WHEELER RESIDENTS TO SEE TV VIA COMMUNITY TOWER SOON

Some Tie-Ons To Be Complete Saturday

Wheeler residents will be watching television funneled through the Wheeler community tower by Saturday of this week, according to Lee Guthrie, owner of the television system.

"About 50 per cent of the town is covered with our steel cable and 25 per cent with the coaxial cable and practically all of the poles have been erected," he said.

Guthrie said he expects the amplifiers to arrive soon. He plans to install 20 line amplifiers or 1 every three blocks, in order to maintain a uniform signal strength throughout the 7 miles of cable.

C. B. Kirk, mayor of Wheeler and well-known business man, was the first to sign a contract, giving the company the "go" signal to connect his TV set to the tower.

Guthrie said the initial tie on fee is \$25.00 and the monthly rental fee will be \$7.00 per month.

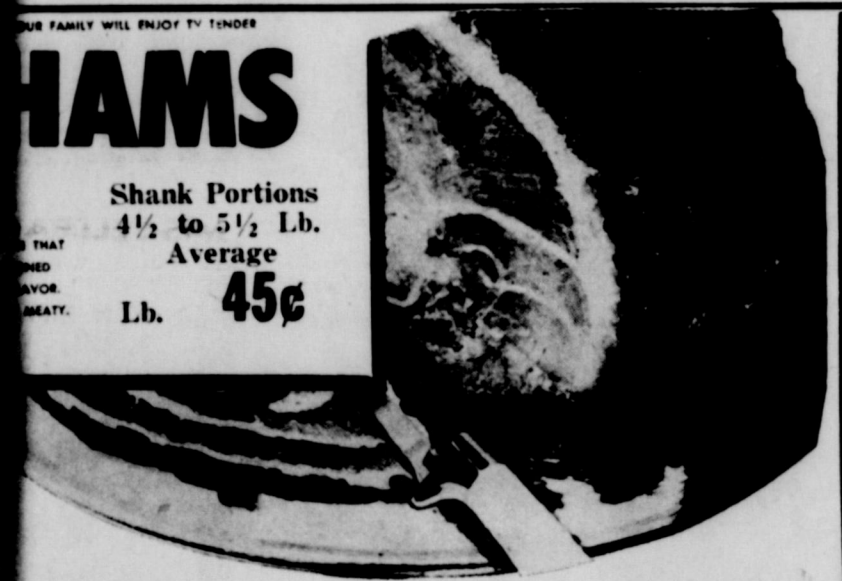

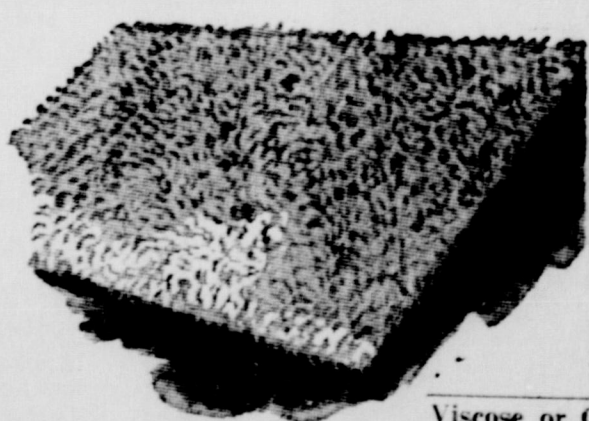

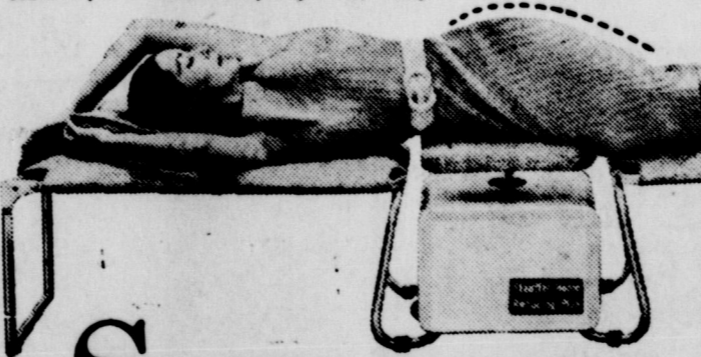
