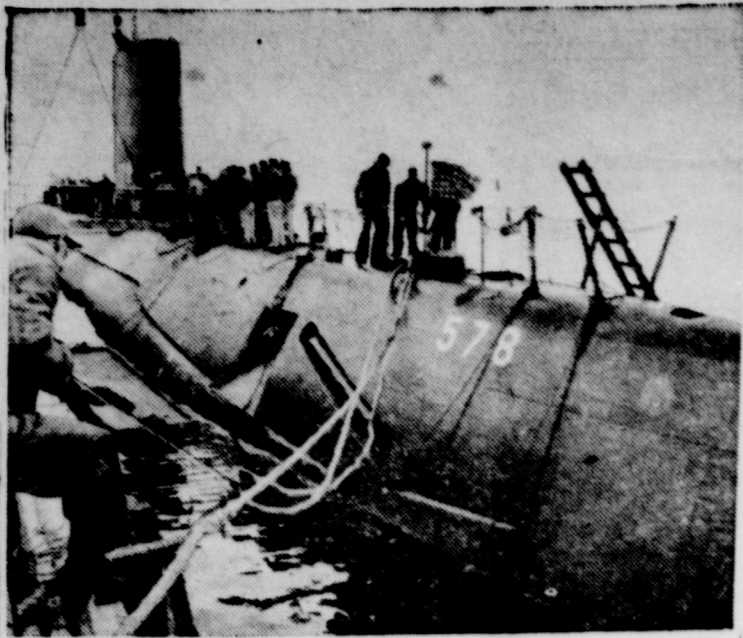

KELTON IS UNDISPUTED VICTOR IN COUNTY TOURNAMENT

The mighty Kelton Lions quintet roared their way to undisputed victory as undefeated champions in District play by downing Briscoe 67-46 in the District 11 B Basketball Tournament played in Wheeler last Thursday, Friday and Saturday. As winners of the conference round-robin play and District Tourney they became District champs and will try for a seat in the Regional Tournament in a one game series with Claude Monday night to be played at McLean.

The lions first downed the Wheeler Mustangs in the Thursday round of play by 8 points. The Mustangs played winning ball the first three quarters but fell to a losing pace as the Lions treaded the Mustangs' lead and stalked on to a final score of 54-45. Kenneth Errington of Kelton led the scoring with a total of 21 points while Wheeler's Jim Porter has 23 points.

In their second game played Friday afternoon Kelton defeated the Miami Warriors 70-29. Jimmie Harris scored 17 points while Dale Harris of Miami had 13.

Briscoe gained its place in the finals by defeating Allison 43-32 Thursday and Mobeetie 70-45 Friday. Shots Childress netted 17 for Allison and David Turner tossed 12 for Mobeetie while the powerful Jack Helton of the Broncos scored 14 and 24 respectively.

Saturday's finals found the Lions facing the Briscoe Broncos and although in the early minutes of play it looked as if the Lions might have a tough battle on their hands they soon took charge of the situation and the final outcome was never in doubt. Jimmy Harris was top man in the scoring section for the Lions with 17 while Jack Helton again paced the Broncos with scoring honors with 27 points.

Helton held the tourney scoring honors in the boys division with a total of 45 points in the three games, averaging 15 points per game and held the highest individual total in any one game, this being 27.

Year after year cotton, wheat and grain sorghums were grown until much of the soil was thoroughly depleted. These conditions brought about the necessity for a change in the agricultural program in Wheeler county.

In a few years most farmers have re-established grass on their most depleted soil and have left their land most adapted to the production of row crops in cultivation and have increased their yields by good farming practices.

Farmers who have established grass and practiced diversified farming have found it more profitable to them. They have found that with the production of beef cattle, dairy business, or the production of pork on their farms, have helped them round out a well balanced farming program as well as rebuilding the soil.

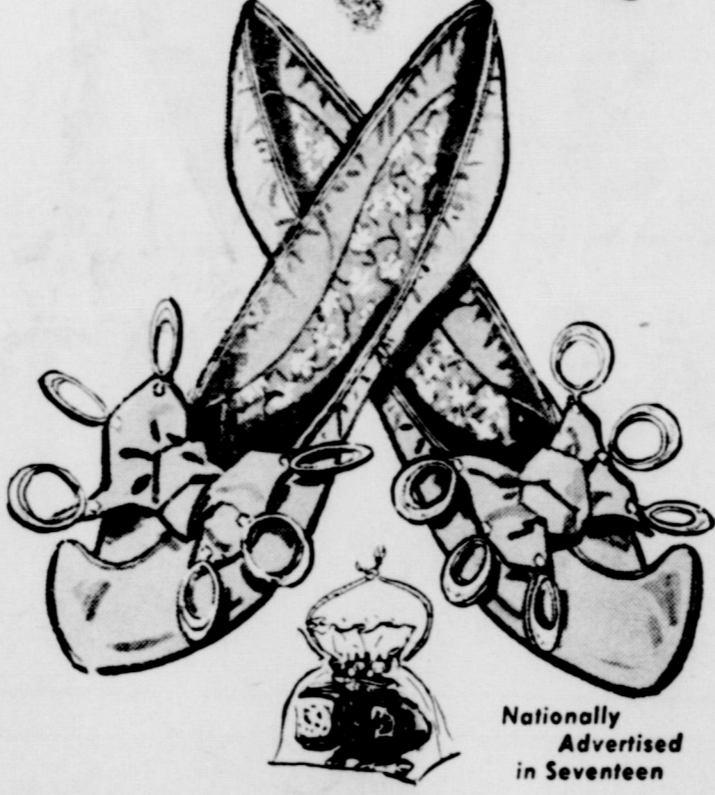

Funeral Services Are Held For Former Wheeler County Attorney

Dennis G. Reynolds, former attorney in Shamrock and Wheeler and brother of Marion Reynolds and Miss Agnes Reynolds, died unexpectedly at his home in Guymon, Okla., about 6 o'clock last Monday morning. He had suffered chronic ill health for several years.

Mr. Reynolds was serving as County Attorney of Texas County, Okla., at the time of his death. He was 63 years old.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Guymon at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning with Dr. M. J. Lee, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery Wednesday afternoon under direction of Henson Funeral Home of Guymon.

Mr. Reynolds was the son of the late Judge and Mrs. J. B. Reynolds who moved to Wheeler shortly after the town was started. The elder Mr. Reynolds practiced law in Wheeler and later served as judge of Wheeler County.

Dennis Reynolds was associated with his father in the practice of law at Wheeler and later with his

brother, Marion Reynolds, in Shamrock. He served as County Attorney of Wheeler County from December 1, 1920 until May 14, 1923, when he resigned to devote his time to other duties.

He moved to Guymon in 1943, and in 1947, was appointed County Attorney to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Haman Foster. He was elected to the office in 1948, and served until 1954.

He was elected again to the office in 1956, and had actively discharged his duties until the time of his death.

The Texas County courthouse was closed Wednesday morning in tribute to the official.

Mr. Reynolds was born in Hillsboro in 1893, and was married May 15, 1917, to Maude L. Baird at Wheeler. He received his Bachelor of Law Degree at Cumberland University, Lebanon, Tenn., in 1916, and had practiced law in Clovis, N. M. and Springfield, Colo., in addition to Wheeler County and Texas County, Okla.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Guymon and of the Masonic Lodge of Springfield.

Survivors include his wife of Guymon; one daughter, Mrs. Arlene Engeran, New Orleans, La.; one son, Hugh Reynolds, Baton Rouge, La.; one sister, Miss Agnes Reynolds, Shamrock, and one brother, Marion Reynolds, former resident of Shamrock, who now makes his home near Arlington.

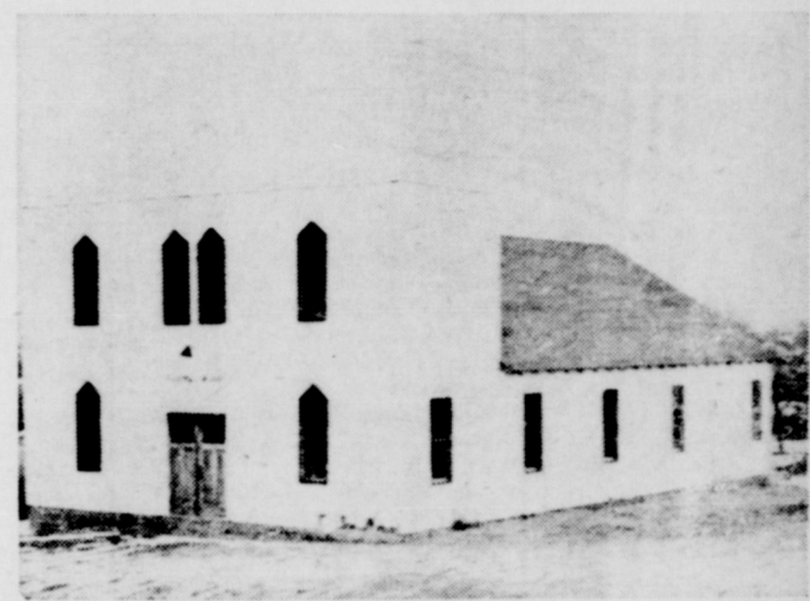

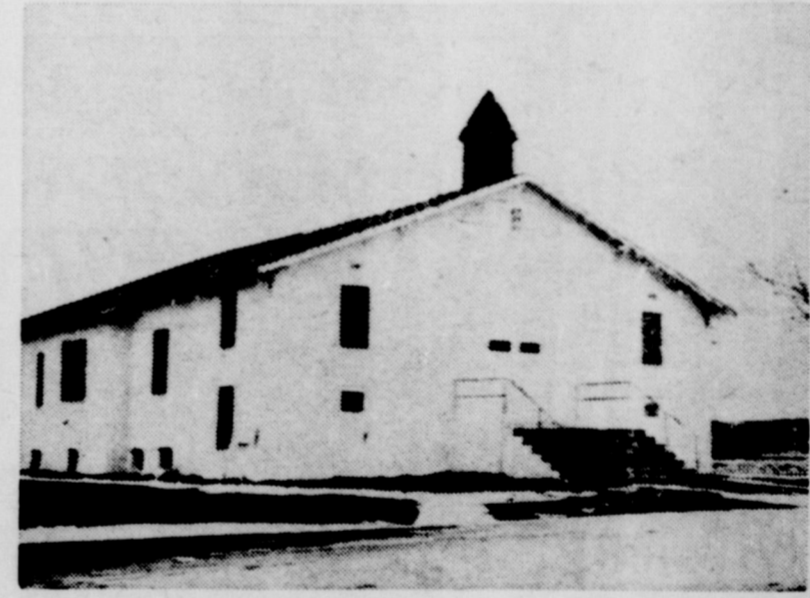

CHRISTIANITY: A RELIGION OF JOY

As one reads the New Testament, they soon find that the word "joy" is frequently used in connection with the doings and service of God. Of these we only have space to mention a few.

When Jesus was born, an Angel appeared to the shepherds in the field of Ephrathah and fairly shouted, "Be not afraid or behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be to all people; for there is born to you this day in the city of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord." Luke 2: 10-16.

As he faced death, Jesus spoke reassuringly to his loved ones. "Even as the Father hath loved me, I also have loved you; abide ye in my love. These things have I spoken unto you, that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be made full." John 15: 9-11.

After speaking these words, Jesus went into death, then for awhile was no joy among the disciples; they were pained and severely shaken. But Jesus had prepared them for that too. "And ye therefore now have sorrow. But I will see you again and your heart shall rejoice and your joy no one taketh away." John 16: 21-22.

As Jesus departed for heaven he blessed them. The Angels appeared, telling them that Jesus would return. "And they worshipped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy." Luke 24: 52.

Soon afterwards the Lord sent the Holy Spirit and there were three-thousand people saved on that day. They continued in gladness and praising God. Acts Chapter two.

And as the gospel spread, from city to city, the results at Samaria were typical. "There was great joy in that city." Acts 8: 8. The Ethiopian eunuch, who found Christ, went on his way rejoicing. Acts 8: 25-39.

In Romans 14: 17, Paul declares that, the kingdom of God is not eating and drinking, but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit. One of the fruits of the Spirit is "joy." Gal 5: 22.

Paul tells us how the Macedonian Christians found, "abundance of joy in giving" in spite of their hardships. "How that in great trial of affliction, the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded unto the riches of their liberality." They gave willingly beyond their power. 2 Cor. 8: 1-3. This is a lesson to all who may complain when they are asked to give to many causes.

Living in love brings joy. Keeping the commandments of God brings joy, contrary to the idea of some, that keeping his commandments robs us of joy.

If you have lost your joy, then pray as David, "Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation; and uphold me with thy free spirit; then will I teach transgressors thy ways; and sinners shall be converted unto thee." Psalm 51: 12-13.

We lose our joy, because we do not keep verse thirteen of that psalm. Grumbling Christians have caused more souls to go to hell, than any other thing.

If you want to live a joyous Christian life, then read your Bible every day, pray daily, alone and with your family. Witness daily to lost sinners and Christians. Attend regularly, the church of your choice, because Christianity is a religion of joy.
