More than sixty years ago the first settlers of Wheeler County found native grasses and first made use of this land by grazing cattle. Later came the small farmers who began an intensive and merciless cultivation of the soil for cash crops, without rebuilding the soil.

Year after year cotton, wheat and grain sorghums were grown until much of the soil was thoroughly depleted. These conditions brought about the necessity for a change in the agricultural program in Wheeler county.

In a few years most farmers have re-established grass on their most depleted soil and have left their land most adapted to the production of row crops in cultivation and have increased their yields by good farming practices.

Farmers who have established grass and practiced diversified farming have found it more profitable to them. They have found that with the production of beef cattle, dairy business, or the production of pork on their farms. have helped them round out a well balanced farming program as well as rebuilding the soil.

CHRISTIANITY: A RELIGION OF JOY

As one reads the New Testament, they soon find that the word "Joy" is trequently used in connection with the doings and service of God. Of these

we only have space to mention a few.

When Jesus was born, an Angel appeared to the shepherds in the field of Ephrathah and fairly shouted, "Be not afraid or behold. I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be to all people; for there is born to you this day in the city of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord". Luke 2: 10-16.

As he faced death, Jesus spoke reassuringly to his loved ones. "Even as the Father hath loved me, I also have loved you; abide ye in my love. These things have I spoken unto you, that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be made full". John 15:9-11.

After speaking these words, Jesus went into death, then for awhile was no joy among the disciples; they were puriled and severely shaken. Living in love brings joy. Keeping the commandments of God brings joy, con-

trary to the idea of same, that keeping his commandments robs us of joy.

If you have lost your joy, then pray as David, "Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation; and uphold me with thy free spirit; then will I teach transgressors thy ways; and sinners shall be converted unto thee". Psalm 51:12-13.

We loose our joy, because we do not keep verse thirteen of that psalm.

Grumbling Christians have caused more souls to go to hell, than any other thing.

If you want to live a joyous Christian life, then read your Bible every day, pray daily, clone and with your family. Witness daily to lost sinners and Christians. Attend regularly, the church of your choice, because Christianity is a religion of joy.

# WHEELER COUNTY SOIL

Biennial sweet clovers are among the few legumes well adapted to the Wheel Soil Conservation District. Sweet clover does exceptionally well when winter moisture is above average. With the reserve moisture now in the soil, this should be a good year to seed this valuable crop.

Sweet clover will make a good cover crop for Acreage Reserve land in the Soil Bank. It is deep rooted and will break up hard layers in the soil as well as chiseling and the effects last a lot longer. The fertility it adds to the soil will be available after the land is out of the soil bank.

Seeding should be done on firm soil before April 15. It should be drilled at a rate of about 10 pounds per acre without working the land unless it is very weedy. 





#### **Baptism of Christ** Set an Example For Sinful Mankind

WHEN John the Baptist came from the wilderness as the forerunner of Christ, immediately there were many who believed that in John the expected Messiah had come. But he was insistent in correcting that impres-

His baptism was baptism of water, signifying cleansing and repentance, but John said that there was one coming, mightier than himself, the latchet of whose shoe he was not worthy to loose, who would baptize them with the Holy Spirit and with

It is strange that we inevitably picture John as an old man, living apart from men and renouncing the world. On the contrary, he was a very young man, on fire with passionate convictions, subjecting himself to rigid dis-

John left the wilderness that he might come into contact with men and society, persuading individuals to turn from sin, urging society to purge itself for the coming of the Redeemer.

To John, Christ Himself came to be baptized. John hesitated and would have refused, feeling his own unworthiness. But Christ was insistent. "Suffer it to be so now," He said, as Matthew tells us in his account of the baptism, "for this it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness."

Why did Christ insist on public baptism? John had preached baptism as an outward sign of repentence and the beginning of a new life. But Christ had no sin to repent and in Him was the fullness of the new life He had come to give to men.

The baptism, however, was in harmony with the nature, meaning and purpose of Christ's coming. It marked His humanity, His willingness to share the life of sinful men that He might show the ways of God to them. This is the essence of the public baptism of Christ.


